Why the Office of County Superin tendent Should be Created.

## Editor Courier:

In all affairs pertanning to the nanagement of our public schools, ion to be considered is the high est good of the children. The question of the county superin tenaent, like all otbers, should be tried by this high standard, and af ter a careful consideration of
effects upon the true interests the children of our county, w should determine whether a coun ty superintendent is needed.
But in the discussion of this question we do not want to be cism or censure upon the cobduct of our present ex-officio superin tendent. We desire to commen him for the deep interest he has ever manifested in behalf of the schools of Houston county. It is surprising to us that be bas been has along that line. Doring the last year or two his duties as county judge have increased both is impossible for him to devote the stention to the dities of connty superintendent that the impor. tance of the office really demands. We will discuss the question first from a business standpoint. Do you know of any successful How long would a store employing 100 clerks last without a cen tral management? Or a planta tion without an overseer? Or a a lumber-mill without a superintendent?
Yet Houston county employs teachers for over 160 schools to teach over 8000 ehildren, paying good business sense not to employ a superintendent whose business it would be to look after this great army of teachers, and see ardship of the work they are call. ed to do? It is generally admitted that the most sagacious business men live in our towns and cities, yet it would be almost impossible, to find a city in our state with one fourth the scholastic population of our county that does not employ a superintendent at a good salary. Almost without exception these towns pay their superintendent more salary than our law will al low for a county superintendent The inhabitants of our county
seat, with a scholastic population seat, with a scholastic population
of 600 , hnd it to their interest to employ an able snperintendent at a good salary, while the county with a scholastic enrollment of over 6,000 outside of all independent districts, has so far failed to make such a provision.
Are not the country children worth as much to the state as the

It is a nized fact that the schools in the country distriets are far inferior This inferiority in and cities. schools is one of the chief cause
of dissatisfaction among our farm ing population and is each year
causing large numbers of good families to leave prosperous farms and remove to town at a great sac-
rifice to themselves and at a loss o the state and county. Any change that will help remove this inferior condition of our public o all people of both town and country. Would a county super intendent tend to improve the con dition of our schools? This is the uestion that we are to answer.
We do not claim that a superin We do not claim that a superin
tendent would be a specific for all the defects of our schools, but we do believe that it is one of the necessities in order to consummate
the ideals for whiteh we labor.Many of the counties in Texas that seem to be alve to their interest along other lines of progress have an-
swered this question in the affirmarered by creating the offico of county superintendent. The idea is rapidly growing in popular fa vor, for the tegular county super atendents in our state bave increased 25 per cent during the
past two and one half years, and according to Mr. Lefevre, "it is a well known fact that the school affairs in these counties have improved

Provisions for Holding Primaries and Conventions-Cumbersome Features of OId Law Removed.
Austin, Tex., March 30.-Judge Terrell, by request, gave out the following today:

The new election bill as passed by the House yesterday and now in the Senate contains every feature of the present law that experience has approved and a number of provisions which were conpared by myself two years ago pared by myself two years ago
that were then stricken from the bill in its passage through the Legislature. Among those provisions that are now incorporated in the present bill are the following:
${ }^{\text {"(1). }}$. A printed ballot for inde pendent candidates
(2). Primary electionsं and no primary conventions for the po litical party that cast over 100,00 votes in the last procediag gen eral election. All political parties that ceast less than 100,000 votes can hold primary elections or primary conventiogs in thr district. (This clause is new)
"(3). A blanket ballot in al general elections with the ticket for each political party and for in dependent candidates and a blank write the name of any one.
"(4). Supervisors (called "watchers" in the former bill) to be chosen from different political parties, to remain with the precinet judges and ballot boxes, and sworn to report irregularities and fraud to the grand jary.
"(5). The judges to be selected from different political parties. tion expenses, and new provisions guarding against fraud with penalties to enforee them
"(7). Prohibition against news papers publishing articles in fa vor of or against candidates when written by other people than the editor, except as 'contributoins, and limiting therr charge for such 'contributions.' The cost of the
ballot in the judgment of printing experts is reduced one-half and the experts is reduced one-half andioltions and dificultes caused by many amendments two years ago have all been corrected in the present bill.
"The bill was carefully considered by the House committee for six weeks, and through mnck amending in the House has been Love of Dallas, Mr. Harris of Galveston, Mr. Robertson of Bel and other gentlemen labored -with intelligence and great energy in the work of perfecting the bill in committee and on the floor of the House, and without their aid would never have passed the

## Report of Finance Committee.

Crockett, Tex., March 31, 1895 Hon. B. H. Gardner, Judge 3r Judicial District
The committee appointed by your honor at the request of th grand jury to inquire into the finances of the county, beg to sub mit herewith the following report We have examined into, in the limited time allowed us by law fo making such examination, all coun ty officer books, records and re ports, of all making reports, an find the finances of the county i somewhat better shape than the have been for several years past but we find that considerable im provement could be made wherein expenses to the county could be greatly reduced and much extravagance avoided. What appears to this committee to be seemingly the most extravagant and, to say the least, costing the county more just now than any other item, is the manner of working the public rads with countr con the public ruads with county convicts. We find since beginning this work, just a little more than
a year ago, that it has cost the a year ago, that it has cost the county nearly 88,000 . This in-
cludes all items for supplie cludes all items for supplies, mules, scrapers, tools, etc. Only a little over thirty miles have been worked, and from the best information we can gather, there
should have been more miles of road worked for this out-lay of money. It cost, as we find it, about 8100 dollars per mile. We recommend that the County Judge and Commissioners' Court exercise more care and diligence in this one item of expense to the county, with a view of curtailing expenses where it can be done and expediting the work on the roads to the end that this work may be oxtanded as far as posible into the county upon every road leading out to the country from the county site.
Other items of expense very notable, and of which we will make mention, are the large and seemingly excessive lumber bills
and stationery bills. For instance and stationery bills. For instance
we find upon the table annual rewe find upon the table annual re-
port blanks alone enough to last the port blanks alone enough to last the
entire county five years or longer. This we consider extravagance and should be avoided.
We urge more care and econ-
omy upon the county judge and omy upon the county judge and commissioners' court in the purchasing of these various items. Another item of unnecessary ex pense to the county is the employment of a janitor by the commissioners' court at a salary of see why he is paid in we addition his salary for washing 50 blankets. We recommend that this expense be avoided, and that a janitor be employed only during the sessions of the county and distriet courts. And we believe that every officer of the county, who has the heartily endorse these recomin dations and aid in the enforcement of same.
We find in the county clerk's office the finance ledger, civil and eriminal fee-books and the minutes
of the county court kept in such a loose and careless manuer that we were unable to check same in a satisfactory way.
We recommend that a more
same in future. We recommend
further that the law be enforce further that the law be enforced
compelling the county and preinct officers to make their re ports regularly as the statutes re quire. The estray record shows that several estrays have not been sold as the law requires. Ex-
county treasurer, G. H. Bayne, failed to make his annual repor to us. We found by checking hi book that he had taken credi twice for scrip No. 870-on May 12th and Aug. 10, 1904. We also find in the hands of tax collector a reecipt for 86.50 which we do not find upon treasurer's books. We find in checking the fee-book of ex-Sheriff Hale a number of charges that seem to us excessive nd unjust and call attention he grand jury to these records. We find that our tax eollector has not done his duty relative to nforcing collection of taxe We have examined his record which show amount of back tax uncollected for several years past
which statement is attached t which stat
We recommend to the commis ioners' court to use such efforts o collect or have collected the de inquent taxes of the county and state. The attached statemen hows delinquent taxes for five years of \$46,407.46. And anothe tems of uncollected taxes we de sire to call attention to is occupa tion taxes. The law require them to be paid in advance. See the iched statement which shows he delinquents for the county, five years in arrerr. In view of the faet that our time is limited to five days only, in making these investigations and examinations, we cannot make a thorough and ex lusive report of all the officers o he county, we therefore recommend to the grand jury the advisability of requesting the sta revenue agent to come and make
such investigation of the records s he may see proper
Ex-Tax Assessor, Tony Gossett, ailed to make us a report.
We recommend to the commis sioners' court that they follow the leeding prisoners. We notice rom the bills on file in the county clerk's office that the court allows 40 cents per day for every prisoner, regardless of the number that they have in the jail. Some of the bills were allowed for 30 cents per day when there were more than four prisoners, and
since that time bills have been at lowed for 40 cents when there were more than four prisioners. This proceedure, in our judgment, is wrong, and we again recommend to the court to track the law on these bills.
