The ideal treatment of pneamonie is to carry the patient into the pen air and keep him there, with proper precautions against win wwam be done, the attient can at east be placed in the largest, unniest and best ventilated roon in the house. If possible, a room with windows on two sides is much to be preferred to one which can be opened only to one point of the compass. By a system of screening it can always be managed that a direct current of very cold air shall not blow righ oom should be constantly renewe and always cool.
Of all the cranks the fresh air crank is the sanest, and his reward in the pneumonia sick room is ich one,-Youth's Companion.

 rom the Potuville (Pa) Journal.For a long time there has been heated war between General Otis, the owner of the Los Angeles Tumes, and labor unions The merits and contentions of both sides were in a short time ffaced by the bitterness which was engendered, General Otis wealthy man and the Otis is relea Timen is a pomerful an paper. The conflict raged news uniform fury for a long time, all labor unions in Los Angeles being nvolved.
On October 1 of last year the bunlding of the Los Angeles Time wae dynamited and twenty-ons persons were killed. Very natiurally the crime was imputed to the element that had. been fighting General Otis' paper so long and persistently. This brought forth the counter ac cusation from this element that the dynamiting of the Times plant was merely a conspiracy to cast odium upon the labor unions that had long been in conflict with the limes. The day following the xplosion General Otis made tatement in which he said he would spare neither effort nor money to bring to justice the perpetrators of the dastardly crime which resulted in the death of twenty-one people in his employ. A few days ago detectives who have been working on the anse arrested J. J. MeNamare secretary-treasurer of the iron workers' union, on the charge that be was concerned in the con piracy which resolted in the dynamiting of the Times building. Two other men have also bee placed under arreet, charged with complicity in the crime tective agency that has been work ing on the case saye it has dis
covered that there was a country wide plot on the part of certain labor unions to use dynamite a corporations that stoode men and them and either refused to recog ize them or to grant wage de mands. It is charged that McNamara was at the head of he plot
No judgment should be passed apon McNamara and the men who re accused with him, or upon any of the labor organizations involved, until all the evidence against them and for them has een laid before the public. The rime charged is so horrible that is indeed hard for any one to appose that men could be guilty of it, but the fact should not be lost sight of that there is nothing hat engenders more rancor than labor controversies. The war that has been waged between General Otis and the labor unions Los Angeles has evolved itsel ad the labor unions of the entir country. Certain charges have een made against $O$ tis by the nions, and Otis has likewise made ertain charges against the unions But in both cases few of thions, charges have been substantiated by evidence of a tangible charac ter. The arrest of McNamara however, seems to have followed most careful investigation by atective of national repute.
From the evidence that this de ctive has made public it is ap arent that the arrest of McNamare ad his two alleged accomplices was wholly justifiable. When the normity of the crime charged is aken into consideration, it would ppear that every labor union in the country, instead of coming orward and declaring McNamara o be innocent, should strive to the very best of its ability to prove him innocent, and, failing in this, should at once denounce him as being unworthy to be associated with organized labor. President Gompers of the Ameri can Federation of Labor, ap parently speaking hastily and in anger, declares that McNamara' rrest is one of the acts in the conspiracy for the assassination o rganized labor. Mr. Gomper vould show up stronger befor he public if he had simply made - statement declaring that proposed investigating the charges against McNamara and that hese charges were substantinted very labor wing veration would put forth it to to sera tion of McNamara; and if, on the ther hand, he should be proved innocent, these organizations would hola him up as a victim a conspiracy that would b aslogous to the crime that wa ommitted in the dynamiting of he Times building, in which twenty-one innocent workingmen ere killed.
The country has heard much of - denunciatory character as result of the controversy between General Oits and the labor unions. The time now sppears to be propitious for an investigation into ill of these charges, including th nost serious of all, which is th ne made against McNamara. Both sides should do all in their powe o further this investigation, an both sides should withhold ex pressions of a bitter and vitupertive character until all the evi ence has been summed up an inal judgment passed.

SUPERINTENDENT OF ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The Courier has found very few people opposed to a county superintendent of roads and bridges. It has found a number who opposed the bond issue, but favored the law giving the county a superintendent of roads and bridges. They gave as their reason for after having opposed the bond issue that the creation of the office of roads and bridges would not increase their taxes. They see in the law an opportunity to improve the public road system without the addition of one cent of extra taxation.' Therefore they favor the new Houston county road law creating the office.
A few have been misinforme and are opposing the superinten dent law. They have been told by the arch enemies of the law that the salary of the county superinlendent would increase teed the low know thet it does read the law know that it does nol call for one conk of extra laxation, and those who have kept up with county affairs know that the now law will save to the road and bridge fund more than double the morry necessary for the superantendent's salary. Those who have misrepresented the facts have done so wilfully and deatgnedly and with no other purpose than the defeat of the will of the people as expressed in

## Uassmeeting.

Uader the old road law each of the four county commissioners is allowed pay at 82 a day for riding Une roads 100 days in each year.
Under the new law they are deprived of this pay. The salary of the county superintendent is placed at $\$ 1200$ a vear. The money paid the commissioners for road riding; which the new law saves, lacks only $\$ 400$ of paying the superintendent's salary. If, after giving the new law a trial, a competent superintendent cannot anve to the road and bridge fund four times $\$ 400$ out of the money that has been injudiciously spent for lumber and bridges in the past, he ought to be fired bodily and the office abolished. The Courier is of the belief that the new Houston county road law instead of increasing the taxes of the people, will reduce their taxes. It bas been stated in some taxes. of the county that the new road law was gotten up by only a few people in Crockett and that it was to give the people of the Crockett road district a superintendent at the expense of the whole county.
