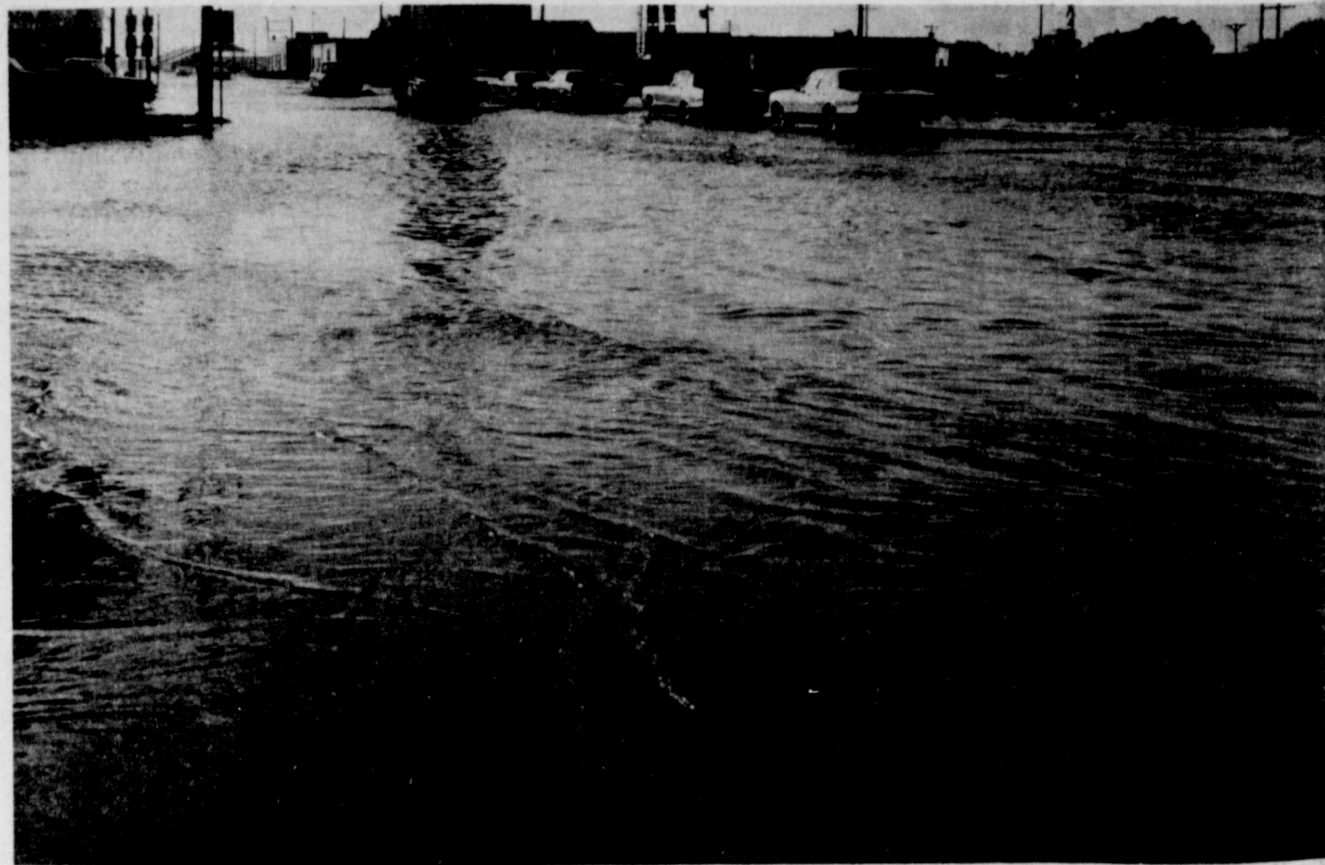

Primary Runoffs Slated Saturday

Severe Hailstorm East of Muleshoe

An area east of Muleshoe from the new Ramage Feed Yard to just east of Muleshoe Water Works was hit by damaging hail Saturday afternoon about 5 p.m.

Alton Burton of the Muleshoe Volunteer Fire Department reports that the hail varied in size from marble-size to golf ball-size. Burton said the hail looked somewhat like a light snow and covered both the highway and the bar ditches in that area with more than six inches of hail.

Several cars were off the road as a result of the severe hail. County maintainers were called to blade off the hailstones and prevent possible auto accidents. Burton said that "the hailstorm cleaned out many of the crops all the way to Sudan."

High water backed up traffic for more than a mile in each direction for a brief period on U.S. hi-way 84 following a heavy rain. The Texas Highway Department assisted traffic across the high water Tuesday afternoon until Tuesday morning.

Three tornadoes were reported in the Littlefield-Sudan area. Water also covered U.S. Highway 70 in two places between Springlake and Earth during the peak of the storm.

Three to four inch rains flooded highways, damaged crops in areas surrounding Bailey County. Rains in Bailey County were light, however.

Soybean Contest Open To County Producers

Soybean producers in Bailey County are encouraged to enter the 1972 Texas Five Acre Yield Recognition Program. Although the deadline for entering is August 15, now is the time to begin planning for those top yields that might win an award, says County Agricultural Agent Spencer Tanksley.

At least 10 acres of soybeans must be grown, five of which must be harvested. The

Sixty-nine ballots had been returned to the clerk's office and 16 ballots were still in the mail. If all the mail-in ballots are received, a total of 85 persons will have cast absentee ballots.

Tuesday, May 30, was the official deadline for casting absentee ballots.

Large Voter Turnout Expected

Candidates in the Democratic runoff for governor are Dolph Briscoe and Frances (Sissy) Farenthold, Lt. Governor runoff candidates are Wayne W. Connally and Bill Hobby, James (Jim) Wilson and the incumbent comptroller, Robert S. Calvert, are the candidates for U.S. Senator are Barefoot Sanders and Ralph Yarborough.

In the county offices, there will be a runoff for Commissioner of Precinct Three between W.H. (Bill) Eubanks and R.P. (Bob) Sanders, Residents of Precinct Three vote in Boxes Four and Five.

The only runoff on the Republican ballot is in the race for governor between Albert Bel Tay and Henry C. (Hank) Grover.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock has warned voters in the June 3 runoff elections to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

Bullock said, "Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3."

"We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500."

"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find that it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper prosecuting authorities," Bullock said.

Swimming lessons will be given and arrangements can be made by contacting the lifeguards, Gail Bruns or Val Moore.

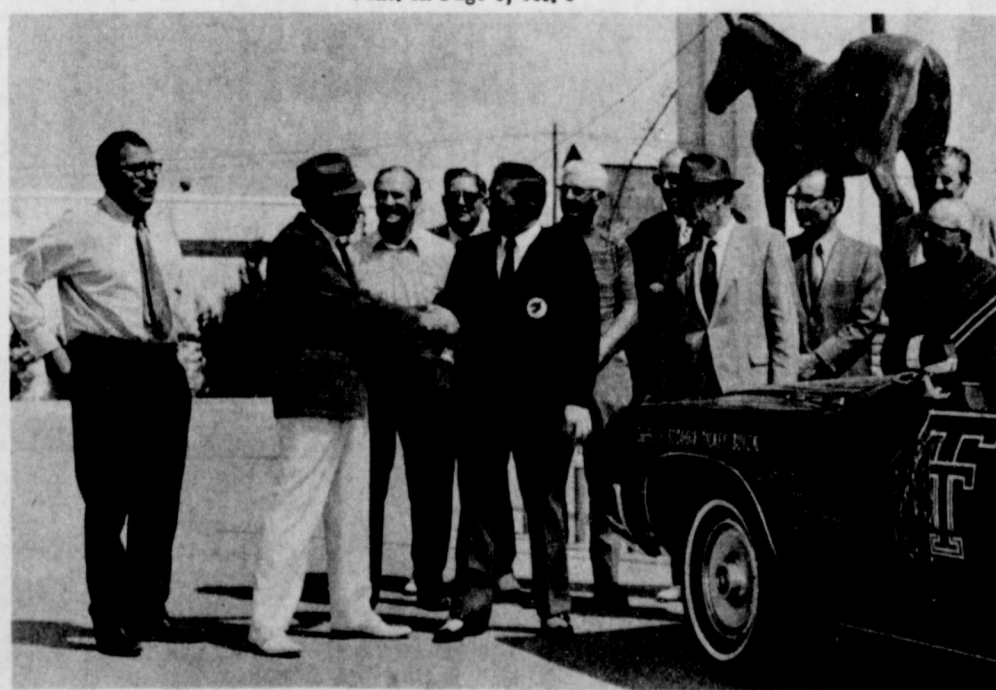

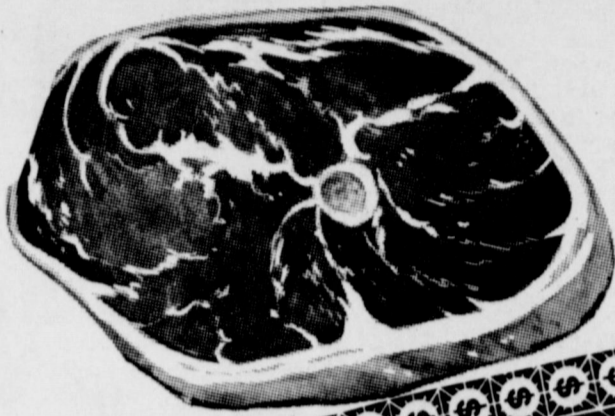

Public Utilities

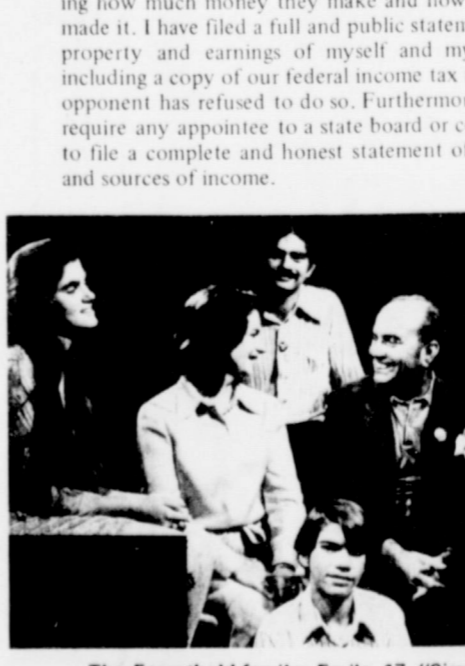

Briscoe-For-Governor Busses Resume Tours

UVALDE--The Briscoe-for-governor busses from Uvalde, which were very effective vote getters in the first primary, today resumed their tours for the runoff election.

The first busload of Uvalde citizens who are drumming up support over the state for their friend and neighbor, Dolph Briscoe, is scheduled to visit Austin, Dallas and points in between.

Only six bus tours will be made in the runoff campaign, whereas 11 bus tours and one air tour promoted the Briscoe candidacy in the first primary.

On Tuesday a bus will leave for the Rio Grande Valley; Wednesday one will visit Houston, Beaumont and Port Arthur. The following week two will leave Uvalde on Tuesday-one going back to Dallas and the other to the Houston-Galveston area.

The last tour will be all women, dressed in colorful costume, and they will spend the last three days before the election in and around Houston. Each bus carries about 25 Uvalde citizens, who pay their own expenses on the trips to help their fellow-townsmen attain the governor's office, Melvin Rowland is in charge of the tours.

AUSTIN--Dolph Briscoe has the support of city officials from one end of the state to the other in his race for governor.

At the recent state convention of the Association of Mayors, Councilmen and Commissioners in San Antonio, more than 200 municipal officials and their

wives signed an endorsement of Briscoe, Dick Brown, executive director of the Texas Municipal League, said.

Connally Advocates Price Tagging Legislation

AUSTIN--Wayne Connally believes Texas should adopt a system of "price tagging" new legislation to get a realistic picture of just how much new state programs will cost taxpayers.

The lieutenant governor can-

didate said, "For too long now we have passed legislation that authorized certain programs but failed to place either an immediate price on the legislation or future cost implications.

"We should have both immediate costs and future cost implications of such legislation," Connally said.

Budget execution is "the greatest problem in state government today concerning fiscal affairs."

"We over-prepare budgets and under execute them. This must be corrected and as leader of the state senate I will see it is done."

"The dual budget system is a classic example of why we should put the state's financial house in order," he said.

"Duplication of the two budgets--one from the Governor's Budget Office, the other from the Legislative Budget Board--is a ridiculous system," he continued. "It is the only one of its kind in the nation."

Connally also advocates restrictions on what the Free Conference Committee on Appropriations is permitted to do. "We don't want to make it difficult for House and Senate to agree on how to allocate money for government operations and services, but we don't want the committee to come back with a whole new bill so late in the day we have to take it or else," he said.

"We don't want any surprises to show up the last day of the session in the Conference Committee report," Connally concluded.

Farenthold Proposes Eradication Measures For Screw-Worm

Gubernatorial candidate Frances Farenthold, speaking to supporters in Brownsville Wednesday morning, proposed measures to beef up Texas' screw-worm eradication pro-

gram, which she said is not getting the job done.

"Ranchers in South Texas are facing the most serious skew-worm crisis in a decade," she said, "and they want to know why. The answer lies in that private government in Austin which lacks the leadership to deal in anything but half-way measures.

To head off the screw-worms, Mrs. Farenthold said she would: 1) direct an urgent request to the federal government to increase the number of sterile

flies dropped into stricken zones from 140 million per week to 240 million per week; 2) ask the U.S. Department of Agriculture to move the screw-worm barrier zone northward so the federal government will pay 100 percent of the cost.

"Since this is an international problem," she said, "Texans should not be expected to bear

the whole cost. It's unrealistic to limit the federal program to the immediate border area."

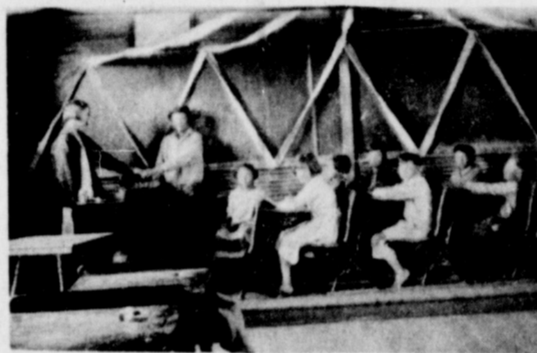

L.J. Cochran came to Bailey County from Wheeler County, Texas in 1925 by car. He established a farming operation twelve miles north of Muleshoe. The land cost \$35 an acre. Cochran decided to move to this area because there was more land available for cultivation here than in Wheeler County.

In 1925 there was a school in the Jesko community, north of Muleshoe. But there were hardly any churches.

Cochran remembers that there was no rural mail delivery to his farm. They went in to Friona three times a week to pick up their mail.

People in this area in the early days used to get together on Saturday nights for parties. About once a month one of the families would invite all their neighbors in for dinner. The next month another of the families would volunteer to be host.

This is one in a series of historical biographies of Bailey County pioneer families who arrived here prior to 1930.

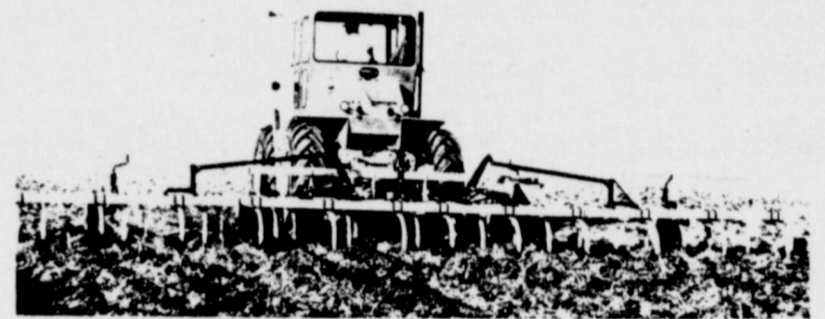

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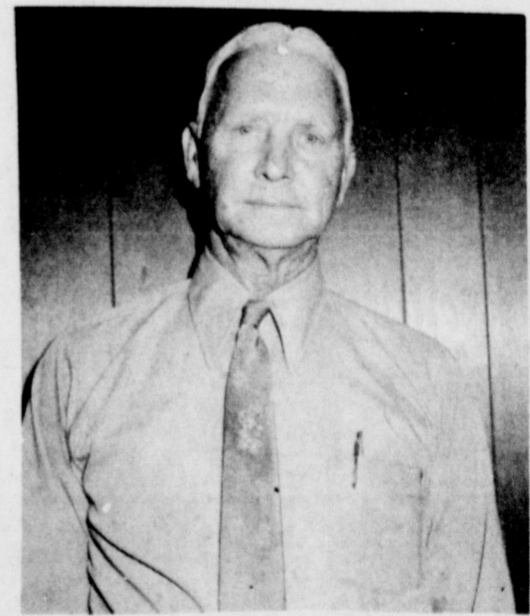
