

ALEXANDRIA, LA., HEALTH CON-FERENCE OPENS TODAY.

GENERAL FUMIGATION PLANNED

Dr. Kohnke Will Show Stegomylae and Wiggletails on Screen-Women Delegates.

New Orleans, La., Feb. 13 .- The sanitary forces of Louisiana, with representatives from Texas and Mississippi, are headed for Alexandria, Rapides parish, on Red river, for the state health convention, which will be called to order in the Alexandria Opera House Wednesday morning, Feb. 14, at 9:30 o'clock. The conference will last two days.

Alexandria has made preparations to entertain a thousand delegates. Fifteen hundred invitations have been sent out and it is believed very nearly five hundred delegates will be present. Dr. C. H. Irion, president of the state board, will call the convention to order and preside over the sessions. He is the author of this convention; it is his scheme,

His Excellency, N. C. Blanchard, Governor of Louisiana, will be present. The mayors of every important town in the state, health officers of towns and parishes, coroners, presidents of police juries and business men will make up the personnel of the gathering.

In an interview last night President Irion outlined the objects of this conference, namely:

First, to secure concerted action of all interests in Louisiana for the protection of the state from any possible recrudescence of the yellow fever.

Second, to launch an active campaign of education and sanitation in every city and parish of the state.

Third, to form a state health association, to be directed under the auspices of the state board of health.

Fourth, to lay the foundation for an auixiliary health association in every parish of the state.

Fifth, to arrange for the fumigation of every house in every previously infected district in the state.

Sulphur will be secured by the carload. The plan of operation is to get the community to bear the cost of such fumigation, with the state board of health furnishing an expert to di-

A feature of the Alexandria conference will be practical demonstrations in fumigation, screening and pasting of houses preparatory to fumigating, conducted by Dr A 1. Metz chemist winning the cup next year. But of the state board. He will carry a corps of experts with him from this city in order to give the county sanitarians practical lessons in how to do this work effectively.

Dr. Quitman Kohkne, City Health Officer, will be there and deliver his famous illustrated lecture on the stegomyia mosquito, showing live mosquitoes on the screen, also wiggletails, and the effect of oil upon them, as in oiling cisterns.

Prominent women from all parts of the state will be on hand, a large delegation going from this city, represent-

ing the Women's League. M. T. McKee of the Texas railway sanitation committee of Waco will attend the convention, having been in Mississippi with Dr. Hunter in an effort to secure uniform regulations between the three states.

SELF-DEFENSE CLAIMED.

Daughter Had Never Known Father Until After Her Marriage-He Had Been Drinking.

Wharton, Texas, Feb. 12.-G. R. Higginbotham, who has been visiting this section for several years, representing the L. R. Price Mercantile Company of Houston, was killed Saturday night at the Watts Hotel, on one of the principal streets in town, the shot taking effect in the upper part of the left cheek and coming out below the right ear, evidently breaking his neck and killing him instantly.

W. L. Jackson, a son-in-law of Higginbotham, and supposed to be representative of the same firm in Houston, is now in the Wharton county jail charged with the murder.

The dead man was carried to the court house and placed in charge of Undertaker F. B. May, who, with the assistance of the officers, is attempting to locate some of his relations, while the daughter of the dead man and wife of the accused is at the Watts Hotel, and is on the verge of collapse from hysterics, she being the only eye witness to the shooting.

Lynee McFarlane was the nearest man to the house, and on hearing the shot was among the first on the scene of the tragedy. On entering the house and going to Jackson's bedroom, where he had already retired, he saw the lifeless body of Higginbotham lying directly in the door with a pistol in his hand. The pistol afterward, on being examined by County Attorney W. L. Hall, was found to be a perfectly new Smith & Wesson, thirty-eight calibre, loaded all around, and had apparently never been fired. Jackson had partly dressed himself, and, in company with his arme by McFarlane, and in a few seconds turned over to the officers, who at once placed him in jail.

ALEXANDRIA, LA., HEALTH CON-FERENCE OPENS TODAY.

GENERAL FUMICATION PLANNED

Dr. Kohnke Will Show Stegomylae and Wiggletails on Screen-Women Delegates.

New Orleans, La., Feb. 13,-The sanitary forces of Louisiana, with representatives from Texas and Mississippi, are headed for Alexandria, Rapides parish, on Red river, for the state health convention, which will be called to order in the Alexandria Opera House Wednesday morning, Feb. 14, at 9:30 o'clock. The conference will last two days.

Alexandria has made preparations to entertain a thousand delegates. Fifteen hundred invitations have been sent out and it is believed very nearly five hundred delegates will be present. Dr. C. H. Irion, president of the state board, will call the convention to order and preside over the sessions. He is the author of this convention; it is his scheme.

His Excellency, N. C. Blanchard, Governor of Louisiana, will be present. The mayors of every important town in the state, health officers of towns and parishes, coroners, presidents of police juries and business men will make up the personnel of the gathering.

In an interview last night President Irion outlined the objects of this conference, namely:

First, to secure concerted action of all interests in Louisiana for the protection of the state from any possible recrudescence of the yellow fever.

Second, to launch an active campaign of education and sanitation in every city and parish of the state. Third, to form a state health associa-

tion, to be directed under the auspices of the state board of health. Fourth, to lay the foundation for

an auixiliary health association in very parish of the state. Fifth, to arrange for the fumigation

of every house in every previously infected district in the state.

Sulphur will be secured by the carload. The plan of operation is to get the community to bear the cost of such fumigation, with the state board of health furnishing an expert to direct it.

A feature of the Alexandria conference will be practical demonstrations in fumigation, screening and pasting of houses preparatory to fumigating. Sir Thomas Lipton feels sure of conducted by Dr. A. "I have secured an agreement with a syndicate of Eastern capitalists, headed by E. R. Thomas, well known banker and financier of New York, to take 500,00 bales of middling from Southern planters at a minimum price of 13c per pound, delivered at interior points or ports by or pefore July 1, 1906. The deal will be closed as soon as options on the syndicate's requirements shall have been secured. The agreement further provides for the taking of all cotton ready for the market next August and September from the crop of 1906 at the then market prices, to be not less than minimum prices fixed by the Southern Cotton Growers' Association. This agreement is not intended to affect hundreds who are demanding the maximum of 15c at the present time. New York bankers are prepared to finance fully all Southern bankers in assisting holders of cotton for higher prices. Option coatracts will be forwarded at once upon application to all cotton growers.

WHARTON KILLING

AND KILLED.

SELF-DEFENSE CLAIMED.

Daughter Had Never Known Father Until After Her Marriage-He Had Been Drinking.

Wharton, Texas, Feb. 12.-G. Higginbotham, who has been visiting this section for several years, representing the L. R. Price Mercantile Company of Houston, was killed Saturday night at the Watts Hotel, on one of the principal streets in town, the shot taking effect in the upper part of the left cheek and coming Ed Shields came to town and reportout below the right ear, evidently breaking his neck and killing him

W. L. Jackson, a son-in-law of Higginbotham, and supposed to be representative of the same firm in Houston, is now in the Wharton county jail charged with the murder.

The dead man was carried to the court house and placed in charge of Undertaker F. B. May, who, with the assistance of the officers, is attempting to locate some of his relations, while the daughter of the dead man and wife of the accused is at the Watts Hotel, and is on the verge of collapse from hysterics, she being the only eye witness to the shooting.

Lynee McFarlane was the nearest man to the house, and on hearing the shot was among the first on the scene of the tragedy. On entering the house and going to Jackson's bedroom, where he had already retired, he saw the lifeless body of Higginbotham lying directly in the door with a pistol in his hand. The pistol afterward, on being examined by County Attorney W. L. Hall, was found to be a perfectly new Smith & Wesson, thirty-eight calibre, loaded all around, and had apparently never been fired. Jackson had partly dressed himself, and, in company with his wife, had gone to an adjoining room in the hotel. He was taken and disarme by McFarlane, and in a few seconds turned over to the officers,

who at once placed him in jail. His wife's pleadings were pathetic in the extreme as she pleaded with the officers not to handcuff her husband, and prayed that they not mistreat him, exclaiming hysterically that "Will had killed poor father, but he had to do it." Mr. Jackson's statement is that he fired the shot in defense of his own life, all of which to horne out by the facts in the case. The substance of his conversation in hend him. regard to the matter is, that he married Higginbotham's daughter in Coldwater, Miss., about ten years ago. He nor his wife had never seen her father, as he left that country and came to Texas when his wife died, leaving his infant daughter with her grandmother, who reared the child, she therefore never having seen her father.

Capt. Webb a Suicide.

Moreover, had there not been in that year a sufficient torce of officers and men in the Phi! iprines which could be rushed to China the members of the legation in Pekin would have been murdered. In the Navy Department officers retiring from the Asiatic station have without exception brought reports of anti-foreign feeling and the statements are that Americans were the foreigners against whom this feeling was most bitterly directed. The cruisers Gal veston and Chattanooga have been ordered to leave Rear Admiral Sigsbee's squadron at the close of his Mediterranean cruise and proceed to Chinese waters by way of the Suez Canal They will also be available to go to the rescue of any threatened Americans in the Empire, while from the Philippines can be sent a force of seeral theusand soldiers, infantry and

FIRST "NEWS" OVER THE WIRE.


It Was Sent from Portsmouth to London Chronicle in 1845.

The newspaper which received the first telegraphic report was the London Morning Chronicle, May 8, 1845.

During the railway mania of 1845 a meeting of considerable importance was convened at Portsmouth to take into consideration the respective merits of the proposed lines from London. A great desire existed to know the result of the meeting, and as it was not to take place at Portsmouth until after the last London train, recourse was had to the telegraph.

A full report of the meeting, headed "Portsmouth Lines, communicated by electric telegraph," appeared in a London paper next morning. The editor called attention to the fact in the leading column as follows:

"In our article on railways will be found a report of a meeting held yesterday evening at Portsmouth which was transmitted by electric telegraph. This is the first example of the electric telegraph being used for such a purpose, and it indicates the important and numerous services which that valuable invention will soon render to the public."-Stray Stories.

FACED AWFUL DEATH

TO ESCAPE FROM ILL TREAT. MENT ON SHIP.

British Sailor, Manacled and Heavily Clothed, Plunged into Shark-Infested Waters in the Harbor of Hono-Iulu-Finally Rescued.

B. Meiuell was a sailor in the ship's company of the British ship Brenda until yesterday noon. But rather than endure the treatment he feared he would be sure to receive once the ship was out of sight of land he preferred to trust himself to the mercy of the sea. So, just as the ship was clearing the channel and the officers and all hands were busy making all sail to catch the least breath of wind, he jumped overboard. He was manacled with handcuffs, or, more properly, heavy iron bracelets fastened together with a chain, but he preferred death in the bright daylight to the life he had endured aboard ship as well as to possible death in the brig after abuse and slow starvation. At least that was the impression his story gave. There was no time to get into bathing trunks or even to peel off his heavy boots or even his coat.
