Martin Locknart, who ner of Terse, and the next governor of Texas, and paid a glowing tribote to his past record. The pialforn frow which the speech was made was decoreted, and several coonsiki
conspicsously displayed.
Mr. Davidson started his speech with a brief sketch of his record from the time of his arrival in
Texas. He then took up the proTexas. He then took up the prohibition question in detail, giving his stand upon this question as in provious speechss, and then went back to the prohibition campaign of 1887 and produced records to show that Coiquitt at that time mas in the ranks of the prohibithonists. He aiso read extracts from a letter of Jake Wolters to cused Colquitt of having misiopresented to him his position at that. time. Mr. Davidson said that Wolters did not mind Colquitt's roting for prohibition, but deoounced him for denying the fact. Mr. Davidson said Colquitt was inconsistent on the subject of party platform. In 1905 he said Colqnitt atood for a party platform, but that in 1910 he stood for no platiorm repugnant to his consciance. He also attacked Colquitt for his position on the full rendition law, and said that he was the father of that law.
Mr. Davidson then made reference to Poinciexter's speeches at Luling and Gonzales several weeks ago, in which he accused Davidson of neglegence in his prosecutions under theranti-trust laws for failure to imprison the officers of the convicted corporations, and made special request that the prees quote him as saying that chere was no law on the statute books of the state of Texas which ompowered the attorney general but thatily prosecute any one, which anthorized county and district attorneye to call upon the attorney general for assistance in criminal prosecutions, but that during his torm as attorney mener sl , and defied Poindexter or lawyer in Teres to quote on any to the contrary.

## fROM CAPIAIN FOWLER.

Former Court Stenographer Writes of Trip from Nicaragua.
Austin, Tex., May 9.-J. J. Arthur, chief rate clerk in the railroad commisson, bas received Reese Fowler, formerly a promi nent figure in the Nicaraguan revolution, but now on his way to his home at Paleatine, another interesting letter, as follows:
"We sailed from Corinto on the 18th and reached bere yesterday. This letter is written on board the United States ship Saturn, in Magdalena Bay, Mexico. I wrote you from Corinto, sending the letter by the Isthmus to New York, and presumed that you received it eventually.
"Our trip up the cosst was without incident, and we made no ports until we put in here. We ten baye toling herre, weok ten days taking cargo, so that will bardy reach San Francisco by the 5th, as stated in my wireless last night. There being no commercial station here, I could not arrange to pay the telegraph charges, and had to send it sub-
ject to collection charges on deject ory. I bad the message sent by
livery. the wireless operator on the Buffalo, and of course be kept no ac counts with the Western Union. I am sending this letter on the Buffalo, which will sail to morrow so you should get this letter on the 6 th or 7 th.
"I shall have lots to tell you about when I see you. This is a most perfect harbor as well as an Ideal climate. Water here is five fathoms deep in 100 yards ont from the beach. There is no wind and very hittle tide, truly as smooth as a mill pond. For several years the navy held target practice bere, but I presume it will be abandoned now, as the Buffalo and Saturn are taking on all the target gear and other ap paratus stored for that purpose.
"I saw a wonderful mirage yes
terday. A long, low coast, covered with palm trees growing down to a narrow beach, stretched away on the starboard bow for miles. When I was told there was nothing there but the open sea for forty miles I would not
believe it until I had used the believe it until I had used the
glasses. Every one on ship saw glasses. Every one on ship saw
it, but some who know the coast it, but some who know the coast
informed us it was only an illusion informed us it was only an illusion. "I have sent a few postcards, but they may not reach you for
some tume. The Mexican mal some tume. The
service is very slow.
"Lower California seems to be more of a desert chan West Texas. The settlement here hasn't over balf dozen houses. It looks like a pity for such a magnificent harbor to be so useless. I bave been getting toal on deck, but The night fogs are very cold and penetrating.
"I may look around in San Francisco to see if anybody needs a lawyer baving a first-class hand-to-hand knowledge of Spanish and revolutions. Think I could fill the bill if such a need exists. Seriously, I think Frisco has the greatest future of any town I know, and wish I could get fixed

It will be brightest, so far as the earth is concerned, on May 20 , when it may be seen in the western heavens just after sunset From a ncientific standpoint the appearance May 18 will h the most interesting. In the evenugg of that day the earth will be whisked thru the comet's tail, the earth's atmosphere warding off the deadly cyanogen gas. At that time the head will be nearest the earth, a trifle of $14,000,000$ miles away. Attendant phenomeaa will he best observed from th islands of the Pacific ocean.

Halley's comet is a trifle when ompared with the comet of 1811 which had a head a million mile in diameter. It is not so large as the comet of 1882 , which bad a head 200,000 miles across, and a
tail $100,000,000$ miles long, with a spread at the end of $20,000,000$ miles.
The course of the comet was arst calculated by Edward Halley, an Eoxlish astronomer and friend of in 1ase Newten, who was
born in 1656. Halley observed it in 1682, identifying it with a sim-

Person sometimes are so ignorant, or so regardless of proper propriety, as to read copy, or proofs, or to stand at the press when the paper is running through it and read the same. This editor would as soon bave a person open his most piri vate drawer and read the contents as to stand around in the office and read over anything that is being prepared for publication. To violate this rule intentionally and knowingly by any one is not only gross impropriety, but downright impoliteness and unwarranted intrusion into the private business affairs of the publisber. Nothing tenderad to a newspaper for pubication is public property until the paper is printed and mailed or otherwise delivered to its sub scribers. There are numerous potent reasons for the existence of this role and it is one we have never known an employe, how-
ever humble, of a printing office o give away, and for no cause would one lose his position quicker. The' necessity for this rule can be made apparent on many grounds, but it is especially to be observed in the matter of cam paigns and advertisers' matter.
