The profits of the Standard Oil trust were larg er and the dividends paid much greater and the monopoly eve more grinding than the feef trust for it had advanced its prices 100 per cent in a year. The coal trust was equally guilty and quite as oppressive. The steel trust was
more gigantic, and as a monopoly spared neither high nor low. Why were none of thes\& selecte as the "horrible example?"
