CROCKEII TONNAGE IS LARGE.
Freight Originating in Housto County is Surprisingly Excessive.
About two mronthe ago th
Courier published an artucle that, whie true as far as it went, was
misleading to some because it went oin farther. In giving the freight eceipts at Crockett the Courie said that for the year 1908 the monev puid to the I. \& G. N.
Ruilroad company at Crockett for freight alone amounted to $\$ 59,000$. That was correct as far as it went, amount of cash paid in to the agent here. The statement sia
not include any of the freight shipped from Crockett to i, ie paid at other points, nor did it include any of the freight received here which bad been prepaid at point
of origin. Further inquiry into the freight business at this point onvinces the Courier that there was an average of about $\$ 42,000$
per month for the year 1908, inper month for the year 1908, in-
clading all freight originating and cluding all freight originas, inay h
freigbt received. To this may added an average for said year about $\$ 3500$ per month passenge
business and about $\$ 2300$ pe business and about 82300 per
m noth express business. In fact, the Courrer has investigated far enough to satisfy itself that Crock
ett does a larger husiness in the ett does a larger husiness in the matter of forwarding freight from
point of origin, which is usually paid at point of destination, than nny other town between Houston and Longview.
To the above estimate of $\$+2,000$ per month of freight business alone there should also be added the out going tonnage of the Houston County Coal \& Manufacturing Co., which amounted to something over 2000 cars of lignite coal last year and the company bas its figures fa in excess of that estimate for this year.
