HELD MEETING MONDAY AND NAMED SOME OF THE PRIZES.

All Contestants for Prizes to Signify On or Before June 1 Their Intentions.

The executive committee of the Houston County Fair Association met on Monday and gave out the following statement for publication:

While the executive committee has not decided on all details, the Houston County Fair Association will offer, among other prizes to be named later, the following on agricultural products:

Cotton-for best yield for one measured acre, \$30; for second best yield for one measured acre, \$15; for third best yield for one measured acre, \$10.

Corn-for best yield on one measured acre, \$30; for second best yield on one measured acre, \$15; for third best yield on one measured acre, \$10.

Ribbon cane - for best yield from one measured acre, \$15.

Sweet potatoes—for best yield from one-half measured acre, \$15. Ear corn-for best ten ears, \$5; for second best ten ears, \$2.50; for third best ten ears, \$1.

Canned fruits and preservesfor best display, \$5; for secon best display, \$2.50.

Canned vegetables — for best display, \$5; for second best display, \$2.50.

Garden truck-for best display \$7.50; for second best display, \$5; for third best display, \$2.50.

All contestants for agricultural prizes must signify on or before June 1 their intention to enter for any prizes, when blanks will be furnished them by the committee on which to report. All communications should be addressed to the Houston County Fair Asso ciation, Crockett, Texas.

The executive committee, with the assistance of all good citizens of the county, hopes to make this an annual affair and something of which the county will be proud, and to that end earnestly solicits the co-operation of every man, woman and child in the county.

### A Record Breaking Holstein Cow.

Pontiac Clothilde DeKol 2nd, a Holstein-Friesian cow owned by the Stevens Bros. Co., Liverpool, N. Y., has broken all records for butterfat production for periods of 7 and 30 days. This wonderful cow, tested under the supervision of Cornell University, produced in 7 consecutive days 646.1 lbs. milk containing 29,766 lbs. of fat, and in 30 days 2,588.4 lbs milk containing 116.229 lbs. fat, the amount of fat for the week being 11 lbs. in excess of anything before known. Cornell University estimates that the fat produced is and 135.6 lbs. for the 30 days.

### HUMAN DISSECTION.

Surgery and the Anatomists In the Olden Days.

For a long time Alexandria was the only medical center of the world, and the physician Galen, born about 130 A. D., had to journey from Rome to the African city even to see a skeleton. He sent his students to the German battlefields to dissect the bodies of the national enemies, while he himself used apes as most resembling human beings. Human dissection was revived in Bologna in the fourteenth century, where Madonna Manzolina later was professor of anatomy, undoubtedly one of the first women doctors, if not the very first. Leonardo da Vinci, painter of "The Last Supper," was a great anatomist, but dissection had fallen into disuse when Vesalius finally revived it about the middle of the sixteenth century.

Even in comparatively modern times anatomists have been the object of attacks by the populace. In 1765 Dr. John Shippen of Philadelphia was mobbed as a grave robber. Doctors' riots in New York occurred twentythree years later and were due to the belief that the medical students robbed graves continually. It was the lack of opportunity to obtain subjects regularly that led to the practice of grave robbing and originated what Dr. Keene calls "a set of the lowest possible villains-the resurrectionists.' -New York World.

### A SKILLFUL SHOT.

The Way to Bring Down an Overhead Incoming Bird.

It is surprisingly how difficult it is for some sportsmen to successfully King James translation of the score on their incoming birds. Many who can seemingly cope with game in any other mode of flight will habitually balk at this shot and acknowledge

Yet once its principle is understood and the lesson learned the dropping of an overhead incomer is as easy as anything can well be. The miss is always made by the sportsman shooting under and behind the bird, and there is but one way in which the error is to be avoided.

To make the shot the gunner should wait until the bird is about to pass over him, then, bringing up his gun, follow in from behind, cover the bird and swing in ahead of it and, maintaining the same rate of speed, press the trigger the instant the bird is hidden behind the barrels. Do not stop the swing of the gun and be sure the bird shall have disappeared from sight. If the shooter will observe this rule he will be surprised how easily and invariably he will kill his bird .-Recreation.

When all the charred corks have been worked through the sacks into the water in this way the water is drained through a close canvas sack, ready for the performers. The stuff is put up in cans, from which, when hands and applies it to his face, neck and sometimes his hands.-New York

### A CURIOUS BIRD.

The Crested Hoactzin When Hatched Has Four Legs.

The crested hoactzin of British Guiana is the only survivor of a certain race of birds most of which are now which give its flesh a most offensive flavor, rendering it unfit for food.

The chief peculiarity of the hoactzin consists in the fact that when it is hatched it possesses four well developed legs. The young birds leave the nest and climb about like monkeys over the adjoining limbs and look more like tree toads than birds.

The modification of the fore limbs

begins at once after hatching, when the claws of the digits fall off and the whole clawlike hand begins to flatten and become wing shaped. Feathers soon appear, and before full growth is reached not a vestige remains of the original character.

The adult birds not only have no claws upon their wings, but their thumbs even are so poorly developed that one would hardly suspect that in the nestlings we have the nearest approach to a quadruped found among existing birds.-London Tit-Bits.

Tung Po and Teamaking. There is but one way of making tea.

To pour on water spoils the tea. The teapot itself should be heated very hot before the tea is placed in it and the boiling water poured on. It should be scalding hot water or the leaves will float to the top.

No less authority than Tung Po, the Chinese poet, is quoted for a recipe for teamaking. He says: "Whenever tea is to be infused take water from a running stream and boil it over a lively fire. It is an old custom to use running water, boiled over a lively fire. That from springs in the hills is said to be best and river water the next. while well water is the worst. A lively fire is a clear, bright charcoal fire. When making an infusion do not boil the water too hastily. At first it begins to sparkle like crabs' eyes, then somewhat like fish's eyes, and lastly it boils up like pearls innumerable springing and waving about. This is

EIGHT CENTS A DAY.

Workers' Pay In England When Board Was a Shilling a Week.

There was a time when a workman in England received 8 cents a day as an ordinary wage, when skilled artisans commanded 12 cents a day and when women worked in the field at such tasks as reaping straw, hoeing, planting beans and washing sheep for 2 cents a day, and a wise student of the subject has expressed the opinion that the British workman of that day was better off than he has ever been since then.

That sounds paradoxical. But the explanation is this: The workman who sold his services for 8 cents a day could buy good beef or mutton for the average only 18 cents a bushel. a week. The pay he would receive for fifteen weeks' services would suffice to purchase a supply of suitable foodstuffs, according to the standard of his time (consisting of wheat, malt and oatmeal), to maintain his family for

an entire year. Under these circumstances 8 cents a day-increased to 12 cents in harvest time-was a fair wage, and "times were good" for the average workman. -McClure's Magazine.

### THE ELECTROSCOPE.

Instrument by Which the Presence of Electricity Is Detected.

The electroscope is an instrument for the detection of electricity. It depends for its action on the principle that bodies charged with like electricity repel, while those charged with unlike electricity attract each other. The ordinary pith ball suspended on a silk thread is the simplest form of the instrument.

The most common type of electroscope is that devised by Bennett in 1787 and known as the gold leaf electroscope. It consists of two strips of gold leaf or thin aluminium foil suspended from the lower extremity of a conductor within a glass bottle or jar. The upper end of the conductor terminates in a ball or a plate in case the instrument is to be used as a condensing electroscope. If a body charged with positive electricity is brought near the knob of the electroscope the negative electricity will be attracted to the knob and the positive repelled to the leaves, which diverge. If now the finger is touched to the knob the positive electricity is drawn off and the leaves collapse, while the negative electricity is held bound. Removing the charged body, the leaves will diverge again, charged with negative electricity. In this case the instrument can be used to determine the nature of a charge of tive charge the leaves will colla with a negative charge spread farther apart.-Exchange.

### A STUDY IN FIGURES.

Calculations Necessary to Produce the Nautical Almanac.

It may safely be said that no one outside the publishing office has read the entire Nautical Almanac from beginning to end, but each figure of the printed almanac is in the office examined twice and read three times.

The total number of figures exceeds a million; but, great as that number is, it is trifling compared with the number of figures employed in the calculations, as the almanac figures represent "bare" results only. The moon, for instance, requires for its calculation more than a million and a half of figures, and similarly with other branches of the work, such as the sun, the planets, etc. Contrary to the general opinion, practically every figure in the book is fresh from year to

The tables from which nearly all the work is calculated have been originally constructed from the labors of the astronomical observer and to a large extent from the observations of the sun, moon and planets made at the Royal observatory, Greenwich. Telescopes and other astronomical appliances are conspicuously absent, as the work of the staff is purely mathematical and not observational.--London Telegraph.

A Legend of Mount Omi.

Mount Omi, on the border between western China and Tibet, has the longest staircase in the world. On top of the mountain there stands a Buddhist temple, around which gather some of the holiest traditions of that religion and which is made a Mecca to the Chinese. To facilitate the ascent of its slippery sides some 20,000 steps have been cut in the mountain, forming a single flight, up which the pilgrim toils. Because of its inaccessibility few Europeans have ever visited the spot, but a number of travelers have ascended the stairway and are positive that it is no legendary myth. There is a legend that in earlier times the pligrim was forced to ascend the mountain without artificial alds until the manks conceived the plan of requiring every pilgrim who would gain special benefit of his journey to cut a single step.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROHIBITING THE MANUFACTURE, SALE, BARTER AND EXCHANGE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS EXCEPT FOR MEDICINAL, SCIENTIFIC AND SACRAMENTAL PURPOSES.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2.

A resolution proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Article 16, Section 20, thereof by striking out and repealing said section, and substituting in lieu thereof a new Section 20, prohibiting the manufacture for purposes of sale, barter or exchange, and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors, on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, within 11/2 cents a pound. Wheat cost him on this State, except for medicinal, scientific and sacramental purposes, and providing He could get board for 12 to 16 cents that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall, at noon on the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; providing, further, that this section shall not prevent any session of the Legislature from passing any law to enforce the same; and, providing, further, that all laws in force when this amendment is adopted, providing penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture. sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors, shall remain in full force and effect until modified or repealed; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed constitutional amendment, directing a proclamation therefor and making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof, and method of voting; prescribing certain duties for the Governor of this State, and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election.

> Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

> SECTION 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out and repealing Section 20 thereof, and substituting in lieu of said Section 20 the following:

Section 20. The manufacture for purposes of sale, barter or exchange, and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, is hereby prohibited within this State, except for medicinal, scientific and sacramental purposes. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall, at noon, on the second Tuesday in January A. D. 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; but nothing in this section shall prevent any session a body brought near it, as with a posl- of the Legislature from passing any law force when this amendment is adopted providing remedies, penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture, sale or transportation of intoxicating liquors shall remain in full force and effect until modified or repealed.

SEC. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, being the twentysecond day thereof, A. D. 1911. At said election the vote shall be by official ballot, which shall have printed or written at the top thereof in plain letters the words "Official Ballot."

Said ballot shall have also written or printed thereon the words "For Prohibition," and the words "Against Prohibition."

All the voters favoring said proposed amendment shall erase the words "Against Prohibition" by making a mark through the same, and those opposing it shall erase the words "For Prohibition." If a majority of the votes cast at said election shall be "For Prohibition" said amendment shall be declared adopted. If a majority of the votes shall be "Against Prohibition" said amendment shall be lost and so declared.

All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of the electors, the method of holding such election, and in all other respects, as far as such election laws can be made applicable.

SEC. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury. not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

### Fresh Air in Pneumonia.

In talking of pneumonia to people in general it is necessary to say and repeat many times that pneumonia is not a bad cold run mad, for this conviction appears to be invincibly lodged in the lay

Pneumonia is first, last and all the time an acute local disease of the lungs, which, according to the gravity of the case, become more or less consolidated or choked up. tribution was made by lot. The first consequence of this helplessness on the part of the lungs is that the heart—that gallant organ—labors to get enough blood to keep things going, and this is why we see the distressing rapid and shallow customers have paid, violates the breathing so characteristic of the

With all the heart can do it can only pump blood, it can not oxygenate it-that is the function of the lungs. Presently, therefore, the blood stream becomes more and more impure owing to lack of oxygen, and in those cases ending in death one of two things happens -either the heart gives out entirely, unable to stand the strain put upon it, or else the system is overcome by toxins, that is to say, by the impurity induced by the lack of oxygenation.

It has long been recognized that what the pneumonia patient needs is oxygen, and we are now sure that this is best supplied by a direct current of fresh air from outside, and that this fresh air should be the basis of all treatment from the very beginning.

Too often has life been lost by a failure to recognize this truth or by a belief that rushing in canned oxygen at the last moment would effect a cure. There is less pneumonia among country dwellers than among city people. There is less pneumonia among people who ventilate well than among the stuffy. And there is less pneumonia in the summer than in the winter, because in the summer there is a free circulation of air through all our houses. The ideal treatment of pneumonia is to carry the patient into the open air and keep him there, with proper precautions against wind and weather. But as this can not always be done, the patient can at least be placed in the largest, sunniest and best ventilated room in the house. If possible, a room with windows on two sides is much to be preferred to one which can be opened only to one point of the compass. By a system of screening it can always be managed that a direct current of very cold air shall not blow right on the bed, but the air of the room should be constantly renewed and always cool.

## BRIDGES.

The Courier has found very few people opposed to a county superintendent of roads and bridges. It has found a number who opposed the bond issue, but favored the law giving the county a superintendent of roads and bridges. They gave as their reason for favoring the superintendent law after having opposed the bond issue that the creation of the office of roads and bridges would not increase their taxes. They see in the law an opportunity to improve the public road system without the addition of one cent of extra taxation. Therefore they favor the new Houston county road law creating the office.

A few have been misinformed and are opposing the superintendent law. They have been told by the arch enemies of the law that the salary of the county superintendent would increase their taxes. Those who have read the law know that it does not call for one cent of extra taxation, and those who have kept up with county affairs know that the new law will save to the road and bridge fund more than double the money necessary for the superintendent's salary. Those who have misrepresented the facts have done so wilfully and designedly and with no other purpose than the defeat of the will of the people as expressed in

Under the old road law each of the four county commissioners is allowed pay at \$2 a day for riding the roads 100 days in each year. Under the new law they are deprived of this pay. The salary of the county superintendent is placed at \$1200 a year. The money paid the commissioners for road riding, which the new law saves, lacks only \$400 of paying the superintendent's salary. If, after giving the new law a trial, a competent superintendent cannot save to the road and bridge fund four times \$400 out of the money that has been injudiciously spent for lumber and bridges in the past, he ought to be fired bodily and the office abolished. The Courier is of the belief that the new Houston county road law, instead of increasing the taxes of the people, will reduce their taxes.

It has been stated in some parts of the county that the new road law was gotten up by only a few the expense of the whole county. We believe they will, when they understand that their taxes are not to be increased and that the superintendent of roads and bridges is for the whole county. Instead of increasing their taxes, a superintendent ought to save to the road and bridge fund, besides the saving of wagon and teams.

The people of Houston county have all along declared that the system of working the public roads was a failure. Now is the time to show your sincerity. If you do not now vote for a county superintendent of roads and bridges, the question may well be asked, were you joking or bluffing?
