Prohibition Issue Blds Fair to Show Up Early, Stay Late and Give Much Trouble.
Austin, Texas, July 31.-The special session of the Texas legislature convening here this morn ing is going to be a history-makin one, according to the statement of members and numerous visiting politicians.
The prohibition issue, it would seem, is going to be injected from the very jump and to such purpose that the antis in either house will seek to invite the pros to withdraw their organization from the democratic party and paddle their own canoe. As to whether the pros will be considerate enough to do this remains to be seen, but pros now on the ground are candid enough to say that they are the democratic party themselves and that the other party must move if any moving is done.
The investigation of the socalled liquor interests securing the election of candidstes in general and special elections is charged by some to be aimed principally at Bailey and Colquitt, and some say that the proposition in question is a two dory deongerous to going to be very dangerous to fool with. However, he so-called hot heads an investigation of everything and everybody, and as the pros have the majority in both houses and as no Texas legisiature is eve complete without an investigatio it 18 more than likely that the en of the present week will find legislative committee deep in the confines of $a$ healtty and extensive investigation.
President Davidson of the senate says outspokenly that he is opposed to giving the pros any quarter. His anti following in the senate are at a like opinion. Speaker Rayburn of the house says that be looks for squally times. House members agree with him. Governor Colquitt wants an appropriation bill and "legislative and political peace." READY FOR WORK
House Already Oroanized - Appro priation Bills-Senate Slower Than House.

Austin, Texas, July 31.-With ractically the entire membership present, both branches of the exas legislature to-day organized for the special session, notified he governor of the fact, received his message and adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow, the house quitting at noon and the senate after 4 o'clock.
The senate labored longer than the house berause of the house onsidering its organization of last winter to still be in force, merely filling suck vacancies as had occurred, whereas the senat proceeded to organize from the round up because Lieutenan Governor Davidson held such to be necessary. It elected prac tically the same officers as before and then notitied the governor it was ready for business. That notice, by a somewhat grim joke was sent by three prohibition senators, Cofer, Sturgeon and Warren, and it was remarke that the lieutenant governor perbaps thought they ought to get equainted with the chief execuve. Following this notice th overnor sent his message. Lien enant Governor Davidson rule hat no action could be taken pon it as the senate had no rules. Thereupon Senator Cofer quickl ooved to adjourn and the motion prevailed. With no rules, th onate has no committees. Seem ngly, there is a chance fo nother scrap such as was wage ast winter over these subjects. The prohibitionists, without truggle, elected Senator C. V Terrell of Wise as president pro em. He received twenty-four votes. The antis made no nomina on for the place. It is under tood that neither Senator Carte nor Senator Ratcliffe would permi the use of their names. Th enate authorized each membe to subscribe for three daily news papers. The house did not reach his matter to-day.
The house completed its busi eess in two hours, and upon motio of Representative Lee and by the votes of prohibitionists, adjourne antll to-morrow, presumebly. to attend the prohibition conference the court hoose. Before this adjournment had been taken, Kepresentative Cox of Rockwal had introduced the general appro priation bill, a bill appropriating 30,000 for mileage and per diem 30,000 for mileage and per die for contingent expenses.

To his friends Mr. Bailey saic afterward that he could not con ent quired in the investigation of the chargea aganst Senator Stephen son.
"I have been appointed on the sub committee to consider the Stephenson case," he said. "My conviction is that the strict rules of evidence should control in al such inquiries. The senate does not observe such rules, but admits all kinds of matter. I can not see my way clear to decide a case of such magnitude on such a basis, and therefore have tendered my resignation as a member of the committee
Senator Bailey later said the strong prohability of his being a member of the conference committee on the wool tariff bill rendered it impossible for bim to serve on the Stephenson com-
mittee, even if there was no other reason.
"Four of the six democrats now on the committee on privileges ana elections, he said, are nov Senator Lorimer's election, thus leaving but two democrats on that committee not so employed. As one of those two democrats, I was ppointed on the committee to investigate the Stephenson case and it will be simply imposase for me to do that wimpossible prform my dutt as a member the conference committee on the wool bill."
