while true as far as it went, was misleading to some because it went the business transacted: no farther. In giving the freight money paid to the I. & G. N. Railroad company at Crockett for freight alone amounted to \$59,000. That was correct as far as it went, amount of cash paid in to the agent here. The statement did not include any of the freight shipped from Crockett to be paid at other points, nor did it include any of the freight received here which had been prepaid at point of origin. Further inquiry into the freight business at this point convinces the Courier that there per month for the year 1908, including all freight originating and month express business. In fact, the Courier has investigated far enough to satisfy itself that Crock ett does a larger business in the matter of forwarding freight from point of origin, which is usually paid at point of destination, than any other town between Houston and Longview.

To the above estimate of \$42,000 per month of freight business alone there should also be added the outgoing tonnage of the Houston County Coal & Manufacturing Co., which amounted to something over 2000 cars of lignite coal last year and the company has its figures far in excess of that estimate for this

Organization of East Texas Fruit and Truck Growers' Association.

Pursuant to call issued by Honorable Ed. R. Kone, Commissioner of Agriculture, a large number of the fruit and truck growers of East Texas convened in the audience room of the City Hall, Palestine, Texas, at ten o'clock February 10. The gathering included large and small interests, varying from a few acres of truck and fruit to orchards of more than a thousand acres, and it was evident from the beginning that all were very much in earnest and fully agreed as to the absolute necessity of some form of cooperation among the growers which would improve marketing conditions and enable them to secure fair returns for their crops.

Temporary organization was effected by the selection of Hon. E. R. Kone as presiding officer and Mrs. Frank E. Kalb of Crockett as secretary.



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SEEN BY MANY PEOPLE

RETURNING FLEET TO BE RE-VIEWED BY PRESIDENT OF UNITED STATES.

TWENTY FIRST-CLASS SHIPS

Score of Best Fighting Crafts Polished Jackies Expectant-Pleasuse Boats on Moves.

Fortress Monroe, Va., Feb. 22. The weather was well-night perfect off the coast and the battleships of the United States returning squadron during their breathing spell on the drill grounds, will be polished and painted new for the review by President Roosevelt Monday morning. The number of vessels in the line that will file by the Mayflower will not be so great as at other reviews, but never before has the president personally visited so many of the ships as he plan to do Monday. The review will also be notable in that it will bring together the greatest number of battleships ever assembled under the American flag. There will be twenty first-class battleships in the imposing column, two more than at the review in San Francisco harbor last May. In anticipation of Monday's pageant, the waters off here last night were filled with brilliantly lighted yachts and many classes of government vessels.

Cotton Handled at Galveston.

Galveston: Saturday crossed the 3,000,000-bale mark in cotton receipts since Sept. 1. In five months and twenty days, including Sundays and holidays, Galveston has received and handled \$180,000,000 worth of cotton, receiving and handling in one day 70,120 bales without a hitch or fear of congestion. Exclusive of the millions of bushels of grain, the thousands of tons of cotton seed meal and the many thousands of tons of other commodities, Galveston has handled an average of more than \$1,000,000 worth of cotton every day since the opening of this season last September.

World's Largest Pipe Order.

Bay City, Mich.: The El Paso and Southwestern road Saturday closed a contract with the Michigan Pipe company of this city, by which the Michigan company receives the largest single order for pipe ever given in the world. It is to furnish the railroad company with seventy-four miles of wooden mains, ranging from three to eleven inches inside diameter.

Building in Childress.

Childress: Twenty-five -new residences are under construction in this city and local lumber men say that the building boom has just commenced. Some of the finest homes in the city are under construction now and moreof costlier proportions will begin immediately.

Use Many Matches.

Dallas: The 80,000,000 people in America use as many matches as the 800,000,000 in the remainder of the world, according to statistics of the Texas Fire Prevention association.

Fire at Lcrena.

Waco: At Lorena, a town on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway, twenty miles south of Waco, early Sunday morning a conflagration took place in which seven houses were burned, the total loss being \$10,000.

Mt, Pleasant Cotton Receipts.

Mt. Pleasant: The total cotton receipts at the two yards here up to date amount to a little over 6,500 bales, compared with about 5,000 for the season of 1907-08.



Easy Road to Fame.

At this season of the year, "introducing a bill" is the shortest of all roads to fame, declares the Boston Transcript. Any member of a lawmaking body, state or national, with suitable writing materials at hand may do this. For some reason the reading public takes the act with tremendous seriousness. It is not uncommon to hear that "they are going to do" so and so in Washington, or in the legislature, and on investigation it turns out that the indefinite "they are" merely means that some one man has introduced a bill to make the change in question. This is a very long distance from egislative enactment. The bills that will be introduced at this legislative session will run up into thousands; the number involving important changes that will be actually passed is decidedly small, particularly in the congress of the United States. How easy it is to introduce a bill was illustrated by an experience of Senator Blair. At the request of a constituent, with whom he had but slight acquaintance, and in the closing hours of a session of congress, he introduced, without reading, a bill which, as it proved, would attempt to divert the Gulf stream, by some engineering feat, so that it would warm up Labrador and incidentally the regions to the northcommonly referred to as the bill for "heating the north pole." Many of the bills introduced this winter are quite as far removed from the statute books as was that famcus measure. Labrador is still cold.

Is Business War?

Can the ethically right be economically wrong? Could any indictment of our present competitive system be more terrible than the following: "It is necessary to realize in the world of business, as in the battlefield, a world outside the direct control of the Christian ethic." We should be grateful for this frank utterance by Mr. Masterman. It is simply in line with Mr. H. H. Rogers when he said, "Business is war." We need not quote the well-known words of Gen. Sherman regarding war. Men are beginning to derstand the anti-social, anti-religious, anti-ethical nature of capitalism worker, writes Rev. George R. Lunn in the Homiletic Review. The condemnation of capitalism, however, is not the equivalent of condemning capitalists in toto. They are victims of a system which we have outgrown and tht, in the interest our Christian faith, to abolish.

We have been building monuments to those who could massacre the most. in the cathedrals of Europe and in the parks of America you will find ten nonuments to those who have destreyed their kind to every one of e who have brought the world light and life; but a better day is vning. Seven years ago, writes Charles L. Goodell, D. D., in the Homletic Review, when France made up its list of immortals, Napoleon, the greatest of butchers, headed the list. at last year it made another roll of its noble men, and Pasteur, the savior of human life, stood first. There is another Book which has the list of God's immortals, and above that list it is written, "They that be wise shall shine as the firmament and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever."

It is said that of those who applied for aid under the British old-age penlons act, which went into effect January 1, nine-tenths were unable to n their names. If this is so, it is a striking proof that ignorance and indigence go together. Of similar import was the argument of a recent seay on the conditions of labor in England. The writer, not unsympahetic, spoke of that "multitude of inpetents who call themselves the oployed." That does not tell the whole story of poverty, for individual good men have hard luck, and bad imes overtake the best. But on the whole, the competent man succeeds.

The contributions made by people of the United States to the earthquake sufferers of Italy amount to much more than a million dollars. The rese to the calf for aid was above all things prompt, many of the money orders going by cable direct to the Italian relief agencies. Rarely has there been in the world's history a more generous answer to an appeal, and Italy can never forget the rich gifts from this land.



Austin: It is probable that two investigations will occupy legislative attention this week, but it is not expected that they will materially interfere with the lawmaking work of the session. In the Senate, the committee selected to probe the charges made by Senator H. Bascom Thomas, to the effect that there have been numerous specific violations of the anti-lobby law since this session began, will begin its operations Tuesday, and will follow a program least calculated to interfere with the work of the Senate. 



COURIER CANNOT DO IT ALL.

Influence of Daily Press Necessary Now to Secure That Influence.

Fort Worth, Texas, Feb. 9.

Editor Courier: In your issue of the 4th inst., note an editorial, a portion of which I am constrained to quote. I am positive it will bear repetition. I quote as follows: "On Tuesday of this week there were thirteen cars of freight received at Crockett from the railroad company-thirteen solid cars and all for Crockett. This would be a good showing for a town with a larger population than Crockett. It is a better showing for Crockett." Again you say: "The railroad force at Crockett is inadequate to the business handled." Is this true? If so, and there is no reason to question it, as it is a positive statement made by the Courier, then it strikes me as no mean announcement. Permit me now to enquire why it is that such announcements as this in the business life of Crockett so infrequently find a place on the pages of the great dailies of the state? The Courier appears to be standing at its post and doing all possible to let the world know of the good things which fall to the lot of Crockett, but the Courier cannot and does not expect to do it all. Permit me to enquire, where are the local correspondents of the state papers? Not a great while be received in the same kindly ago I saw in one of the great daily papers of Texas a special from Crockett giving a list of an astonshing number of felony charges in Houston county, and a very exhaustive account of atrocities committed in the county. The story of homicide committed, or of some act of brutality and lawlessness in the county, transmitted on swift wing, and under flaring headlines, to be read of all men, finds conspicuous space in the columns of the great dailies of the country. If indeed there were thirteen cars of freight received in Crockett in one day, and on the same day Crockett forwarded eleven cars of freight, and this is a good showing for Crockett, better than a town with a larger population than Crockett, and if further "the railroad force at Crockett is inadequate to the business handled," then permit me to enquire why it is that prospectors, homeseekers, mill men and promoters are not made aware of these things through the free columns of the Texas state papers? It costs nothing to have the great dailies publish these interesting and important business announcements; indeed, they are glad to receive and publish them. Houston county is one of the best counties in the eastern portion of the state, and Crockett is one of the most beautiful and inviting county seats in the state, yet there are some very excellent people in Crockett who would be astonished to understand how little is known of their town and county. In many sections mention "Crockett," and though signed by different names. men imagine we speak of Crockett county. Then permit me to respectfully suggest that where it is possible Crockett should have local correspondents for the state

papers, and if possible for papers without the state. The transmission with great particularity of crime committed, and assurances of enormous grind in the criminal courts, while news perfectly legitimate to be scattered broadcast over a continent, yet such reports, I am persuaded, are hardly calculated to arouse a valuable citizen to the importance of turning his face toward Crockett and Houston county in search of a home for his wife and children. Such matter might at all events be curtailed and subordinated to the high purpose of demonstrating to the world agricultural advantages and commercial possibilities. Crockett and Houston county have within recent years passed through the crucible of pest and panic. I am of opinion that the crux has been reached and passed, and that just ahead there is a happier and more prosperous era for town and county. I believe that even now the process of recuperation is going on, and that before a great while more than rehabilitation will result. I might offer as an instrument of evidence your wise editorial, a portion of which I have had the honor to quote. In conclusion permit me to respectfully suggest to the business men of Crockett that they see to it that so far as possible the big dailies have local correspondents in Crockett. Other towns are reaping an abundant harvest in this way free of cost. Why not Crockett? Then let me suggest to the local correspondents to be discriminating as well as vigilant, and "work" the big dailies for all it is worth. Rush business items, small and great. I would like for every man and woman in Europe and America to know that Crockett, Texas, is boasting about the freight received and forwarded and that "the railroad force at Crockett is inadequate to the business handled." Austin, Texas, keb. 12, 1909. Editor Courier:

I am in receipt of letters from various parties in this county requesting me to oppose the repeal of the bucket shop law. I want to assure you that I shall always use my influence and vote against any measure that may give any one the privilege of gambling, and especially on the products of the laboring people. In my mind this is the worst form of gambling.

I want to say further that it is not the farmers who are behind the efforts to repeal this law; in fact, there are none of them but what are satisfied with the law as it stands. The interests asking the repeal of the law are the outlawed bucket-shop gamblers of this state. Mr. E. A. Calvin, former president of the Texas Farmers' Union, but more recently of Houston, in asking the repeal of this law does not speak from the standpoint of a farmer, but from that of an individual.

There have been circulars sent to the various members of the house of the thirty-first legislature asking the repeal of this law. The first one sent out by Mr. Calvin has been compared with a letter written by Mr. Wisner, of bucket shop fame, to a private party (whose name I am not at liberty to use at this time) about ten days ahead of the Calvin circular. We find seven or eight paragraphs in the Calvin circular identical reproductions of the Wisner letter, and to my mind they were both written by the same party, al


