house of the house of God. Revhouse of the house of God. Revthing connected with His worship, is plainly taught in the scriptures. The house of God is the place for worshipping God, and for preaching His gospel. Its associations ing His gospel, Its associations
ought to be holy, and such merriment as is inseparably connected with a Christmas tree may do for with a Christmas tree may do for
the family home, or some public hell, but seems out of place with the sacred associations and purposes of the house of God.
2. A Christmas tree in a church creatly increases the danger of fire, the loss of the church prop erty, and possibly the loss of human lives. A few years ago in our own communty one of our charches nariowly escaped burning in conneetion with a Christ mas tree. I have read of more than one church in our own state, and in other parts of our land, being burned by accidents caused in connection with a Christmas tree.
3. A Christmas tree in connee an with a Sunday school is us -some of them being expensive presents from parents for their own children, some from young
men for young ladies. Some of the Sunday school scholars thus receive beautiful and expensive resents, and others recelve only few vaings, and they not of distinction seems to be made Children, and sometimes their parents, do not understand why they receive only poor presents while others get very beautifu
and costly ones. This is not good for the cause, and it does no seem proper that the house God should be made the place fo isplaying the gifts of parents heir children, or of lovers seem suitable that the house
amusement for childreo. 4. Such Christmas celebrations
re supposed to help the Sunday are supposed to help the Sunday
school by attracting scholars to school by attracting scholars to on the scbool. It is probable, if he matter were carefully looked into, it would be found that those who thus are attracted to join the Sunday school do not remain very long with it. And ought not our
Sunday school workers to present Sunday school workers to present
higher motives as inducements to persons to join the Sunday school? Ought we not to aim to have thoroughly good Sunday school instruction, good eachers, good music, and endeavor to rely upon God in prayer and
faith for His blessing, and recomfaith for His blessing, and recomwe may expect God's blessing Our public schools do not rely upon a Cbristmas tree as a recommendation of the school.
4. Some of the best Sunday schools of our country are now celebrating Christmas by calling pon the scholars to contribute to he poor and orphans, and thus ondeavor to follow Christ, who taught it is more blessed to give han to receive. The poor and orphans greatly need such help,
and the contributors themselves would be greatly benefitted by such a benevolent exercise and training, and such a celebration would be more in keeping with wuch glory as should be given to such glory as should be qiven to
the holy child Jesus, rather than glorification of ourselves and ur children.
