The potatoes was nold some time ago, to a Twin City produce Commission company, and the company had agreed to pay 15 cents per had agreed to pay 15 cents per
bushel for them aboard the cars at Pelican Rapids. This would have given Mr. Peterson 895 for the carload. When it came to settlement, however, the company
refused to pay the amount agreed, refused to pay the amount agreed,
claiming that the car bad not arclaiming that the car had not ar-
rived on time and it could not dispose of them as expected. Mr. Peterson had paid $\$ 15.75$ for sacks and $\$ 33$ for sorting, and the amount which the company ten-
dered him in settlement left bim $\$ 9$ behind. In other words, he gave away the carload of potatoes and was $\$ 9$ out in addition. He consulted an attorney, but concluded that inasmuch as he would have to
sue for the amount due in the St sue for the amount due in the St.
Paul courts, the cost of the suit would be greater than the amount which he would be able to recorer, and will acordingly drop the matter.

Negroes Killed in Anderson County It was reported at Crocket Saturday morning that a clash be tween the white and the black Percilla and on the line between Houston and Anderson counties. Sheriff Lacy and deputies immediately left for the scene, but upon that the trouble was acros tound line and in Anderson county. of the elght or more negroes killed only one had been killed in Hous. on county.
