WHEN FERTILIZERS SHOULD BE

As a general rule, which has but few exceptions, the greater part of the fer-tilizer should be applied to the soil before planting the crop it is intended to benefit. This rule is not only in accord with theoretical considerations, but is also abuniantly sustained in actual practice, as shown by carefully conducted field ex-

periments instituted for the express purpose of ascertaining the truth, says Hon. R. J. Redding, Director Georgia Experiment Station, Department of Agriculture, in Virginia-Carolina Fertilizer Almanac.

The theory underlying the rule is the fact that most of the ingredients composing a commercial fertilizer are not immediately soluble and available, but must undergo certain chemical changes in the undergo certain chemical changes in the soil before the plant food will be in the proper condition to be taken up by the roots of the plants. This is particularly roots of the plants. This is particularly true in regard to salts of potash, and in less degree to acid phosphate. It is a fact, also, that some forms of potash, notably kainit, cause chemical changes in the condition of the plant food already present in a soil, whereby the before insoluble and non-available plant food already in the soil, becomes available. The organic substances which are large-

The organic substances which are largely used in the make up of commercial fertilizers for the purpose of supplying nitrogen to the plants—such as cotton-seed meal, dried blood, fish scrap, tankage, etc., also require time in which to undergo chemical decomposition and such change of form as will enable the roots to appropriate the nitrogen. Even sulphate of ammonia, a highly soluble chemical sait, which sometimes enters into the composition of a fertilizer in a very limited amount, must undergo a complete chemical decomposition in the soil before the plants can really any use of the nitrogen. the plants can make any use of the nitro-gen, which it contains in the form of ammonia sulphate. This must be con-verted into nitrate, or nitrate of lime, Nitrate of soda is the one chemical fertilizer sait that is immediately avail-

ble, producing a very prompt effect when

able, producing a very prompt effect when applied to a growing crop (and it should be applied to none other).

Acid phosphate and potash may be applied to the soil and bedded on from two to six weeks before planting time. It is claimed by some experts that potash saits may be applied with better results even several months before planting. A more practical and convenient rule, however, is to apply a complete fertilizer from one to three weeks before planting the crop, when the latter is a corn, cotthe crop, when the latter is a corn, cotton, tobacco, or other summer-growing crop, always taking care to mix the fertilizer thoroughly with the soil of the open bedding furrow in which it shall be applied and then "listing," or throwing

Experiments on the farm of the Georgia Experiment Station, projected for the purpose of comparing on the one hand the effectiveness of a complete fertilizer applied two weeks before planting, and, on the other hand, the effectiveness of the same quantity of the same fertilizer applied in the furrows with the seed, were followed by an unexpected and surprising result—viz., the cotton seeds planted on the plats in which the fertilizer had been applied and bedded on two weeks before, came up quicker and gave a more uniform stand of more vigorous plants than resulted on the plats in which the fertilizer was applied in the furrows two furrows on it. the fertilizer was applied in the furrows with the seeds. While this result was not contempiated, it was quickly explained by the fact that the fertilizer that had been in the ground two weeks had under-

been in the ground two weeks had undergone the chemical changes aiready alluded to, and its plant food was ready for the immediate wants of the young plants. This result suggests that it may be expedient, in any case, to apply a small quantity—say 20 to 25 pounds—of nitrate of sods in the same furrow with the cotton or corn seeds, which may be done with perfect safety with cotton seeds, and without danger to corn if not placed in immediate contact with the seed. APPLYING FERTILIZER AT THE TIME OF PLANTING.

Time of Planting.

This may be understood to mean either applying the fertilizer, bedding on it and immediately planting the seed; or it may refer to the practice of putting the fertilizer in the furrow with the seed. In the latter case, there is always a manifest danger that the coming growing season may be unusually dry, in which event the fertilizer, being so lightly covered, may not be dissolved and properly disseminated through the soil. It may also follow that the fertilizer being so concentrated—en masse, as it were—around the tender rootlets of the young plants that the latter may be injured, or "burned"—a not inconsiderable danger. The plan is not advisable except when a very light application is to be made per acre. This caution is especially applicable to seeds that are planted in very shallow furrows and bût lightly covered, such as cotton, and it is generally safer to interpose some soil, or, better, deposit the fertilizer in one furrow and plant the seeds in a furrow immediately beside; or, vice versa, plant the seeds first in the furrow, and then the fertilizer no then plant the seeds it. But the preferred plan is to bed on the fertilizer, and then plant the seeds in the furrow with the cotton seeds; but it was "away back" in the late sixties and early seventies when fertilizers soid at \$40 to \$60 a 'complete' fertilizer per acre in the furrow with the cotton seeds; but it was "away back" in the late sixties and early seventies when fertilizers soid at \$40 to \$60 a ton, and very light applications were supposed to be in the interest of a wise economy. We did not know much about fertilizers in those days, and were afraid to "put too much guano on the cotton." That time has passed and gone, and the up-to-date farmer has found that 500 and 500 pounds of fertilizer for cotton. a properly balanced high-grade fertilizer, to sach acre of cotton is not dangerous or sacessive, but simply liberal and judicious. Indeed, it is a question of simple arithmetic, if 100 pounds per acre is profitable, and it cost This may be understood to mean either

Now, the well-informed farmer only wants to know if the fertilizer be properly balanced for the crop he wishes to grow, and is sold at a fair price, and he invests liberally, just as he would do in buying anything at such a price that he may sell at a profit of from 50 to 100 per bentum and upward. A high-grade, honest fertilizer will meet this requirement. There is another justification for the practice of applying fertilizers at the time of planting—vis., when the farmer has falled to put in his order at the proper time. He may then, according to the proverb—"better late than not at all"—put in the fertilizer with the seed, or as the time of planting.



MATTERS OF GENERAL SANITARY IMPORTANCE.

Proper Care of the Bathroom and Its Appurtenances-To Clean Incandescent Mantles-Getting Rid of Ants.

Besides the stationary belongings to the bathroom-tubs, shower bath, lavatory and closet-there should be a room completely furnished, a soap dish, spongeholder, solled linen basket, tumbler holder, robe book, match box, and tollet paper holder. Each one of these articles should be kept in order with exactness and regularfty. Plenty of soap and warm water should be used on the enameled work, with occasional additions of ammonia The nickel plating should be rubbed with a soft dry cloth, whiting being used as a polisher.

Patent prescriptions for nickel plate should be avoided, as they often contain an acid that destroys the metal Sanifary plumbing is of such great importance in building a house every item that makes for show should be cut out if it deprives the bathroom of the best class of work. To clean incandescent mantels, first remove the globe, then lift off the remaining parts, and place on a table. Take off the chimney, then with a hatpin put half way through the cord at the top of the mantle, lift off carefully and place each end of the pin on the side of a tumbler, the mantle hanging down between them. Then pour carefully over the mantle a little mythelated spirits. Remove the film and with a soft brush clean the mantlo. Then apply a lighted match to burn the spirits off mantle (as when new). Clean the chimney with a little of the spirits left in tumbler, then the

Replace both, and you will have a beautiful, clear light and your mantle will last at least a few months longer. Be careful not to put a lighted match near the spirits.

In cleaning a stopped waste pipe, first remove the grate in the sink. Get three round pieces of leather plece of broom handle one and oneshalf feet long, and place the three pleces of leather on top of each other. Drive a long nall through the center and into the end of the handle. Insert in the waste pipe and move quickly up and down.

To eliminate ants, the surest way la to find the nest and destroy it. 




