there ever existed such a thing as with the proceedings of the legislature, and if ever a bill of any kind in which the Contederate soldier or Confederate pension

Now, we have a law on our Now, we have a law on our
statute books called the Confederste pension law, which is a misnomer. It should have read "the pauper's pension law," and it really does not apply to a large portion of that class, as it is conpass upon them, as there are quite pass upon them, as there are quite
a number of them in this section of the State who have been turned of the State who have been turned
down because they own a few down hecause they own a few
acres of poor land, from which they derive no benefit whatever, as they are not able to work it and not financially able to hire it done. not financialy able to hire
This class are living off their chilThis class are living off their chil-
dren or their neighbors, while others who have been wounded and are at the present suffering more or less from such wounds, of the law, draw it if they are one month, or even less, under 60 years of age, while others who
were in the detail service spent their whole time in manufacturing arms and ammunition and other supplies for the government are curned down, even if they can take
the pauper's oath, because there is no provision in the pauper's pen sion for those who labored for the success of t.
battlefieid.
Now, Mr. Editor, would it not be better to have no pension law han to have one that requires the old soldier to be a pauper and
