LAW CONTROLIING STATE PENSIONS
Late Act of 'Legislature Will Put Many Names on Rolls.

Austin, Texas, May 5.-The pension bureau of the comptroller' department is daily in recerpt of inquiries from various sections of passed by the present session of the legislature providing for the taking and perpetuation of evidence, for the purpose of
establishing the identity of Confederate veterans, and such fact as will prove their right to a pension under the pension act. Captain Bolmes, chief of the pension bureau, said that this law which is now in effect will, result pensioners number of add on the rolls. The billalso imposes quite a task on the secretary of state's department in that it requires all such evidence to be filed in that department and recorded. The full text of the bill, about which so many inquiries are being made is as follows:
Section 1. Any Confederat veteran, soldier or sailor, who may be entitled to a pension under and y virtue of the pension laws o Texas, who may be desirous of establishing such right by the evidence of any person who may
be cognzant of such facts as would prove and establish his such right, may cause such person or persons to go before the county jadge or any notary public of the county of the residence of such person and make a statement in writing of all facts within his knowledge concerning and relating to the service as a soldier or sailor in the army or navy of the Southern Confederacy, during the civil war. Such statement in writing when made to be duly person making the same.
Section 2. Any such statement as provided for in section 1 of this act, wade and reduced to writing duly anthenticated, shall be filed with the secretary of state and by him recorded in a book to be kep for such purpose, a properly certi hed copy of which shall be any future time, to prove and establish the right of the soldie or sailor in whose behalf, or at
whose instance, the same may have been made, to such pension as may be provided for by law. Section 3. The widow of any soldier or sailor who may be

general law. They may levy, as general law. They may levy, as-
