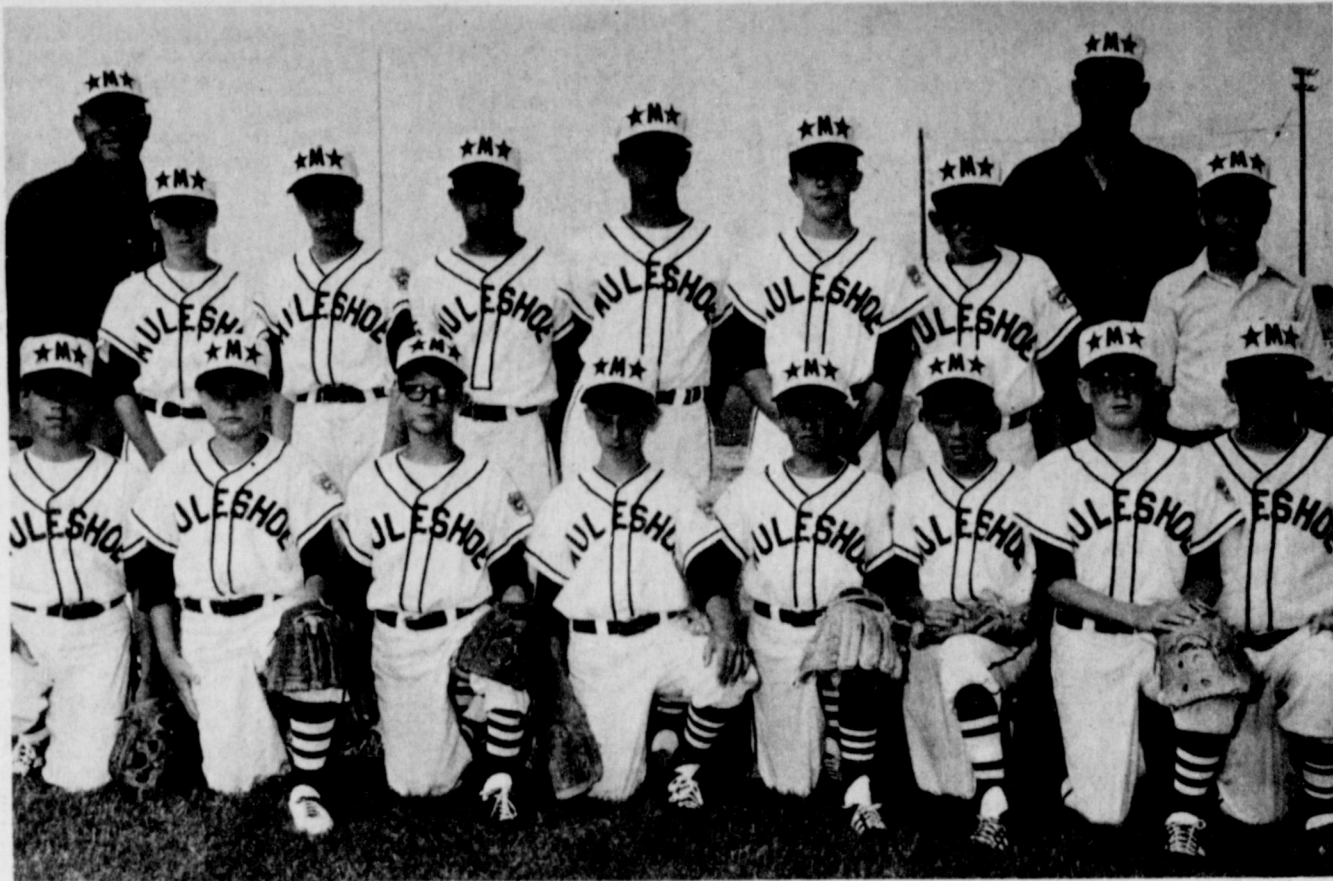

## Rain Amounts Vary Throughout County

Turbulent thunderstorms raked the Bailey County area Monday night bringing moderate to heavy rains, some hail and a reported funnel.

Rain reports in the county varied from just a sprinkle to as much as one eight inch report.

There were also reports of some hail damage north of Muleshoe. At Clay's Corner they received 4.1 inches Monday with very little hail but strong winds. They also reported showers Wednesday morning.

W.D. Lackey, 20 miles southwest of Muleshoe reported .9 inches Monday night at their home and an inch and a half at their farm two miles east of them.

George Gross, 11 miles northwest of Muleshoe reported only a shower Monday night, while at Progress more rain was reported.

Troy Thomas, eight miles northeast of Muleshoe reported .8. The heavy rains north of town caused water to flow over state Highway 214 for a time late Monday night and early Tuesday morning, blocking traffic for several hours.

Mrs. John Blackman, three miles west of Bula reported 3 inches of rain Monday night. On their farm east of Bula they received 1.7 inches.

Mrs. Fred Kelley in Maple reported 1.7 inches Monday and Harvey Blackstone in Enochs reported 1.50 Monday and it was raining Wednesday morning again.

Several people in the Muleshoe area reported seeing a funnel cloud hanging ominously just northwest of town around 9:45 Monday night. The funnel never dropped to the ground in this vicinity.

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# School Board Approves Dress Policy For School

The Muleshoe Independent Board of Trustees met Monday night, July 17.

First on the agenda was the current financial report where the board reviewed budget balances of each category or operating fund and amended and added funds for summer programs; reviewed bank balances of all funds; approved payment of current bills; and heard a report on current and delinquent tax collections of which 94.83 per cent of current taxes have been collected.

The board opened sealed bids for supplying milk for the lunchroom for the 1972-73 school year. A bid of .0775 cents per half pint was awarded to the Bordan Milk Company. Last year's price was .075. Other bids submitted included Plains Milk Company, .07905; Price's .088; Bell's, .0775; Cloverlake, .0775.

The board also approved the employment of Ronnie Jones, er assistant principal and teacher at Junior High. He taught and coached in the Muleshoe Junior High for five years. For the past three years, he has been teaching and coaching in the Lubbock Public Schools. He has a Masters Degree in Administration from Eastern New Mexico University.

The official budget hearing for the 1972-73 school year will be held at a special meeting Friday, August 18, 1972, at 8 p.m. at the school Administration office.

The board set a special meeting for Monday, August 28, at 6:30 a.m. to hear and approve the amended budget for current school year, 1971-72.

The board reviewed the progress of the summer maintenance program. At junior high, the library and room 14 was painted; the shelving of Mrs. Watson's office was completed and the workroom and store room painted. At high school, three rooms to be paneled were completed; painting at the library is to begin this week; front of band hall and the bus garage is to be black topped; drapes have been installed in the auditorium.

itorium; the shelving of the P.E. storage rooms is not yet completed; and the door and partition in the gym corridor for storage is incomplete. At Richard Hills, the playground has been blacktopped and the irrigation well will be replaced this week. In all of the schools, some desk tops are being re-finished and all floors and corridors have been polished and waxed.

Members of the board reviewed the proposed, tentative estimated budget for the 1972-73 school year.

Contracts for business office personnel and other auxiliary personnel including secretaries, janitors, cafeteria manager, bus foreman and mechanic were signed.

The Student Dress Policy was reviewed and discussed and the board amended one item to read "Boys hair length may not be concealed with any artificial means such as wigs, head bands, etc."

The entire policy reads: "In the interest of educational atmosphere, dignity of the individual decency and pride in our schools and community, the following dress policy for students will be followed:

No shorts or 'cut-offs' of any kind are to be worn by either boys or girls.

No mini skirts are to be worn. Girl's skirts and dresses may be worn no shorter than four inches above the top of the knee cap when measured from the standing position. Longer skirts are more desirable.

Boys haircuts must be at least one half inch above the eye in front, trimmed in back so that hair does not lay on shirt collars, trimmed on sides so that hair does not touch or overlap ears, sideburns trimmed no lower than in line with bottom of ear, and hair length may not be concealed with any artificial means such as wigs, head bands, etc.

Blouses and shirt tails designed to be worn inside of skirts or trousers must be worn in that manner. Blouses and shirt tails designed to be worn on outside of skirt or trousers must cover the 'midriff and backs, in the standing, sitting or bending position.

No conspicuous or ridiculous costumes can be worn that will distract other students attention and detract from a learning environment.

The factors that should be considered in selecting clothing and determining over all good grooming that will contribute to a good learning atmosphere are: neatness, cleanliness, comfortableness, trimness, modesty, discretion, and non-embarrassment to the wearer or others."

# A History Of Bailey County

## Pioneer Families

### Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Bearden

Hiram Boone Bearden was born in Taylorville, Illinois on March 20, 1873. He was married to Lila May Grant on May 17, 1897, in Crete, Nebraska. Bearden was one of the first pioneers to move his family across the Plains to Bailey County.

In March, 1908, an immigrant train brought the Hiram Bearden family to Bovina from Dorchester, Nebraska, where they settled at "Old Hurley," the first settlement just northwest of present-day Muleshoe. The Beardens came to "Old Hurley" after Bearden's boss had bought the town-site and asked him to come out here and run the Hurley Hotel. At the time Bearden brought his family to the Plains, the family consisted of Bearden, Mrs. Bearden and six children. The children were Frank Grant, W. Russell Bearden still living in Muleshoe; C. Edward Bearden, Salem, Ore., Vern Bearden, Lubbock; Mrs. Leota Wilterding, Muleshoe; Mrs. Ernest (Emma) Myers, Omack, Wash.; and Mrs. Cecil (Mabel) Robison, Spokane, Wash. Born after arriving in the county were Mrs. Henry A. (Helen) Cox, Omack, Wash., and Mrs. Richard (Ruth) Rocky, Omack.

Mrs. Cox was born in May, 1910, and was the fourth child born in what is now Bailey County. The first child born in the county was Mary Snyder Woods, and the second and third children were Francis Gaede and Donald Burhman.

"Exciting to a young, big-eyed girl, recalls Mrs. Henry A. (Helen Bearden) Cox, of her young life in equally young Bailey County. "We remember Charley and Jess Walker, Art Ryan, Ab LaVigne, George Richardson, Jesse Suggs, Charley and Cecil Boyles and Harold and Chester Mardis. In our eyes, they were heroes. They were big, stout wonderful men who could do anything and who treated little girls to biggy-back and horseback rides," related Mrs. Cox.

Mrs. Cox recalled that her father and brothers hauled freight from Bovina and Texico for the settlers, helped build the railroad when it came through Bailey County, broke land for the settlers and worked on the ranches.

Mrs. Bearden ran the hotel at Old Hurley and Mrs. Cox said, "Old Hurley was a favorite stopping place for cowboys from near and far ranches. They were hungry for home life and mamma promptly mothered every one of them. At the time of her death, who was Mother Bearden to hundreds of young men who had lived in our home and community over the years."

Mrs. Leota Wilterding remembered a story about C.E. Bearden being bitten by a rattlesnake as he sat on the front porch of the Hurley Hotel. Mrs. Wilterding also recalls the time little Frances Gaede was lost and was not found until the next morning.

Russell Bearden related, "A July 4 picnic was held at Old Hurley in 1908. Press Abbot, foreman of the YL (Muleshoe) Ranch brought horses to race (not for money) and a collection was taken to raise money for a prize. A collection also provided money to buy a 300 pound cake of ice and sugar, at Texico so the settlers could have a giant ice cream supper." Numerous such fairs and picnics were held from 1908 until about 1924.

This is one in a series of historical biographies of Bailey County pioneer families who arrived here prior to 1930.

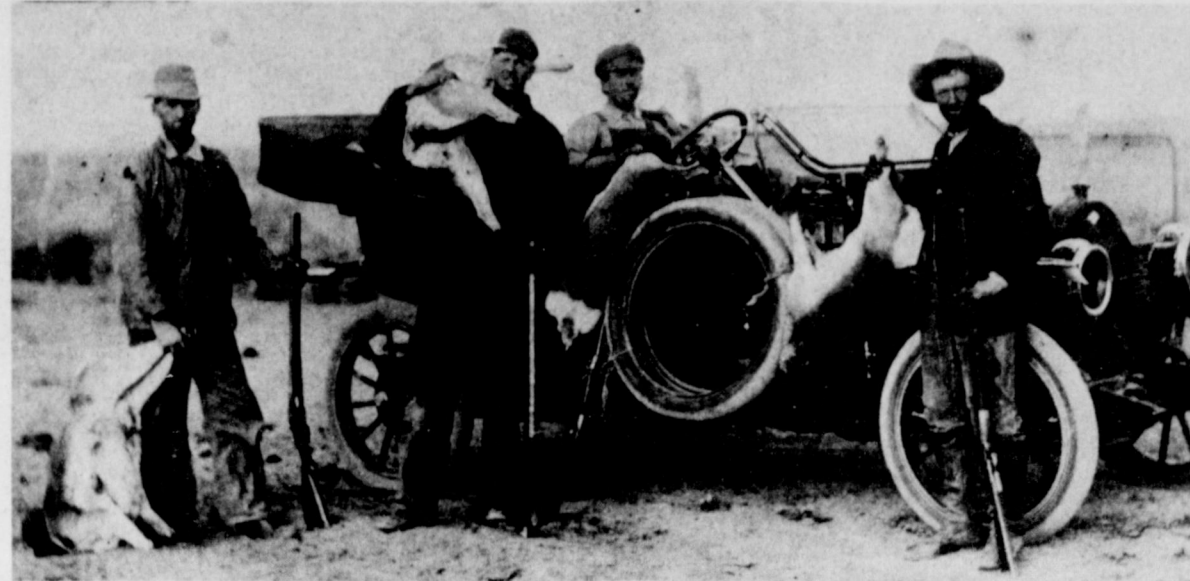

### Mrs. Bishop Retires From Texas A & I Position

KINGSVILLE--One of the familiar faces will soon fade from the Texas A&I University Campus when Carrie Lee Bishop, dean of women, steps down from the post she has occupied for 21 years. A retirement dinner for Dean Bishop is scheduled July 15 in Martin Hall.

Serving in a variety of positions during her 22 years of service at A&I, Mrs. Bishop is regarded by her co-workers as a willing worker with a ready smile.

"I never saw a person who was more devoted and loyal to the school. She was ready to attempt to do the very best she could for the university and especially the women students," said Dr. Ernest H. Poteet, A&I president emeritus, who was president of A&I when Mrs. Bishop was employed during 1950.

Dr. James C. Jernigan, chancellor of the Texas A&I University System, said, "Being a dean of women is no easy task. To me she has been a lady of great dignity, always well-groomed and has set a very high moral example for our students. We definitely will miss her..."

Serving under two A&I presidents, Poteet and Jernigan, Mrs. Bishop has been active in Greek, service organizations and professional organizations during her career.

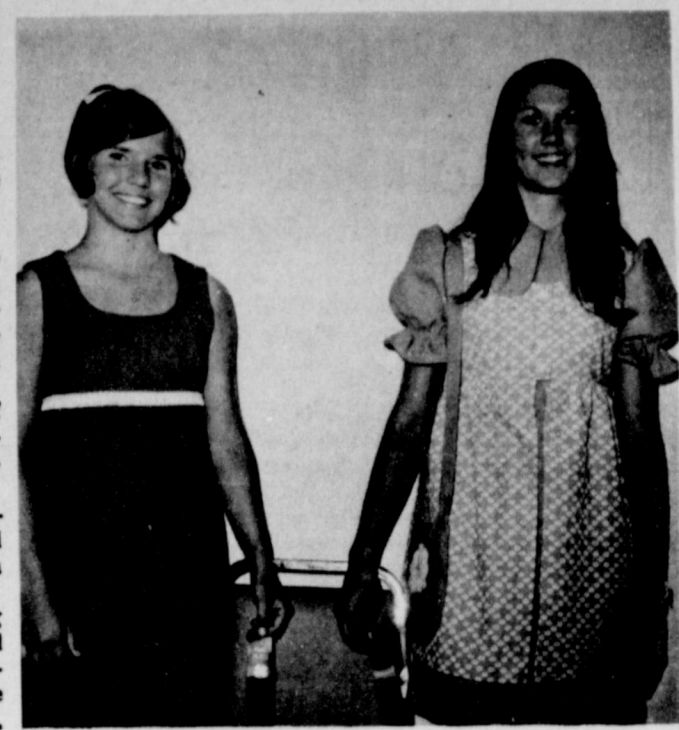

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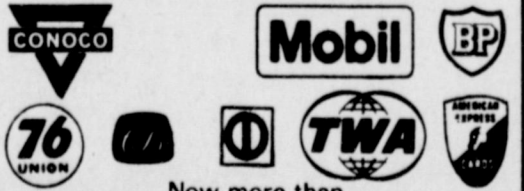

**AUSTIN, Tex.**--Parks and Wildlife Commissioners presented Texans twin surprises with the announcement of the purchase of beachfront property in Jefferson County for an off-shore park and a decision to buy the controversial, long-debated Mustang Island property in Nueces County for another beach park.

The Jefferson County purchase of 14,360 acres includes a five and a half mile waterway to the beachfront with a vast saltwater marsh inland. The \$2,154,000 purchase lies due south of Port Arthur and stretches from the intracoastal waterway to the Gulf of Mexico.

Palo Duro State Park, in the Panhandle near Canyon and Amarillo, still holds its ranking as biggest of the state parks with 15,103 acres.

The Mustang Island purchase, delayed by court wrangles for nearly two and a half years, if no new stumbling blocks suddenly appear, will cost about \$600,000 less than the original \$4.2 million asking price of the island property owner, Mrs. Sam E. Wilson Jr. of Corpus Christi.

The amount of property involved is less than the original 3,965 acres the state was looking at. Seems a survey of the property revealed the state already owned some of the property. Per acre price, however, remains the same--\$1,100.

Announcement of the Mustang purchase came after Parks Commissioners asked Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin if he was sure he was right when he ruled earlier the state has a legal binding contract with Mrs. Wilson to purchase the property.

Martin agreed to review his own opinion, did, and told Parks Commissioners he was right the first time.

**"State Hunts 'Choo Choo' Train"**--Gov. Preston Smith has asked the U.S. Navy to make available to the state of Texas surplus authentic steam locomotives for the 33.7 state-owned railroad between Rusk and Palestine in East Texas as a tourist attraction. The Legislature last year said the Parks Department could operate the full gauge railroad as a public recreational facility.

The Parks Department is currently rehabilitating 26 miles of the railroad and hopes to operate public excursion trains using historically authentic steam locomotives.

Smith wrote to Navy officials saying he has been informed several military steam engines have been declared surplus and asked for assistance in acquiring one or two of the "iron horses."

**"Drug Funds Granted State"**--Texas is one of three states selected by the federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration to take part in a pilot program designed to stop the flow of legal drugs into illegal channels.

Texas Criminal Justice Council will be funded \$333,011 to be subgranted to the Texas Department of Public Safety to operate a diversion investigation unit. Primary goal is to curtail diversion of controlled substances at the retail level. It is estimated by federal officials that half the illicitly produced amphetamines and barbiturates are diverted to the illicit market.

Headquarters will be in Austin, with target cities to be chosen over the state to assure widespread coverage, officials say. Michigan and Mississippi are the other two pilot program states.

**"Farm/Ranch Safety Week"**--Fires, drownings and machinery and tractor accidents continue to be the main sources of accidental deaths on Texas farms and ranches, the Texas Safety Association says.

The Association hopes to focus public attention on the continuing upward trend of deaths in nearly every category during Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week, July 25-31.

TSA spokesmen say 35 deaths were recorded last year from fires, explosions or burns on farms and ranches in the state. Other leading causes of accidental death last year on farms and ranches included 29 drownings, 28 accidental shootings, 26 machinery accidents, 22 tractor accidents, 22 falls and 17 accidents involving animals.

**"Vegetable Inspection Studied"**--Importation and exportation of vegetables to other states is being scrutinized by a special House Interim Committee on Vegetable Marketing.

The Committee in a recent hearing heard witnesses complain that vegetable growers in Mexico enjoy tremendous competitive advantage with Texas growers not only because of low labor costs, but because they are not subject to the rigid government regulations restricting use by American growers of many chemical pesticides and herbicides.

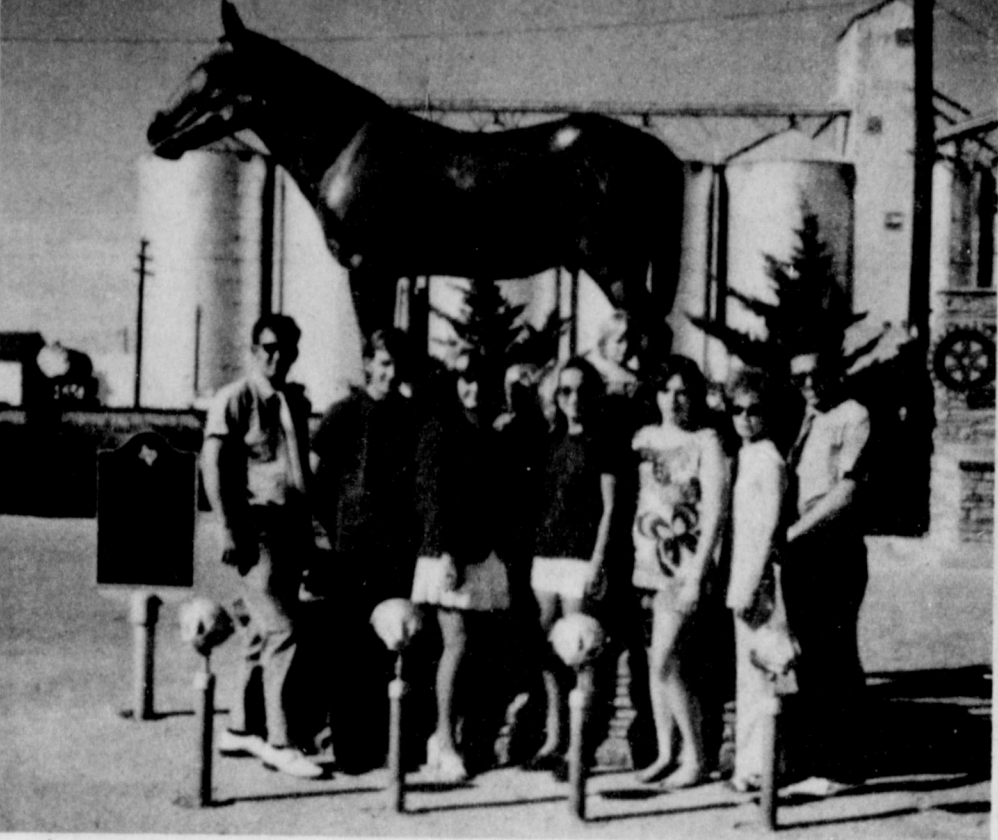
Another problem reviewed by the Committee was the claim by witnesses that the reputation of Texas-produced vegetables is suffering in out-of-state markets because some Texas growers persist in shipping large volumes of low-grade products. The result, witnesses said, is loss by Texas growers of the out-of-state markets because the produce of "certain other states is consistently of higher quality and desirability.

Most practical solution, suggested witnesses, would be establishment of market orders to establish and enforce standard quality grades for Texas-grown vegetables and inspection of imported vegetables from Mexico.

**"Money Granted For Alcohol Abuse Study"**--Texas is the first state in the nation to be awarded federal funds for prevention, treatment, education and rehabilitation programs to deal with alcohol abuse and alcoholism.

The \$1.6 million grant will go to the Texas Commission on Alcoholism which in accordance with new federal law developed and submitted the first state plan for such a program.

The TCA estimates there are 425,000 alcoholic persons in Texas, equivalent to about 3.8 per cent of the state's population.
