





ALL UNITED FOR CANAL

INLAND WATERWAYS DELEGA-TION HARMONIOUS.

WILL SOON REALIZE DREAM

Congress is to Be Urged to Construct the Canal Without Delay-2,000 Were Present.

Houston, Tex.: With large delegations from almost every community along the Gulf Coast of Louisiana and Texas present, the Interstate Inland Waterways convention was called to order at Turner Hall Friday morning, and the session demonstrated that the people along the proposed route are more enthusiastoc than ever over the the prospects of securing an inside route channel for the transportation of heavy and slow moving freight along the coast between New Orleans and Brownsville. Men who have spent their lives, almost in trying to work up sentiment for the development of the warterways of the Texas coast and rivers state now that they expect to witness the realization of their dreams.

Comunity rivalry was relegated to the background in the expressions during the convention today and the importance of concerted and combined efforts for the benefit of all emphasized. Every speaker laid particular stress upon this point-that community rivalry should not deter the develipment of the coast of Texas and Louisana, and there were no dissenting voices. The sincerity of every speaker and delegate who expressed himself on this point could not be doubted, and at times the enthusiasm ran high. A more enthusiastic gathering could not have been assembled and as some one remarked, the enthusiasm was all the more remarkable when it was considered that the meeting was a waterways convention.

Of the possibilities of the waterway Congressman Burgess said in part:

"It affords me pleasure to talk on the project to which I have given much attention, a project which offers more benefit than any proposed in the country. Now what are the benefits to be derived from this project which is for a channel nine feet deep and 100 feet wide from New Orleans to Brownsville? They are local and general. Consider existing conditions. South Louisiana and South Texas are just awakening to the fact that no like territory in point of productiveness exists in America. Traversed by Inland Waterways project are the great lumber, oil, rice, sulphur and salt regions of the two states. For many miles it will tap the most productive truck lands in the world as it will the entire fish and oyster belt of the two states, and, by the way, Texas is far behind her sister states in developing her fish and oyster resources."

TEN KILLED BY EXPLOSION

Kiel, Germany: An explosion of boilers aboard the German school ship Blucher occurred Wednesday while the vessel was near Murwick, and as a result ten men are dead and about thirty others injured, several of whom, it is believed, will not recover. But for the fact that 300 of the crew were absent from the ship the casualties

would have been much greater.

Washington: Upon hearing of the disaster to the German vessel Blucher, Secretary Metcalf sent a cablegram to Lieutenant Comander Howard. American attache at Berlin, directing him to express to the officials of the German Navy over the sympathy of the American Navy over the loss of life and wounding of so many

CAVALRY CROSS MISSOURI.

Seems Likely the Utes Will Keep Troops Busy All Winter.

Omaha, Neb.: Col. Frank West and eight troops of the Second Calvary from Fort Des Moines were Wednesday ferried across the Missouri river at Forest City, opposite the Cheyenne agency in South Dakota, after reaching Gettysburg Tuesday night and marching eighteen miles across country. The command will continue the march Thursday for Thunder Butte, eighty miles further west. It now appears to the army men that the compaign against the Ute Indians may keep the soldiers busy all winter.

The two companies of the Sixteenth Infantry from Fort Crook will reach Gettysburg Thursday night.



Don't fall out with your neighbor because he does not see his way clear even yet to join the Union. If you show by the results that it is a benfit to you, he will come along all right later on, and will make a bood member when his reason is committed to the grand work of the Union.

It does look like the farmers would some time find out that it is the first law of nature to take care of ones self. Now when a county goes to work and spends thousands of dollars building courthouses while there is not a foot of decent roads in the county. some sort of an educational institution should be opened.

This affords not only the means of advancement along all lines, but it is fine diversion from the routine of life to try new things and note their economic value. Any good farmer is an experimenter next to being a good farmer.

THE FARMER MUST BEAR THE BRUNT.

The farmers who are in debt are not less furturate than those who must suffer because of the indebtedness.

During the recent flurry on Wall street the government of the United States, our land of the free and home of the brave, went down into the treasury and handed out millions of dollars of the people's money to aid the banks and speculators of the east to hold their stocks and bonds and not be required to sell at a sacrifice.

The report has gone forth that the banks of the South will refuse to make further advances on cotton in order to force the farmers to sell at a sacrifice, and thus bring the money into the country at once, and relieve the financial strain.

This report caused Congressman Burleson, of Texas, to ask the government to distribute \$10,000,000 among southern banks to relieve the strain and keep them from forcing the cotton on the market. But the government has already reduced its surplus to what is termed "working capital," and could not accommodate the producers of wealth.

PUBLIC HAS RIGHT TO KNOW.

Fruthful Labels on Canned Goods Is a Regulsite.

Determined effort is being made by the manufacturers of canned goods throughout the country to induce the secretary of agriculture to defer the enforcement of the provision of the pure food act which requires the label on canned goods to state "the substance of the product and the place of manufacture." The chief argument used in making the appeal is that the manufacturers have already had printed labels, costing at least \$500,-000, that would be lost by the enforcement of the act. The argument of the canners will

not hold. They have had ample notice of the operation of the law and all of its provisions, and it must be their loss if they have not made preparations for observing the federal act. Incidentally, the fact that their present labels do not meet the requirements of the law, in other words, do not state in subsance the contents of the can, is the best argument in the world for the destruction of the labels and the printing of new ones that will give the customer some substantial hint of what he is buying. The time is past when a manufacturer can mix a little water and glucose and label it "Pure Vermont Maple Syrup," or pass canned rabbit off for "Select Canned Chicken." The man or woman who buys "Choice Canned Veal" wants some assurance that the can is not filled with goat meat or something less palatable. When the purchaser pays the price for a big tin of "York State Apples" he does not want to be disturbed and angered by opening it to find it filled with parodies on the original Garden of Eden fruit.

BRAW \$1,000 A WEEK.

STATE TREASURER CALLS UPON DEPOSITORIES FOR CASH.

Draft on the Treasury at This Time Is Not Very Heavy, and Will Not Be Until Dec. 1.

Austin, Tex.: State Treasurer Sparks will make a request for \$1,000 from each State depository with which to pay current warrants for the month. This will make \$31,000 a week, and with the ordinary run of business will be sufficient to cash warrants for the month. It is not known if the banks can comply with the request, or if they will do so. There are but' few outstanding warrants at this time, and the State Treasury is embarrassed but little because of the situation.

On Dec. 1 the demand on the treasury will be rather heavy, owing to the many warrants which will be issued to State employes. It is probable that the State Treasurer will have sufficient cash to meet all warrants by the first of next month.

With the exception of a few warcants for the purchase of school bonds and a few State employes who did not cash their warrants Nov. 1, there are but very few warrants outstanding against the State.

The suspension of the State Treasury has caused no anxiety, as it is tnown the State has an abundance of money, but does not happen to have t where it can place its hands on the cash. Since there is no deficiency, it will be impossible for the State Treasurer to register the warrants so they can be paid in the order that they are registered. When the treasury has money on band it will simply be opened and then the warrants cashed as they are presented.

THANKSCIVING PROCLATION.

Austin, Tex.: The Governor Monday issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation:

In accordance with the proclamation. of the President of the United States, appointing a day of National thanksgiving and prayer, I, T. M. Campbell, Governor of the State of Texas, in consideration thereof, and in conformity with law, do hereby designate Thursday, Nov. 28, 1907, as Thanksgiving Day, and proclaim it a legal holiday for the offering of thanks and praise to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, for the bounties of nature, for the rewards of toil and for the blessings of peace and prosperity vouchsafed our State and Union,





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

FIRST TEXAS BLIZZARD

SNOW AND SLEET TAKE NORTH TEXAS.

NORTHER IS VERY SEVERE.

Is Coming South Rapidly-Coldest Weather So Far This Season.

Fort Worth, Tex.: Accompanied by sleet and snow the first real norther of the season swept over North Texas Sunday and Sunday night, almost reaching blizzard proportious. According to reports reaching Fort Worth the cold wave was most severe in the Panhandle and in Grayson county, Amarillo and Whitesboro reporting a considerable fall of both snow and sleet. At the later point the wind blew a gale during Sunday afternoon and night, the temperature dropped to 36 degres and the snowfall is the heaviest for this section in nineteen years. Gainesville, Dallas, Ennis, Fort Worth and points as far west as Brownwood also felt the norther.

Worst in Nineteen Years.

Whitesboro, Tex.: The first blizzard of the season and the worst for this time of the year in nineteen years is raging in Whitesboro. All day Sunday the wind blew strong from the north, increasing by nightfall to the proportions of a gale and the temperature dropped to 36 degrees. At 8:30 p. m. snow began to fall with indications that it would continue throughout the night.

Sleet and Rain at Gainesville.

Gainesville, Tex.: A cold north wind blew up Sunday night and has been blowing a gale all day. At noon the thermometer registered 45 degrees and at 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon a driving sleet and rain is falling. This is the coldest weather of the season up to this date.

Snow at Amarillo.

Amarillo, Tex.: A norther, accompanied by snow and sleet, swooped down on Amarillo and this section of the Panhandle Sunday. Cold, with no indication of clearing weather.

Dallas Gets Norther.

Dallas, Tex.: A norther swooped down on Dallas Sunday, causing a sudden and deep drop in this temperature. The atmosphere is dry and no ill effects are expected from the blizzard




