Leeches are enumerated by the bureau of statistics under its general head of animals imported, the total value of the imports of this species in 1908 having been \$5,341; in 1907, \$6,922; in 1906, \$4,494; in 1905, \$3,862; in 1904, \$3,589; in 1903, \$3,240, and in 1902, \$2,412—the commerce in leeches being thus of a growing character. The total value of the leeches imported into the United States in the decade ending with 1908, is about \$40,-000. Leeches are imported free of duty. Snails were at one time enumerated as an article of importation, the records from 1894 to 1898 showing snails imported to the extent of about \$5,000; but the snail trade so dwinstatements of this article.

JONSKINS ADORNED PLATFORM.

Davidson Audience Was the Largest That Ever Greeted a Candidate at Luling.

Luling, Tex., May 12.-Hon. R. V. Davidson arrived here this evening at 4:40 from Gonzales, where he spent the day. He was met at the depot here by a reception committee consisting of Messrs. Geo. Walker, D. Gregg, M. O. McGaffey and others, who escorted him to the Wilson Hotel. Large numbers of people had been coming from the country during the day and a special train from Lockhart arrived with large crowd and brass band about 8 o'clock. A platform and seats had been erected in the railroad park, but so great was the crowd that more than half of them were unable to find seats.

He spoke to about 2,000 people, and it was one of the largest and most enthusiastic crowds that ever greeted a candidate in Luling. Mr. Davidson was introduced at 8:30 by Hon. Martin Flower of Lockhart, who introduced him as the next governor of Texas, and paid a glowing tribute to his past record. The platform from which the speech was made was decorated, and several coonskins were conspicuously displayed.

Mr. Davidson started his speech with a brief sketch of his record from the time of his arrival in Texas. He then took up the probibition question in detail, giving his stand upon this question as in previous speeches, and then went back to the prohibition campaign of 1887 and produced records to show that Colquitt at that time was in the ranks of the prohibitionists. He also read extracts from a letter of Jake Wolters to cused Colquitt of having misrcoresented to him his position at that time. Mr. Davidson said that Wolters did not mind Colquitt's voting for prohibition, but denounced him for denying the fact. Mr. Davidson said Colquitt was inconsistent on the subject of party platform. In 1905 he said Colquitt stood for a party platform, but that in 1910 he stood for no platform repugnant to his conscience. He also attacked Colquitt for his position on the full rendition law, and said that land and return the finished product he was the father of that law.

Mr. Davidson then made reference to Poindexter's speeches at Luling and Gonzales several weeks ago, in which he accused Davidson of negl.gence in his prosecutions under the anti-trust laws for failure to imprison the officers of the convicted corporations, and Texas. made special request that the press quote him as saying that there was no law on the statute books of the state of Texas which empowered the attorney general to criminally prosecute any one, but that in 1907 a law was passed which authorized county and district attorneys to call upon the attorney general for assistance in criminal prosecutions, but that such a request had not been made during his term as attorney general, and defied Poindexter or any lawyer in Texas to quote any law to the contrary.

Mr. Davidson then concluded his address.

It costs approximately \$10 per bale to ship our cotton to Engto Texas, and by building cotton mills in Texas we can add \$10 per bale to our cotton crop.



### Former Court Stenographer Writes of Trip From Nicaragua.

Austin, Tex., May 9.-J. J. Arthur, chief rate clerk in the railroad commission, has received from his near relative, Godfrey Reese Fowler, formerly a prominent figure in the Nicaraguan revolution, but now on his way to his home at Palestine, another interesting letter, as follows:

"We sailed from Corinto on the 18th and reached here vesterday. This letter is written on board the United States ship Saturn, in Magdalena Bay, Mexico. I wrote you from Corinto, sending the letter by the Isthmus to New York, and presumed that you received it eventually.

"Our trip up the coast was without incident, and we made no ports until we put in here. We will have to lay here a week or ten days taking cargo, so that I will hardly reach San Francisco by the 5th, as stated in my wireless last night. There being no commercial station here, I could not arrange to pay the telegraph charges, and had to send it subject to collection charges on delivery. I had the message sent by the wireless operator on the Buffalo, and of course he kept no accounts with the Western Union. I am sending this letter on the Buffalo, which will sail to-morrow, so you should get this letter on the 6th or 7th.

"I shall have lots to tell you about when I see you. This is a ideal climate. Water here is five fathoms deep in 100 yards out from the beach. There is no wind and very little tide, truly as smooth as a mill pond. For several years the navy held target practice here, but I presume it will be abandoned now, as the Buffalo and Saturn are taking on all the target gear and other apparatus stored for that purpose.

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





Most Effective Way of Dealing, for In-stance With the Flank End of Porterhouse.

Before speaking of the cooking of the cuts that lack tenderness throughout, it may be well to refer to the fact that the flank end of the porterhouse is to be classed with the toughest of cuts and with those which, when cooked alone, are with difficulty made tender even by long heating. Mock duck, which is commonly made out of flank steak, can be rendered tender enough to be palatable only by long steaming or cooking in water, and yet people quite generally broil this part of the steak with the tenderloin and expect it to be eaten. The fact is that to broil this part of the porterhouse steak is not good management. It is much more profitable to put it into the soup kettle or to make it into a stew. In families where most of the members are away during the day the latter is a good plan, for the end of the steak makes a good stew for two or three people. This may be seasoned with vegetables left from dinner, or two or three olives cut up in gravy will give a very good flavor; or a few drops of some one of the bottled meat sauces, if the flavor is relished, or a little Chili sauce may be added to the stew. But if the tough end of a perterhouse is needed with the rest, a good plan is to put it through a meat grinder, make it into balls, and broil it with the tender portions. Each member of the family can then be served with a piece of the tenderloin and a meat ball. If the chopped meat is seasoned with a little onion juice, grated lemon rind, or chopped parsiey, a good flavor is imparted to the gravy.

Thick Potato Soup .- Boil as many potatoes as desired until soft enough to go through a sieve. Use the water they were boiled in, adding milk, butter, salt and pepper to season.

Thick Pea Soup .- Soak the dried peas over night, then cook the same as the potatoes, but add plenty of onions to flavor the peas. Carrot soup can be made in the same way.

Creamed Potatoes With Cheese .-Make a good white sauce, using two tablespoonfuls of flour, a tablespoonful dish, then a layer of white sauce, followed with a layer of grated cheese, Bake about twenty minutes and serve

tender potatoes, carrots and onions; each. then serve with butter, pepper and salt.

Egg Kisses.

Use for these the whites of three sugar in a bowl, pour the whites over let them touch. Put on a board or inverted bread pan and place enough layers of paper to keep the bottom from burning. Bake in a moderate oven until brown. Let the mixture rise and then bake or they will not be light. Remove with knife and put on

For chocolate egg kisses add before cooking one ounce of grated chocolate. which has been melted. Add gently and quickly or the mixture will be too

Tapioca Cream.

Two tablespoonfuls tapioca, one quart milk, four eggs, sugar, and a little salt, soak the tapioca in a little water for two hours; put the milk to boil, stir in the taploca, sugar, add a little salt. When nearly boiling stir in the yolks of the eggs; when as thick as boiled custard remove from the fire; have the whites of the eggs beaten to a stiff froth, stir into the hot custard, flavor with vanilla. To be eaten cold. A teaspoonful of cornstarch can be added if the custard is not thick enough.

Stewed Tomatoes.

Place one-half can of tomatoes in an ancovered saucepan. Boil for five minutes; add one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoon of sugar, a teaspoon of butter, and a sprinkle of pepper. Add one-fourth of a cup of fine bread crumbs. Boil up once, and

Chicken Wiggle. One cup of chopped chicken, onehalf milk, thickened, one can peas, butter size of an egg, salt and pepper. Serve on dry toast.


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
