in a sense almost historic. That pleasing, fascinating narrative of Wm. Wirt's in which he has immortalized the "Blind Preacher" is a classic and should be read as a whole to appreciate the subtle

We can not name the number of times when a boy travelling through these parts, ballowed and dear from bistoric happenings and associations, we have essayed in our mind to reproduce the picture and to rehearse the language of Wirt description. Fixed in our mind as it has been from earliest boybood it has been a never ending, ever fruitful source of literary and bistoric pleasure, one that never wearied or palled. But this is but a minor incident when viewed or compared with the vast, imposing array of bistoric treasures to be seen or read of in this section of the Old Dominion. We spoke of Charlottesville and the pames of the great public characters who have in the past strode across the public stage in a berore role and passed out. The princely country estates where these men wereorn and from which radiated those influences which thrilled and enraptured legrislative halls are hallowed shrines to which every
aspiring American turns for inspiration and help. In whatever direction one may go or on whatever ground he may tarry or loiter, it will be in the presence or in view of the theater of some momentons historic effort or ac tion illustrious in the country' history. Only ten or twelve mile away is the home of the great author of the Declaration of Inde. pendence from which he rode
horseback all the way to Washing. horseback all the way to Washington when he was inaugurated twice as President and to which he eturned on horseback when his erms expired. of admiress, whose gentle, gracious personality and sweet, charming influence captivated such within the magic circle of Dollie Madison's presence. Nor was she distinguished alone as the presiding genius of fashionable boudorrs, In the war of 1812 when the
British had captured Washington and were applying the torch to all public buildings, recognizing the peril to which that precious document of writing, the Declaration of Independence, was exposed, she quietly sought out the glass cabinet in which this treasure was anclosed, smashed with her own hand the heavy glass front to the door of the cabinet, grabbed the
invaluable relic in the other band, and rushed from the building 1 flames and concealed the historic elic till the war was over and then restored it. This bold act shows that there was a strain of heroic blood in her make up. And such was the impression which the widow made on the Colonel that the public business he evens so imperatively urgent the evening previous failed to get in out the next morning. Austin, Texas, Feb. 24.-The committee on internal improve ments reported favorably to-day the bill known as the Cotton Belt consolidation bill, taking over the Stephenville - North and South Texas Railway and the Eastern Texas Railroad, reporting favor bbly upon said consolidation, wit the following amendment offered to the

Company shall have extended its line of railroad from Kennard, it present terminus, to Crockett, distance of seventeen miles, as called for by an amendment to it charter."
The Eastern Texas Railroad is a separate corporation and chartered to build into Crockett, although the stock is owned and controlled by the Cotton Belt people as disclosea before the committee.
