Early Fall Destruction of the Cotton Stalks and Burning the Trash.
Owing to the comparatively small damage done by the boll weevil this season, farmers are liable to neglect the fall work necessary to therr control-to-wit: Catting and burning the cotton stalks, burning all trash in the stalks,
fields
them.

Undoubtedly, if every farme had attended to this work last fall, very few boll weevils would have been found in Texas this spring. Eternal viglance is the price success. With vigilant work this fall, we mày reasonably expect a cotton crop in 1906, regardless of the boll weevil. With general neglect, we' are morally sure of disaster to the next crop from the bool weevil. Therefore, take immediate steps to destroy the ton stalks, clean up the trash and lon staike, clean up the trash ane
plow the field. Even if there are ${ }_{\mathrm{a}} \mathrm{p}$ few unopened bolls in the field, a few unopened beiss in the fela,
it is better to destroy the stalks it is better to destroy the staliks
in South Texas and Louissana, by October 20th, and in the northern portion of these states before frost, if possible. Let the effort to minimize the evils of the boll weevil be general
Farmers of Texas and Louisi ana! Act promptly and insist up on your tenants doing the same. Let the work be thorough, and let it be universal.
fall plowing or breaking.
No single farm operation is more important than fall breakng, and the land should be broken each fall about two inches deeper than the previous season, until a depth of ten inches is reached. Flat breaking is the best, except in heavy sonls where the surface is level and there is considerabl rali-fall and on post-oak land wherer after a hard rain wer diter hard rain. ha such casse the land in ridges, or flat-
leave break, barrow and then throw in to ridges later in the fall, the right distance for planting. Very rolhng lands, hable to wasb, re quire special instructions. While the above general suggestions are made in regard to fall breaking, we recognize that there are many special conditions of soil and oll mate requiring more or less mod ifcation of our method. The farmer must, therefore, use hi judgment.
In general, the following points breaking:
1st. It aerates the land and pre pares plant food.
2nd. The germination of the seed at the next plantung is better, plants are more vigoro and the crop greatly benefitted. 3rd. It destroys weeds and in sects. Both will be injurious to the future crop.
