P. Morgan. Tell him will sge him soon." On June 18, 1900, J. W. Bailey at Gaines. ville, Texas, drew a draft through he Red River National bank on H. C. Pierce, St. Louis, for $\$ 1500$. David R. Francis, ex-governor. of Missouri, under oath, swore that he took up this draft on November 22,1900 , and returned it to J. W. Bailey at Gainesville. Thus the dratt was traced by the documents and creditable witnesses to Bailey's possession. Bailey had said if they would produce the draft he would resign and re-
