Our Public School Histories.

Crockett, Texas, Oct. 13, 1907.

MR. EDITOR:

I notice in last issue of Courier a kindly suggestion to the Daughters of the Confederacy, in regard to the histories used in our public schools, suggesting "that the Daughters of the Confederacy appoint standing committee, whose duty it will be to examine such books and approve unqualifiedly or condemn them without qualification." This is all right, Mr. Editor, and we thank you for the kindly and patriotic interest manifested, at the same time wish to inform you that the Daughters of the Confederacy, where there is representation in state or division, has a standing text-book committee, whose duty it is to examine all books used in the schools referring to the history of the war between the states and see that an impartial history be taught in the schools, or know the reason why it is not done. Our Texas Division has such standing text-book committee of capable women, with the talented, gifted woman, Mrs. Mary Hunt Affleck, chairman. In their last report they condemn Barnes, Montgomery and Channing's histories of the United States and insist upon their expulsion from our schools, and give all honor to the Confederate soldiers of Temple and Belton who demanded the expulsion of such from their schools. In this report they recommend some of the best histories that are non-partisan and impartial. I will be pleased, Mr. Editor, to furnish you with this report of our text-book committee as adopted by our convention last December, that you may know what the Texas Division is doing in this very important matter.

We have four large working chapters in Washington City, composed of some of the brainiest and best women of the nation. Names of chapters: Albert Sidney Johnson, Jeff Thompson, Robert E. Lee, Southern Cross and Stonewall Jackson Chapters, and I have no doubt but that these chapters,

with the Confederate soldiers living in Washington, will take prompt action on expulsion of histories from the schools in that city for the cause mentioned, viz: "That these histories mention the historical fact that Gen. Lee was tendered full command of all forces at time operating against the Confederate armies."

The Cotton Situation.

It is believed by some of our leading business men that the impression prevails in the East that much more cotton is being held by the farmers than is in reality being held. While it is true that a comparatively small amount of cotton has been sold, it is also equally as true that a very small crop has been made. A few weeks since the Courier reported that Crockett had received about a thousand bales and that half of that amount was being held in storage. Taking this as a basis of estimation, it would seem that half of the cotton crop of Houston county had been sold at that time and the Courier believes now that over half of the crop has been sold at this time. The bankers say they do not feel what money has been advanced on cotton and that what they have advanced so far is no burden to them. The prevailing depression in the cotton market is believed by some of our business men to be caused largely by an over-estimation of the size of the crop in Texas and by the false impression that has gone out to and through the East that the Texas crop is being held solidly. When the East realizes the shortness of the crop in Texas, and wakes up to the fact that, while some cotton is being held, there is not a great deal to hold, then the price will go up and not until then will it do so. At least this is the opinion of some of our citizens and the Courier shares in the same opinion.

Criminal District Court.

The criminal docket of district court was taken up Monday morning and by Wednesday afternoon two cases had been disposed of and two convictions secured.

The first case gone into was that of the state against Sam Fite, a white man, charged with forgery. The verdict of the jury was two years in the penitentiary. Fite is the same man who was convicted and fined in the justice court a few months ago for driving to death a livery horse.

Isaiah Chandler, negro, was next called to trial for assault with intent to murder another of his color, Randall Vance, and given two years in the penitentiary. This case came from the eastern part of the county.

A case of absorbing interest to the morbidly inclined was the one on trial Wednesday afternoon. Turner Sharp, a young white man, was charged with assault with intent to rape a negro girl less than twelve years of age, the age of consent. The crime is alleged to have been committed at or near Porter Springs and at a time when Sharp was returning from Crockett to his home in Leon county. The case resulted Wednesday night in an acquittal.

Successful Theatrical Season.

Crockett theatre-goers have been fortunate this season in having an unusually good run of theatricals. The season opened with the Wizard of Wall Street, a comedy that made good for all it was advertised. This was followed with the Albert Taylor company in comedy and melodrama. Then came the musical comedy favorite, Mr. Allen Curtis, with a strong company of comedians and chorus singers, who appeared at the opera house Saturday night. We believe it can truthfully be said that Mr. Curtis is the cleverest comedian ever appearing on the Crockett stage. His support shows to have been carefully selected with the view of pleasing the amusement-seeking public and in this Mr. Curtis has succeeded admirably. While his chorus was not as large as that carried by some of the companies touring the larger cities, it was as large as the Crockett stage could well accommodate and there was not a bad looking girl among the

Editor Courier:

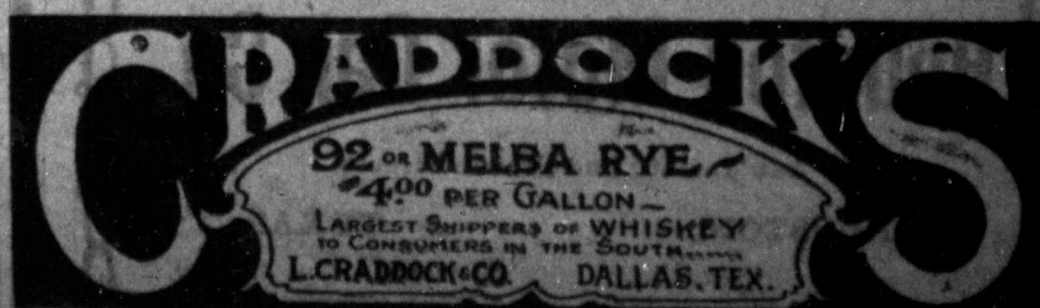

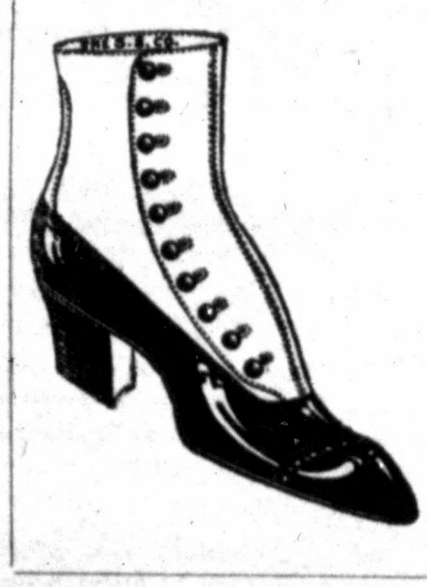

FROM ALL OVER TEXAS

W. J. Newcom and D. Quill of Terrell and other parties in the North are planning to build a railroad from Ennis to Waco.

The Fort Worth Fair closed in a blaze of glory Thursday, and already preparations are going on for the one to be held next year.

Citizens of Toyah have applied for a charter for a railroad down the Pecos Valley to Balmorhea, a distance of about forty miles.

There are over 300 State banks in operation in Texas today, the mark having been passed last week, and there are now 302 doing business in Texas.

The Fruit Belt Poultry and Pet Stock Association of Tyler is making extensive preparations for their second annual show to be held the last week of November.

W. L. Adams of Fort Worth fell dead in his yard at about noon Tuesday, and Justice Maben, who held the inquest, pronounced death due to heart failure.

A partition wall in a Corsicana building collapsed, damaging a saloon on one side some \$2000 and a paint store on the other side to the extent of a similar sum.

The Bohemian people at Creechville, seven miles east of Ennis, have recently built a Knights of Pythias hall for the use of that order and as a public meeting place.

M. E. Echols, an employe in a gin at Prosper, had his arm caught in the gin saws Thursday morning, and the member was so badly lacerated and torn that it had to be amputated.

Following the example of the other old line insurance companies, the Union Central, which has maintained offices in Texas cities, has declared its intention to withdraw from the State on January 1.

A determined effort will be made at the coming session of Congress to abolish the four negro regiments of soldiers now in the army. Representative Garner of Texas introduced a bill to this end at the last session.

Judge Bule of Stamford and Anson, representing the Texas Central Railroad, has been getting statistics of the county to present to the railroad. He says the road will be extended to a point in the pasture of the Espuela Land and Cattle Company.

It is more than probable that the State of Texas has a small amount of money tied up in the T. W. House bank, which closed its doors at Houston Thursday. On the first of the month the penitentiary board reported a balance in the House bank of \$1883.63.

While boring for water on the property of the ice plant at Teague, the second strike of oil was made, after the drills had passed through thirteen feet of lignite. The indications are, according to those who say they have had experience in oil fields, that a gusher will be brought in soon.

Authorities for the State believe they have discovered an eye-witness of the murder of Earl Mabrey near Dallas last month.

Governor Campbell has promised to officially open the Central Texas Fair at Brownwood on November 5.

Eclair, a Paris newspaper, declares M. Capezza has invented a combination aeroplane and dirigible balloon capable of carrying five passengers, in addition to 20,000 pounds and staying aloft fifteen hours.

Secretary J. Riley Green of the Greenville, Wolfe City and Bogham interurban, started out to collect the first assessment of \$25 from the subscribers, and every one paid up. That shows that the promoters mean business.

Business men and farmers have organized a commercial club at Trent. J. C. Neal was elected President and W. L. Allen Secretary. Various committees were appointed to look into matters for the welfare of the union.

The search and seizure law of Texas being used with more or less effect in Grayson and other Texas counties under the prohibition law, will likely be passed upon as to its constitutionality by the Court of Criminal Appeals at Tyler this week.

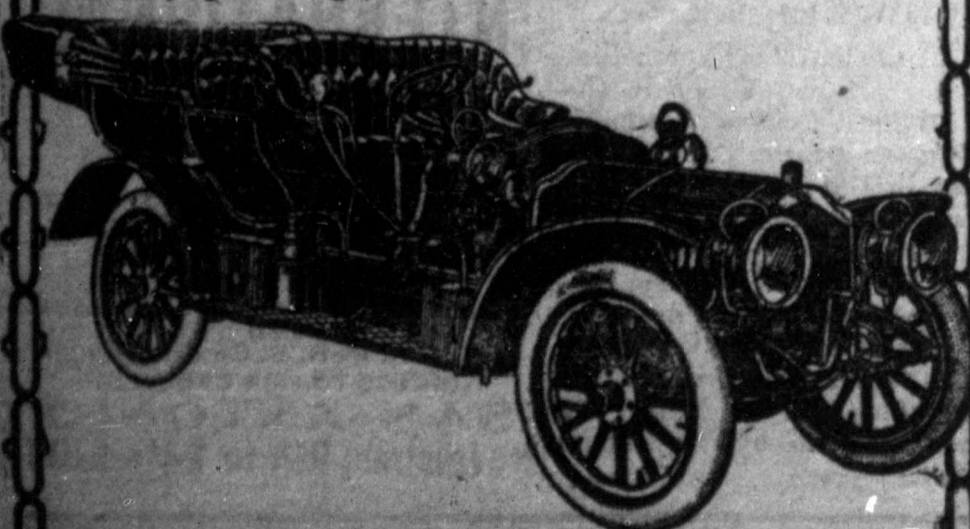

OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR BIG ATTENDANCE.

SPEAKERS OF PROMINENCE.

Hon. M. J. Sanders of Rivers and Harbors Congress on Program—Burgess is to Speak.

Houston, Tex.: The coming convention of the Interstate Inland Waterway League, which meets in Houston Nov. 8 and 9, promises to be the best and the largest attended of any held so far in the interests of the interoceanic canal. Hard work is being done by both the Texas and Louisiana executive committees, and information has been received that a lively interest is being taken in the convention in every part of the coast country in the two states.

The program for the convention is practically outlined in the following letter received by Mr. C. R. Kitchell, secretary of the Interoceanic Inland Waterway League, from Mr. C. S. E. Holland of Victoria, president:

"Victoria, Tex., Oct. 19.—Mr. C. R. Kitchell: For your information desire to say that Hon. M. J. Sanders, member of board of directors of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, will deliver an address on the subject: 'National Rivers and Harbors Congress and Its Work.' Governor Blanchard has long been an advocate of this canal, and his State (Louisiana) will have not less than 200 delegates, so Leon Locke writes me.

"Mr. Gueydan, our vice president, will deliver an address also. So will Congressman Burgess.

"Governor Campbell doesn't think he can come, but I have written again insisting. He opens the San Antonio Fair Nov. 9 and I have written him to come to Houston for the 8th, and leave that night for San Antonio in time to open the fair on the morning of the 9th.

"We are working hard and I believe we will have 700 to 1,000 delegates present on the opening day, and Houston will know that she has a convention. With best wishes.

"C. S. E. HOLLAND." "President Interstate Inland Waterway."

PRESS DAY AT THE FAIR.

They Said Nice Things to the Management—40,000 Attended.

Dallas, Tex.: This was Press Day at the State Fair, and the great institution received the hearty indorsement of the newspaper men and their fellow workers. Every section of the State was represented by the guests of honor, and a supply of 1,500 badges entitling the holder to all the privileges of the fair was exhausted before 12 o'clock. The verdict of the newspaper men is especially pleasing to the officials, inasmuch as the success of the affair depends largely upon the good will of the Texas newspapers.

Newspapers of Texas, through their weather prophets, could not have invoked more pleasing weather. The day was balmy in its early hours, and toward the middle of the afternoon it was rather too warm for wraps. This fact conduced largely to the attendance of people who were not invited guests, and it was estimated Monday night that the paid admissions exceeded 30,000, making the total attendance close to 40,000 people.

The Horse Show, which began its daily program Monday, attracted many visitors. Texas is a close competitor with Kentucky, Tennessee and Missouri in the raising of fine horses, and the collection of standard and thoroughbred entries in the live stock department at the State Fair this year is admittedly the best ever held in the South.

DALLAS COUNTY VALUATION

Harris County Made an Overestimate of About \$1,000,000.

Austin, Tex.: The tax rolls for Dallas county were received at the controller's office Monday. The rolls show an overestimate of nearly \$2,000,000. The actual valuations of Dallas county are shown to be \$58,106,100, the estimated valuation being \$60,041,430. The valuation last year was \$46,183,750, making an increase over last year of \$11,922,350.

Harris county made an overestimate of about \$1,000,000. The actual valuations of Harris county are \$60,168,342. The preliminary estimate was \$61,150,000.

Aguillar Refused Bail.

Austin, Tex.: Manuel Aguillar was refused bail. He was charged with the murder of Frank Oyervides after they had taken several drinks together. Aguillar was a deputy constable. He was remanded without bail following his examining trial.

NO DANGER OF A DEFICIT.

STATE GENERAL REVENUE FUND OVER \$700,000.

Gross Receipts Taxes Coming in Drain Period Passed and AdValorem Tax is Soon to Be Paid.

Austin, Tex.: State Treasurer Sparks stated Friday that the general revenue fund was on a splendid basis, it having a credit of something over \$700,000.

All danger of a deficit, as occurred during the past three years, has passed, and the fund is on a firm cash basis, as the crisis was gotten over and tax money will soon commence to roll in, besides the gross receipts tax laws are productive at this time.

The fund was at its lowest ebb immediately following the coming of the fiscal year on September 1, when all of the new appropriations became available and the state purchasing agent bought large amounts of supplies for the state eleemosynary institutions; with this drain weathered the fund will grow. The healthy condition of the public fund is due almost entirely to the high liquor license collected under the Baskin-McGregor law. Had it not been for that source of income the deficit might have recurred. State taxes will soon be flowing in, though January and February are the heaviest months, February usually bringing at least a million dollars for the general revenue account.

The tax collectors settle in those months, though the State depository system of direct payments may change it and the payments be credited before February. At this time, according to Treasurer Sparks, the state depositories have an average of \$44,000 each of state funds, or a total of \$1,364,000.

The limit permanent balance is \$50,000, and they must remit monthly all in excess of that amount, unless called upon to send it in sooner.

TWO VICIOUS WRENS.

Mother and Son Arrested at Natabany, La.—Terrorized Community.

Natabany, La.: In the arrest near here of Mrs. George Wren and her young son, Charles, the Tangipahoa Parish authorities allege that they have two highwaymen who have been terrorizing the people of this section of the state for some time. Holdups have been frequent, and suspicion pointed to the Wrens, who have been principals in more than one gun fight. Mrs. Wren is a crack shot. When Deputy Sheriff Watson attempted to make the arrest she reached for her rifle, but the officer was too quick for her and got the drop on her while one of his deputies covered the son with his pistol. The mother and son are now in jail in Amite City, where they were taken by a posse.

GIRL ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

Target Rifle Discharged, Bullet Striking Her in Forehead.

Alpine, Tex.: Miss Myrtle Norris, aged 15, was accidentally shot at day-break Wednesday morning and died two hours later. The mother and children left Alpine first of the week in a wagon en route to their ranch. Rain made progress slow, and Tuesday night they camped only twenty-four miles south of town, all sleeping in their wagon. On retiring Myrtle insisted that the target rifle be loaded, which was done by her younger brother under protest. Wednesday morning just after Mrs. Norris and her son had left the wagon the gun was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering the brain. The remains were laid to rest in the Alpine Cemetery Thursday.

BOILERS EXPLODE.

TWO MEN ARE KILLED IN THE DISASTER AT BELTON.

Oil Mill Plant is Wrecked—No One Living to Tell the Cause—Loss Will Be Heavy.

Belton, Tex.: At 3 o'clock Wednesday morning the boilers at the Belton oil mill exploded, instantly killing Raymond Dyer and mortally injuring Bob Owens, the negro fireman, who died at 8 o'clock. Both men had but recently come from Jacksonville, Texas, to work in the mill. Dyer leaves a widow and one child. The bodies of both will be shipped to Jacksonville. The engine room was completely wrecked, doing damage to the extent of several thousand dollars.

The plant of the Belton Cotton Oil company was a very large and complete one, and, having a large amount of seed on hand, it has been kept constantly running since the season opened. The plant was equipped with three powerful boilers, and all of these exploded, but where the break was first made is not known. The instant death of Engineer Dyer prevented any information from the skilled mechanic who had the engine room in charge, and the negro fireman, who lingered for five hours in the agonies of his injuries, was unable to answer any question regarding the accident.

The explosion came with a great deal of force. It completely wrecked the engine room building and the damage extended to other parts of the mill.

The oil mill is located east of the city a half mile. The noise of the explosion was heard in Belton, and the concussion was felt. Many were out as soon as they heard it, and relief parties were organized and went at once to the plant. The men in the night force who were at work were stunned at first by the explosion and the sudden darkness that came upon them, and then it was to get out and look for the result and do what they could for whoever might be in trouble.

The damage to the oil mill is probably covered by insurance. It will not be less than \$15,000, and may run up to \$20,000, but it is impossible to estimate it.

ROOSEVELT'S MEAT.

Shot a 375-Pound Bear as She Emerged From Cane-Brake.

Williamsport, La.: Farmers residing in the vicinity of Buckhorn Mountain, fifteen miles from here, have sent an invitation to President Roosevelt to hunt bears in Lycoming county and assist them in exterminating the pest that is destroying their corn. Many of the farmers are obliged to guard their fields at night. The farmers have issued public invitations for hunting bears on their lands.

A later arrival from Bear Lake brings the information that President Roosevelt shot the bear he killed Thursday as it came out of the cane-brake near the camp. The animal had been chased for half a day by Ben Lilley and a negro assistant. It fell after the first shot, which was planted just back of the shoulder. The animal weighed 375 pounds, which is considered large for the bears in this vicinity.

Austin Enrollment Increased.

Austin, Tex.: There are 3,012 children attending the public schools of this city, as against 2,842 last year.

Marlin Orders Water Mains.

Marlin, Tex.: An order was placed Thursday for a large quantity of water mains to be used in extending the waterworks system. Our big sixty-acre lake is nearing completion.

Heavy frosts occurred at Marshall Friday morning.

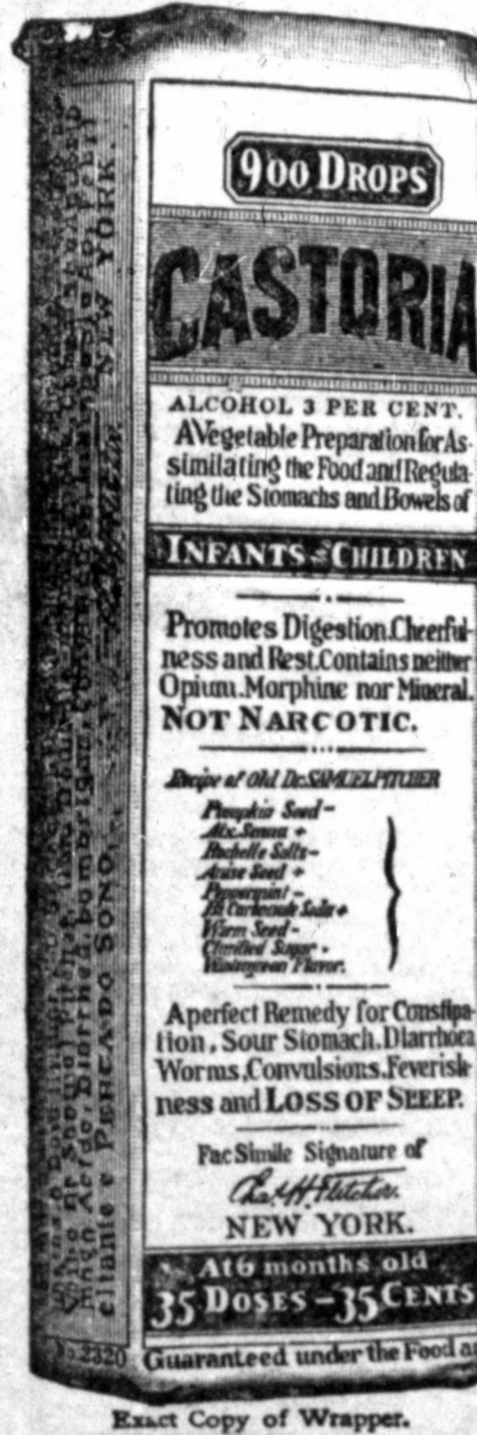
