

The board approved specifications for an activity bus that is to be submitted through the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Control.

The tenative estimated budget for the 1972-73 school year was reviewed, studied and diccussed by the members. The total tax rate will remain the same as for current year 1971-72. The total rate will be \$1.63 per 100 dollars assessed



MEXICO CITY--Mexico opened an institution of higher learning in the United States this week -- in San Antonio, Texas. Why?



Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Adminis- decision on DDT, Johnson betrator William Ruckelshaus on June 14 announced an almost complete ban on DDT usage in the United States beginning December 31, 1972. DDT for several years has been under fire from "environmental purists" who maintain its use creates an unreasonable hazard to human health and various species of wildlife. They claim this hazard outweighs the benefits to crop

production and to humanity as a means to controlling mosquitos and therby furnishing protection against such scourges as malaria, yellow fever, encephalitis and a number of other deadly diseases.

Seven months of hearing were held by EPA in Washington dur-

ing which DDT opponents attempted to show that DDT causes severe damage to the environment. They failed. At the conclusion, hearing examiner Edmund Sweeney said "There has been proof that, on balance with the benefits, the present essential uses of DDT do not create an unreasonable risk." Accordingly, Sweeney re-commended to Administrator Ruckelshaus that essential uses of DDT be continued. But the Administrator has apparently ignored the recommendation of the hearing examiner, ignored the absence of evidence to support claims of detrimental DDT

cated for the most part in rural communities. They make it possible for the cattle producers to sell their animals at the local level, at a fair price, and with out the cost of transporting them long distances. This is very helpful to the producer with only a few head to market. These small plants also provide local jobs for community residents and they can

sell meat to the consumer cheaper because they can operate with smaller overhead costs,' Congressman Price said reports from various states


