It is probable, however, that just a bit more attention tha formerly will be given to revenue legislation. Today it seems quite probable that the blanket prumary bills will get a bearing in both houses durplatform demands that the legisla. ture shall amend the election law so as to provide for nominations by direct yote without the intervention of conventions, and by a majority vote. Both of these majority vote. Both of these
bills, however, provide for nommations by plarality vote; that is to say, that the candidate receiring the largest number of votes shall be the nominee. The sentiment in favor of that plan seem o be quite large, the argumen ions by direct vote can only ande through second primaries o preferential ballot, and that both plans are unduly cumbersome, and is further argued that the people will have larger voice in direct y rule than they have had hereto ore under the convention system or the mixed system.

Dallas, Texas, March 6.-Today was regular opinion day of the court of crimina! appeals and a number of important cases were disposed of by the court. One of the most important of these was the affirming of the case of A.S. Busby of Houston county. Busby, it will be remembered, was assistant financial agent of the penitentiaries of Texas under W. M. C Hill.
He was indicted on the charge of embezzlement, the charge being that be misapplied and wrongfully converted to his own use public funds aggregating $\$ 7500$, He was tried and convicted on this charge and found guilty, his punishment being assessed at three years' confinement in the penitentiary. The case was tried at Crockett, in Houston county, a number of
months ago and was brought before the higher court in an effort to secure a new trial.

and Judge Davidson dissented.
