Plans of Texas Southeastern. Austin, Tex., April 9.-The
State railroad building from Rusk to Palestine will probably have new connection, the Texas ${ }^{\circ}$ Southeastern Railroad, according to the statement of the latter road's general attorney, Geo. C. Greer of Beaumont; who was here today arranging for a bond sssue for the road. Mr. Greer stated that the
Texas Southeastern is now ©ompleted and in operation from Houston East and West Texas Railroad, a distance of twenty-six miles, and will be extended to a
connection with the State railroad or with the International and Great Northern at Crockett, making a total mileage of the entire line of somenty miles. Mr. Greer secured
sever authority from the Railroad Commission to issue bonds to the amount of $\$ 23,000$ per mile on the
completed road of twenty-six completed road of twenty-six
miles and later wifl apply to bave registered that part of the bonds penditures in construction. The commission will authorize any
reasonable amount of bonds to reasonable amount of bonds to
issue, but will permit to be to the actual oun amount equal property construction and equip ping. The application for regisration on the Texas Southeastern will come up later.
