## CREEK INDIANS ARE ON WAR PATH

CRAZY SNAKE LEADER OF INDIANS AND NEGROES CAUSE REIGN OF TERROR.

### TROOPS HURRIED TO SCENE

Desultory Fights Since Thursday Culminate in Soldiers Taking The Field.

Oklahoma City, Ok., March 29.-Five companies of Oklahoma State troops started yesterday in pursuit of Crazy Snake's band of Creek Indians, half-breeds and negroes, intrenched in the Hickory Hills, seven miles from Henryetta. A bloody battle was regarded as inevitable, as the heavily armed troops set out either to capture or exterminate the murderous band. which since Thursday has caused the death of six men, the wounding of many others, and brought about a condition of terror in Henryetta, Pierce and all the surrounding country. Crazy Snake's men number about 200, all armed with rifles and plentifully supplied with ammunition. They defiantly sent out word today that they would fight to the death. There can be only one outcome to the clash, but it is certain to be a murderous affair, as the militiamen's officers have decided they will shoot to kill from the first.

Great Prairie Fire at Emma. Emma, Texas: Last Wednesday the citizens of Emma beheld a great prairie fire sweeping down on their town from the northwest, causing the destruction of everything in its path. The wind immediately turned direct from the north and struck the town, which burned several houses and barns. Damage estimated at \$50,000.

#### Jews to Palestine.

Terrell: Jacob Label, of this city, chairman of the committee of Texas Zionists, Sunday announced plans were complete for securing a charter and purchasing a large tract in Palestine, where persecuted Russian Jews will be colonized. The Texas society is capitalized for \$20,000. Thousands are going there.

Judge Storey Dies at Austin.

Austin: At 6:20 o'clock Sunday morning, after what appeared to be a slight illness of only a few days' chairman of the Texas Railroad Comgrippe.

Sacred Heart Cathedral Robbed. Dallas: One of the most sensational robberies ever committed in the history of crime in this country took and 9:30 o'clock, when burglars broke into the Sacred Heart Cathedral and Potter Drug & Chem. #### Twenty Lives Lost.

New Orleans: A special from Bluefields. Nicaragua, gives the details of the loss of the sloop Kearsarge on the night of March 13, between Monke Point and Greytown, Nicaragua. The report states that twenty people perished when the boat went down.

#### Darwin's Theory Knocked Out.

Chicago: Darwin's theory of the evolution of species has received a disconcerting blow in a decision by James Windes that a "missing link" exhibited at a local animal show is a dumb, imbecile Louisiana negro boy. The Court has awarded his custody to other people are suspicious of him. the mother.

Bankers' Association Meets. New Orleans: May 13 and 14 the State Bankers' Associations of the States of Alabama, Mississippi and Texas will be the guests of the Louisiana Bankers' Association in New Orleans, and committees are already preparing a program of entertainment.

Horses Coming to Houston. Houston: Horses are arriving for the spring race meet in this city, opening April 21. Each day a number of good ones are brought in, and the meeting promises to be one of the largest ever held in the State.

State Christian Endeavorers.

Fort Worth: Preliminary arrangements for the meeting of the Christian Endeavor Union of Texas, to be held at Waco June 17 to 20, have been made by members of the executive committee.

#### New Bank at Toyah.

Toyah: The recently organized Citizens' State Bank of Toyah, with a capital of \$40,000, is the only State bank in this immediate section of the country.







WHITE ISLAND.

One of New Zealand Group Always Enveloped in Clouds of Steam.

White island derives its name from the clouds of white steam in which it appears to be continually enveloped. Its area is only 600 acres and its height about 880 feet above sea level. In form and color it is like a reposing camel, while its interior, with its gray, weather-beaten, almost perpendicular cliffs, recalls the Coliseum at Rome. Overhanging the southern landing place stands a column of rock closely resembling a sentinel, which has been dedicated to the memory of Capt. Cook. The water of the island is of a pale green hue, and anything dipped into it becomes a red brick color. The fumes of sulphur are always plainly perceptible.

On a fine moonlight night a wonderful sight is afforded to anyone who will sit in an open boat in one of the lakes of the island. Covering an area of 50 acres is an immense caldron, hissing and snorting and sending forth volumes of poisonous steam, while all chances of egress appear to be denied by the steep, silent and

gloomy cliffs.—British Australian.
