CIGARETTE SMOKERS.

Southern Boys Physically Unfit for Army Service-Western Youths Are Much Superior.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 2.—Out of a total of 106 applicants at the United States army recruiting office located here during the month of July, only 29 were found fit to enter the army. This condition of affairs is being viewed with alarm here. First Lieut. William E. Bennett, Jr., Twenty Fifth Infantry, in charge of the office, in a statement today, sounds a note of warning to young boys of New Orleans and the south. He says that out of the same number of applicants in any of the states west of the Mississippi river or in Ohio, Indiana or Kentucky, the number of enlistments would have been as high as 60 or 80. The reason for such an unsatisfactory condition in the south is ascribed by the officer to eigarette smoking, late hours and bad habits.

BISCOVERY OF ASBESTOS.

Deposit Found in the Llano Country by D. F. Brooks.

Taylor, Tex.: D. F. CATTLE LOSS IMMENSE.

A Cloudburst at Langtry Swept Away Thousands of Head of Animals.

San Antonio, Tex., Aug. 13.-The full report of the damage done to the property of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railroad by the cloudburst near Langtry about noon Saturlay was not learned until morning. The total loss to the railroad alone will be nearly \$100,000. Seven bridges are gone, probably ten miles of track badly washed and both the bridges and portions of the track were carried hundreds of yards down stream by the raging torrents.

As the country in that section is very sparsely settled little damage was done to private property, although hundreds of head of cattle grazing along the banks of the streams were swept away by the sudden inundation of the valleys.

Reports say that the amount of rain which fell in less than an hour was unprecedented. The country about Langtry is very mountainous and ravines are frequent. Across seven of these in less than seven miles were seven bridges. The cloudburst was the heaviest about the summit of the mountains in which these ravines originate and the entire waterfall swept down their channels, carrying everynearly five thousand visitors enjoying thing before them. "AN OLD PAINTER'S IDEAS."

The autumn season is coming more and more to be recognized as a most suitable time for housepainting. There is no frost deep in the wood to make trouble for even the best job of painting, and the general seasoning of the summer has put the wood into good condition in every way. The weather, moreover, is more likely to be settled for the necessary length of time to allow all the coats to thoroughly dry, a very important precaution. An old and successful painter said to the writer the other day: "House owners would get more for their money if they would allow their painters to take more time, especially between coats. Instead of allowing barely time for the surface to get dry enough not to be 'tacky,' several days (weeks would not be too niuch) should be allowed so that the coat might set through and through. It is inconvenient, of course, but, if one would suffer this slight inconvenience, it would add two or three years to the life of the paint." All this is assuming, of course, that the paint used is the very best to be had. The purest of white lead and the purest of linseed oil unmixed with any cheaper of the cheap mixtures, often known as "White Lead," and oil which has been doctored with fish oil, venzine, com on or other of the adulterants known to the trade are used, all the precautions of the skilled painter are useless to prevent the cracking and peeling which make houses unsightly in a year or so and, therefore, make painting bills too frequent and costly. House owner should have his painter bring the ingredients to the premises separately, white lead of some well known reliable brand and linseed oil of equal quality and mix the paint just before applying it. Painting need not be expensive and unsatisfactory if the old painter's suggestions are followed.

PECULIAR MEANS OF DEFENSE

Small Daggers of Light Sent Out by the Centipede.

Among the peculiar powers of mals there are none harder to explain than the power of being self-luminous. It is sometimes termed phosphorescence, but it is not now supposed to depend upon phosphorus in the animal. A correspondent of Nature describes her experience with a luminous centipede which shows the evident purpose of the luminous substance as a means of defense. Attention was first attracted by a light of brilliant bluish-green that moved forward over the gravel, leaving behind a trail of light, which, gradually separating, became a scattered mass of brilliant points. The scattered ponts proved to be red ants, which were pursuing the centipede. It had discharged this luminous liquid over them. The centipede was picked up and put in a tumbler where it flashed out a mass of light. When the hand was placed over the tumbler to prevent the escape of the captive, a strange prickly sensation was felt as from a slight charge of electricity. The centipede would writhe the light out of its body in blue-green flashes until it had exhausted its luminosity and ceased to shine. Defense seems certainly to be one of the uses of this secretion.



FINEST TROUT IN THE WORLD

Found in Small Stream in the High Sierras, Says Expert.

The finest trout in the world, says Dr. Barton W. Evermann of the bureau of fisheries, is to be found in a little stream of the high Sierras in southern California called Volcano creek. The trout is named the "golden trout," ,and in beauty of coloring gameness and delicacy of flavor it has no equal.

So far as is known, it exists only in this stream, which is about 20 riles in length. President Roosevelt recently called attention of the bureau of fisheries to this unique specimen. with the result that Dr. Evermann was sent to California to study its habits and environment and to see whether it might not be introduced elsewhere.

He reports that the trout is in danger of extermination and that fishing in the stream must be prohibited by the state of California for three years if the trout is to be saved. Dr. Evermann has also recommended that the bureau of fisheries undertake the artificial propagation of the trout and co-operate with the state of California in transplating it to a number of barren streams that can be easily reached.-National Geographic Maga-

FLOOD DAMAGE IN TEXAS

COLORADO RIVER MANY MILES WIDE IN SOUTHERN TEXAS.

Two Hundred Miles of Railway Track Washed Out-Heavy Loss of Live Stock.

Fort Worth, Tex.-Five people are known to have been drowned. hundreds were rendered homeless, and \$500,000 worth of property was destroyed as the result of a flood in south Texas, when the Colorado river was forced out of its banks by heavy

It is believed that the worst disaster since the Galveston flood has visited Texas. Relief trains are cut off, telegraph and telephone wires are down ,and the fate of the inhabitants of several isolated towns is unknown.

The rush of water came without warning, and inhabitants at San Anrelo and Ballinger were forced to flee for safety in their night clothes. An entire family at Ballinger named Cook were drowned as they attempted to leave their home on an improvised raft which struck an obstruction.

The Colorado is from four to six miles wide in places and the tributaries south are out of their banks. Two thousand cattle were killed. The Santa Fe track bridges were washed out, and traffic is at a standstill. Persons made homeless sought refuge in churches. Provisions and clothes were rushed to the scene of the disaster

Twelve inches of rain fell all over south Texas causing all rivers to overflow their banks. Relief trains were rushed out, but were unable to reach their destination. Rescue parties in boats are going from house to house, taking people from second stories and carrying the dead to morgues.

Heartrending scenes were witnessed in towns where lost children were hunting parents. It is estimated that 200 miles of track were washed out.
