## HELM COMMITTEE REPORTS FINDINGS

LORIMER'S ELECTION IN 1909 ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH CORRUPTION AND BRIBERY.

TENDS TO SHOW BRIBERY FUND
Habeas Corpus Decision of Judge Petit Blocked Investigation of source of Fund.

Springfield, III., May 17.Senator Lorimer's election in corruption and bribery. Such i the tinding of the Helm com mittee of the senate of Illinois. In a report submitted to the senate this afternoon the five investigators assert that the proof large corruption fund was raised and used in bribing members the last general assembly in order to induce them to vere for order for senator. The committee reports that it sought to follow up trails leading toward the sources of bribery fund, but that it was blocked by the habeas corpus decision by Judge Adelor Petit in behalf of Edward Tilden, George M. Benedict and William C. Cummings. It reviews the evidence dis. passionately and gives its conclusions in the following terse sentence: "Your committee has reached the conclusion that the election of Willam Lorimer before the last general assembly would not have occurred had it not been for bribery and corruption."
The finding is the direct opposite of that reported by the subcommittee of the United States senate after its hearings in Chicago last summer. Brief as the conclusions are, the expectation here is that they will afford ample warrant for a re-opening of the Lorimer case by the United States senate.
The report was accepted by the senate and made a special order ing, by which time it is expected to be out of the hands of the state printer.
In drafting the report the committee carefully steered clear of sensationalism. The document is remarkable for its temperate tone. It makes no recommendations, the committee contenting itself with reviewing the evidence, dovetaling it together and voicing the simple conclusion that the Lorimer seat was bought

Art. 1242. All owners of automobiles or motor vehicles shall, before using such vehicles or machines upon the public roads, streets or driveways, register with the county clerk of the county in which he resides his name, which shall be registered by the county clerk in consenuive order in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall be numbered in the order of their registration, and it shall be the duty of such owner or owners to display in a conspicuous place on said machine the number

Men are try to various parts of the country to talk to and get expressions from certain wen likely to be summoned as veniremen in a mur der case. If the man be one the defense is afraid of, he is talked with and made, if possible, to ex proms being accepted. On th
from other hand, men favorable to ac quittal are "coached," so to say so that should they be placed on the panel they can generally be depended upon.

"The action of Judge Peebles is timely in that, aside from any other feature, it will call attention to the means used to defeat justice. "In a noted case in this state some years ago a dozen or more men were sent out all over the county, ostensibly selling books or enlarging pictures, bat the real object was to induce certain men to express an opinion uufitting them for sitting on the jury, while others were 'fixed.' Of course, effort is made to 'fix' the entire papel, but success can be attained only by having three or four men of the right kind. 'Experts' of this knd are to be found in every county. In case they can not
handle the whole bunch they can at least the whole bunch they can not know that legislation is needed to cure this evil, but there is a remedy that can be used if the proper effort if made.

Ten years ago we produced about 500 million bushels of wheat and exported $37 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent of it; now we produce 700 million bushels of wheat and export 17 per cent. In the same time our corn crop has grown from $2 t$ billion bushels to 24 billion
bushels, but the home bushels, but the home demand
has so increased that our export have fallen from nine to three per ctnt. For all these years we have been in the proud position of having corn and wheat for sale and cheap food for all our people but unless we immediately an radically change our agricultural fethods we will within the nex The years be buyers of food. The pertinent question is: "Who
will have it for sale at anything like reasonable prices?"
It behoves us therefore to save and to use every particle of fer tilizing matter that is within ou reach. The nitrogen, phosphorous and potash in the stalks from 100 buabels of corn are worth in car-
load lots today, if we had to buy it, $\$ 10.55$. The same mineral elements in the stalks from bale of cotton are worth $\$ 9.69$ as a rule we burn both and tem porarily destroy the usefulness o the land upon which the fires are ligbted. We are not only clipping the coupons, but we are cutting into the body of the bonds.
The people must be taught the verything possible of returning of fertilizers to the soil, protect ing it from washing by terracing, and plowing around instead of up and down the slopes. They must be taught to thoroughly prepare the lands betore planting the arefully-selected seed, and by constant shallow mulch cultivation o keep down the weeds. They must not lay by and leave their crops, but must be taught to know that as the stalk grows know that as the stalk grow
larger it has more live weight to sustain and it needs more nourish ment. Cultivation should continne ntil the crop is positively made The rule has been to lay by the rop and leave it to fight the uckers, weeds, dry parched eart and hot winds alone, when its lif
work is yet to be accomplished.
The corn and cotton rows should be $4 \frac{1}{2}$ or 5 feet apart instead of three feet apart, so that it will be possible to continue the cultivation one last item mentiod. If this ot to lay by and leave the nely, of to keep a soft mulch on to

## WIIL, If enacted, obliterat Distinctions betwern good AND BAD TRUSTS.

BY SIMPLE AMENDMENTS.
The Words, "Of Whatever Charac ter," are to Be inserted in Two Different Sections.

Washington, May 17.-The firs move to counteract the effect of the new interpretation given to the anti-trust act by the supreme court in its Standard Oil decision on Monday was made today by Senator Culberson of Texas.
He introduced a hill seeking to reaffirm by express enactment the conviction of the lawmaking branch of the government that the true interpretation of the anti-trust act as regards restrants between the states is the interpretation placed on it by the supreme court in the series of decisions rendered by the court previous to the Standard Oil decision of Monday. In these earlier decisions, as pointed ou by Aasoctate Justice Harlan, the coust dra not claim the power to draw a distinction between reasonable and unreasonable restraint of trade or good and bad trusts. The court apparently took th view that the anti-trust act pro bibited all contracts in restraint of trade between states and all combinations formed for the purpose of restraining or monopolizgardless of whether they were or might be regarded as reasonable or unreasonable. The bill introduced in the senate today by simple amendments of the very age of the anti-trust act to plan beyond possibility of toubtace fact that it is and was the purpo of congress to prohibit all cone tracts and combinations con restrain trade betmeen the that or tend in that direction.
culabrson's insertio
The first section of the anti crust act of 1890 now begins: "Every contract or combination in the form of trust or otherwise or conspiracy in restraint of trade or commerce among the several states, or with foreign nations is lereby declared to be illegal." In this eentence the Culberson bill proposes to insert the words "of whatever character" after the word "nations."
The first sentence of section 3 of the act begins with the word every contract, combination in conspiracy in restraint of trade, or commerce in any territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia, etc., is declared illegal." Here again Senator Calberson proposes to insert after the word "commerce" the words "of whatever character." By these simple emendments it is the belief of Senator Culberson and other able lawyers in congress that the language of the anti-trust the will be made so comprehensive and incluaive as regards the con tracts and combinstions prohibited by it that no court can foil ecognize the wide seope of the sct and its intent to put outside the pale of the law absolutily sll contracts and combination cestraining trade or tendie thereto, whether they tending hareto, whether they may or able.
And to further strengthen the
parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed, but this shall not affect rights and liabilities which arose or accrued under any previous laws or actions
or proceedings begun under such or proceeding
previous laws.
previous laws."
The Culberson bill was referred the judiciary committee, from which the anti-trust act was reported in 1890. Just how the membership of the committee will line up on the bill has not yet developed. But it is beheved a majority of the committee may be ounted on as favorable to this proposed legislation.
