## ELECTION IS

DECLARED VOID.
by district judge gardner at CROCKEII FRIDAY.

Set Aside on Grounds of IllegalityElection Returns Illegally Made.

A spectal session of the district A special session of the district day to hear the contest case af fecting the recent election for county road and hridge superintendent. Judge Gardner arrived Friday morning from Palestine and opened court soon after the arrival of his train. Court was
held in the district court room and the sheriff, district clerk and and the sheriff, district clerk and
court stenographer were in attendacce. Besides the officials, the acce. Besides the officials, the
court room was half filled with in terested spectators, something like a dozen men being present from Grapeland and a fair representa tion from other parts of the county.
Attorney John I. Moore appear ed for defendants, the commis sioners' court, and Attorney D. A Nunn Jr. for plaintiffs, W. B Page and others. Mr. Nunn pre sented formally his petition for the contest, and reviewed the law governing the election and the law governing the counting of votes. His contention was that the law authorized the commissioners court to open the boxes and count the votes, and that as the commissioners had refused to do this, the plaintiffs were forced into the district court for relief.
Mr. Moore, in his pleading be fore the court, contended that if there were illegal votes cast at Grapeland and other places a specified by the contestants, there other boxes and not specified. He raised the point that the clause in the Houston county road law, pre scribing who should vote in the election to abolish the office of superintendent, was unconstitu tional in that only real estate owners should vote when other propetty taxpayers were equally af fected. At this point the judge asked the attorney to cite his aathorities and the attorney replied that he had none ready. Mr. Nunn, on being asked, replied that he had none and that he was
not raising the question. Judge Gardner then announced that as i was nearly the noon hour he
would adjourn court untal 2 o'clock and look up the authori ties.
At 2 o'clock court was resumed and the judge announced that in his opinion the clause prescribing who should vote in the election was not unconstitutional. That was one point settled. Mr. Nunn reviewed the law governing the making of election returns. He charged that not only had illegal votes been cast, but that the elec
tion returns had been illegally made. Mr. Moore, while making a general denial as to illegal votes mitted that the returns had been illegally made.
asked the attorneys if they could
not confer with their respective not confer with their respective
sides and settle the contest by agreement on the ground of 11 legality of the election returns. The attorneys and their clients
withdrew to the witness rooms, and after conferring for some time, returned and announced in open court that they had agreed, if their agreement met with the endorsement of the court, to have the election set aside on the ground of illegal election returns. The judge entered an order on the minutes that the contest was set-
tled by agreement and that another election should be held.
It was not a victory for either It was not a victory for either
side, as the Courier sees it. The contestants were seeking to force the commissioners' court to re-
count the votes. The commissioners wert seeking to have the election result stand as canvassed and declared by them. The contestants were working to the point of having the votes recounted and the commissioners were opposing any recount. Incidentally the attorneys agreed on the point of illegal returns, and the election was declared null and vord on that ground. The election was knocked contest thus ended. The question of illegal voting was not gone into, further than the constitationality of the clause prescribing who should vote.

GOVERNOR'S EMANCIPAIION
ssues Pardons to Thirty Old Negroe Confined in State Prisons.

Austin Texas, June 19.-The Ararts of thirty aged negroes now
langutisting in the state penitentiary were made glad to-day when the governor, according to promise, signed their pardons and truly an emancipation for them many of whom, it is lazned have been confined in the penitentiary so long that they have forgotton the nature of the crimes for which they were sentenced or the counties from which they
were sent. Several aged Mexicans were also pardoned to-day as a result of the personal inspection of the convict farms last week by the governor. These Mexicans have been serving time for many years, and in one case one was sent up
for life. These unfortunates have for life. These unfortunates have had no friends to intercede for them and in most cases are ignorant and do not even under stand the English language.
There were twelve life men pardoned, all having served over fifteen years. One had been given life, and ten years in two cases; one had a fifty-year sentence and another was up for twenty-five years. Qne old negro pardoned has been in the penitentiary twenty years and notwithstanding the treatment accorded the prisoners in the long ago, only two demerits were charged against him, both trivial and typical of a negro, one having been for laziness and the other for singing in his cell.

"Upon recommendation of the acting director, the department of commerce and labor dismissed the ringleader and penalized the other participants by demotions and suspensions without pay.
"The acting director, when seen last evening at his residence, was unwilling to give out for publication the names of those concerned." The International and Great Northern Railroad, with headquarters in Palestine, was sold at public auction today by Master Commissonener W. H. Fhppen, and brought twelve million, six bundred ang forty-five thousand dol lars.
Promptly at the noon hour today Master Commissioner Flippen stood on the south steps of the International and Great Northern depot and in the presence of possibly one thousand people, many tadiey included, read the order of sale of this road, the reading requiring some twenty or thirty five minates. The commissioner then called for bids.
However, before any bids were made Attorney T. B. Greenwood, acting for the attorneys represent. ing the city of Palestine and the county of Anderson, served votice that by coniract entered into between this city and county and the railroad, the general offices and machine shops and headquarters of the International and Great Northern railroad had been permanently located here to be here maintained, and that this notice was to serve that the eity and county woold expect said contract to be perpetuated.
The master commissioner then caller for bids Frank C. Nicodemus Jr,, representing the third mortgage bondholders' committee wade the first and only bid, and wade the first and only bid, and bought the rat
Immadistely following the Tmmediately following the sale the entire partv, headed hy Roceiver Freeman, left on a special train for Dailas, where papere of the sale will be placed on file, and the sale finally and legally closed. Stated in plain language, the Gould interests, as commonly termed, retain control of the rond by the sale.

## Pip Pocket Defense.

'In law, what ples so tainted and corrupt, but, being seasoned with a gracions voice, ohscures the show of evil!" asks Shakespeare, who, by the way, was not a conspicuous friend of the law and lawyers.
Now comes the judiciary of South Carolina and declares, in effect, that the "hip pocket defense" sh homicide cases is such a plea. Speaking through Mr. Justice Hydrick, the South Carohina Supreme Court, in State ve. Glenn, 70 Southeastern Reporter, 453, decides that "the hip pocket defense has sbeen so overworked that it has come to be a byword, just as has the defense of 'irresistible impulse' or 'brain storm,'" though possessing merit in some ases.
The declaration was made in determining that the trial judge's charge to the grand jury, of was not ground for reversing Glenn's conviction, though do livered in the presence of the petit jurors:
"Now I see several murder cases on your docket. I know nothing of them, but I can guess nothing of them, but I can guess
what the defense will be. It will be that "the deceased put his hand to his hip pocket to shoot me, and I had to shoot him in self-defense," and it turns out seif-defenge, and it turns out
that the deceased had no pistol. I can illastrate it by a story: "A fellow out West, who made a fusiness of robbing graves and furnishing the bodies to a medical furnishing the bodies to a medical college for the young men to practice dissection on, had robbed a grave and was carrying the subject to the college, and as he passed by a bar-room he saw quite a crowd so there drinking.
