When I was elected to the Senate the average tax paid by the railroads of the United States was over $\$ 300$ per mile, while that paid by the railroads of Texas was only $\$ 110$ per mile. I voted for the two laws just referred to, which increased the taxes on Texas railroads to $\$ 152$ per mile, and even that is less
than half the average tax paid by the railroads of the United States.
