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## Editorial

## Perry's effort deserves support

Although few would call us a fan of Texas Governor Rick Perry, we must say that his efforts to pull Texas dollars out of the coffers of nations and regimes that refuse to denounce terrorist activities, both within their own borders and abroad, deserves widespread support.

In the years leading up to World War II, the support the Third Reich received from individuals and factions from other lands, including the United States, slowed down the world's response to Hitler's aggression and atrocities. To be honest, we can see little difference between Neville Chamberlain's desire to appease Nazi Germany due to the high cost of financing World War I, and the expenditure Blvd., in Muleshoe. of Texas dollars to support similar regimes.

For American and Texas dollars to boost the economy of a government that is seeking to destroy an attempt at democracy by a neighboring nation, or to support a government bent on the annihilation of a group within its borders is just as scandalous... and just as wrong.

But, if this is the path the Lone Star State should follow we need to be sure it's carried out across the board, avoiding policies supporting the idea that "the enemy of my enemy is my friend," which placed the United States in bed with the regimes of Ferdinand Marcos, Manuel Noriega and Saddam Hussein.

While we don't think the withholding of Texas dollars Bailey County office be alone will have any great or lasting impact on Iran — or even the American companies that choose to do business in such countries — there is a principal involved here that we shouldn't go beyond.



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

## Tips offered for a safe and healthy harvest

Now that it is summer, you may beenjoying fresh fruits and vegetables right from yourown garden or you may bepurchasing them from the local grocery store, market, or roadside stand.

Wherever you choose to get the fresh fruits and vegetables that are so good this time of year, it is important to know how to select, store, wash, and serve them the safe way.

Any fruit or vegetable can be contaminated with bacteria.

Here are a few tips in selecting, storing, washing, and serving fruits and vegetables that can help maintain their quality and safety and to prevent the possibility of a foodborne

- Shop often for fruits and vegetables. Buy only items that can be eaten within two bleach. to three days.
- Look for fruits and vegetables with good color, shape, texture, and fresh smell.
- and vegetables, choose those that are cold andproperly packaged in air-tight containers. Check the use-by-dates on the package.
- · Store fresh fruits and vegetables in clean, safe, cool, and dry areas. Store out of direct sunlight and away from heat sources.
- Store fruits and vegetables in refrigerator crisper. The refrigerator should be cold at 41°F or below.
- Keep raw meat, poultry, fish, and seafood separate from fresh fruits and vegetables in refrigerator.

Raw meats should be stored on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator on a tray or pan.

- Throw out spoiled foods immediately.
- Store cut fruits and vegetables in clean, air-tight packages.

Fruits and vegetables should be refrigerated within two hours of cutting or peeling them.

- Wash hands before preparing fresh fruits and vegetables. Wash hands for 20 seconds with hot, soapy water. Dry with a paper
  - Wash whole fruits and

vegetables throughly under cool, clean, running water.

- Use clean and sanitized knives and utensils when serving.


To clean and sanitize, wash with hot, soapy water; rinse with hot water; and sanitize with chlorine

(Sanitizer Recipe: Mix 1 tsp. chlorine bleach with 1 quart of water.)

- · Use separate cutting boards, knives, and utensils • In selecting pre-cut fruits for fresh fruits and vegetables and raw meats. Always wash your hands thoroughly after handling raw meat and before handling fresh fruits and vegetables...
  - When in doubt about the safety of a fruit or vegetable,
  - Carry cut fruits and vegetables in cooler using ice or frozen gel packs.

The summer's fresh fruits and vegetablescan be an important part of healthy diet. Just remember these tips in selecting, storing, washing and serving to prevent a foodborne illness.





## I Love Harry Potter, But I Do **Have One Complaint**

 $\mathbf{M}_{\mathrm{y}}$  life is not so boring that I need to go out of my way to poke somebody, offend a few, or otherwise provoke e-mail to further bury my in-box. (My saved e-mails just broke into five figures.) But, I'll tell you anyway: I love Harry Potter.

If confession is called for, I confess: I am a serious fan. I've got all the books. I've read them, loved them, and I think, somewhere along the line, I've listened to all of the unabridged audio versions on

CD at least once. (The guy who reads for those audio recordings is outstanding.) I'm ashamed to say that, now that the sixth movie has been released (I've heard it was great), I'm two Harry Potter movies behind, but I'll enjoy catching up.

Two of my all-time favorite gifts were given to me by the same dear friend. Both have to do with Harry.

One is the first edition English version of Harry Potter and the Order of the *Phoenix*, bought in person at a bookstore across the street from Buckingham Palace.

And the other? Well, it's an edition of the very first book, Harry Potter and Sorcerer's Stone—in Latin: Harrius Potter et Phosophi Lapis. No, I've not yet sat down to try to read much of it. I was blessed to go to school when Latin was available, and I still think this "dead" language, very much alive in its influence on English, probably should be required for students. But my Latin is as rusty

as my hair is gray. By the way, Latin is only one of the 50 languages into which the Harry Potter books have been translated.

But I've got a complaint about the most recent one, and my gripe has nothing to do with the subject matter.

You see, for my part, though I respect others who disagree, I think the Harry Potter story is just that—a brilimaginative and liantly delightful story, and, by the way, a story based on the Christ-like sacrifice of the main character's mother. The story is based on a fight against evil.

But maybe I ought to be more worried about my own tastes. Two of my all-time favorite book series—The Chronicles of Narnia by C. S. Lewis, and The Lord of the Rings by J. R. R. Tolkien —also have a few witches and wizards scurrying about the pages.

I'm not worried.

Aside from the usual decisions about "age appropriateness" that are always called for, I doubt Harry Potter will do any harm to kids or adults, and my wife thinks I'm old enough to read it.

I love John Wayne movies. I've watched them all my life, and it's been years now since I shot anybody in a saloon. I even like the Little Red Riding Hood story, but I'm quite against siccin' wolves on sick grandmothers. A story is a story, and a good story is a wonderful gift. But I do have a complaint.

They released this last book

on a weekend. I was off at a wedding. The book came. Good. It was left on the porch. That would have been good, but the rain got home before I did. One very soggy book.

Maybe God does have something against Harry Potter. But I really don't think so.

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


