## an attempt at retallation.

The anti-railway agitation has now taken a new form, induc ed pehaps by the determination of many of the larger systems to discontinue the issuance of passes to other than employes, says the Railway World. The legislatures of Ohio, Maryland and Virginia have taken up the question of pas senger fares with a view to secur ing their reduction, and similar agitation, which has not howeve reached the legislative stage, being carried on in Pennsylvania, Iowa, Indiana and Illinois. The bill introduced in the Ohio legislature is typical of the generai for a general reduction in the regular rate for passengers from three to two cents per mile. It has already passed the senate and a similar mea
by the house.
This attempt to retaliate upon the railroads for the withdrawa of pass privileges is wholly unreasonable and flagrantly unjust. The position of the large companies upon this matter is ably set forth in the statement prepared by Vice-President James McCrea, of the Pennzylvania lines west of Pittsbarg, addressed to the committee on railroads and telegrapis
of the Ohio house of representaof the Ohio house of representatives. Mr. McCrea makes the following points against the proposed measure: (1). That if passenger traffic is charged with its proper portion of interest and dividends, the passenger business on the
Pennsylvania lines west of Pittsburg in the State of Ohio is now conducted at a loss. (2) That the low average rates of fare prevailing in foreign countries and in the more thickly populated of the Eastern States of the United Slates, which are brought forward in support of the measure, are the result of dense passenger traffic, and furnish no basis for judgment as to the legitimacy of passenger
charges in the more thinly settled charges in the more thinly set
sections of the middle west.
