## GRAND JURY RFPORT

Comprehensive and Interesting-It Deals With All Matters in which the Public is Concerned.
(Continued from last week.)
W. B. Page, Foreman of the Grand Jury

I beg to submit for your consideration the following report of the expense of working the County convicts upon the public roads of Hous. on County. We have on hand the following items, values of which are et opposite each item.

The road superintendent, Barbee, has worked 8839380 eading out of Crockett since Sept. 1, r903, on which date the work first begun. Prior to that time, during the month of August, and while ar rangements were being made to erect a camp, the city worked 7 or 8 of the county convicts for about two weeks. Since that time, all the work that has been done upon the public roads by the county convicts has
been outside of the city limits, except the work around the court house been outside of the city limits
and the court house yard.

We have worked about - hands upon the roun ranging from 30 to 300 days each. This work was an actual cost to Houston county of $371 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ to 40 C per day, and 25 C of this was used to pay the cost that goes to the officer, ahd $121 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ to 15 C was spent in feed ing the conyicts per day. This amount is about what it would cost t feed the convicts in jail per day ${ }_{n}$ and our sheriff says that this amount is not sufficient to feed them, and wants the court to allow more per da

There has been constructed by the county convicts 94 bridges and culverts. Some of these bridges were very expensive and longer possibly than any in the county. There has been four constructed on the Hur ricane Bayou, from 70 to 80 feet in length, and all of the heavy timber were hewn from oak timber, and of course it took time to construct a bridge like this.

If you remember the roads leading out of Crockett, have more bridges and culverts upon them than any section of road in Houston county
work.

The total expense as shown by the finance ledger, which I presume is correct (in this particular), for maintaining convicts upon the public actual expense in deducting the assets on hand, will leave a balance of pute the time lost for bad weather and for erecting bridges, which, say is about 5 per cent of total time. This I think to be a conservative estimate. That will leave you about $\$ 500$ for the construction of the 48 miles of road. This will give you about $\$ 70$ per mile, which is a very conservative expenditure for grading dirt roads.

Figure that 48 miles cost the amount reported by finance committee, which was $\$ 8000$-less assets $\$ 2393.80$ would leave $\$ 5606.20$. This would cost about $\$_{11} 6.00$ per mile. This is also a very conservative estimate for grading one mile of road. From the best information I can get $\$ 200,00$ per mile is not extravagant.
