TO GUARD BORDER.

Ranger Service Being Increased to Preserve Neutrality Laws.

San Antonio, Texas, October 10.—For the purpose of enlisting recruits for the Texas Rangers who are to patrol the Mexican border in an effort to prevent the violation of the neutrality laws of the United States, and the use of Texas territory as the scene of operations for discontented Mexicans, Captain J. W. Hughes of the state ranger force is in the city. He has established headquarters here and will remain here a week for this purpose. He expects to get two or three former deputy sheriffs and ex-rangers in line for service.

This action is the result of a conference between Governor Colquitt and President Taft held recently at Kansas City at which the matter of guarding the border was discussed, and President Taft suggested further recruiting of the ranger force and the assignment of them to border duty. This the president suggested would avoid the necessity of the United States keeping the troops stationed on the border and would have a tendency towards lessening the warlike appearance that the presence of the troops would give.

Lorimer Investigation is Renewed in Chicago.

Chicago, October 10.—No new evidence was expected at the first sessions of the reopening of the United States senate investigation into the election of William Lorimer here to-day. Eight witnesses, seven of the members of the Illinois general assembly, by which Senator Lorimer was elected, were scheduled as the first witnesses. All of these have testified before, either before the Helm committee in Springfield, or the first United States senate committee which investigated the corruption charges.

Senator Dillingham, chairman of the committee, announces that the rules of testimony would not be sacred in the coming session.

"We shall continue to allow all testimony bearing in any way upon the investigation to be admitted, regardless of technicalities," he said.

TRUST BUSTING CASE UPPERMOST

Sherman Anti-trust Law Involved in First Call by Supreme Court.

Washington, Oct. 10.—After striving for nearly two years to interpret the Sherman anti-trust law in the Standard Oil and Tobacco cases, the supreme court of the United States was brought face to face again on this, the first day of argument of cases in the new term, with the self-same Sherman anti-trust law.

The Tobacco case was the last case decided at the preceding term of the court ending May 29. The so-called "hard coal case," another governmental "trust busting suit," was found at the head of the line for consideration today.

The "hard coal case" originated in a dissolution suit begun in the United States circuit court for Eastern Pennsylvania against the principal railroads carrying anthracite coal and coal-owning companies. A general conspiracy to reduce competition in the transportation and sale of coal was charged and in addition a number of special conspiracies of various groups of defendants were charged. The lower court decided against the government on every point except that the Temple Iron Company, of which the railroad defendants owned the stock, was

held to be in violation of the law. The government, however, was not content with the decree even in regard to the Temple Iron company and so appealed the whole case to the supreme court. The railroads and the coal companies also appealed.

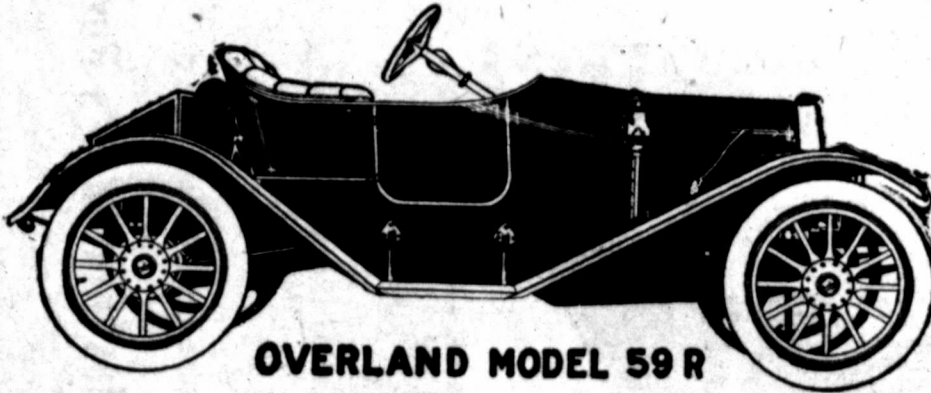
Accident Kills Soldier.

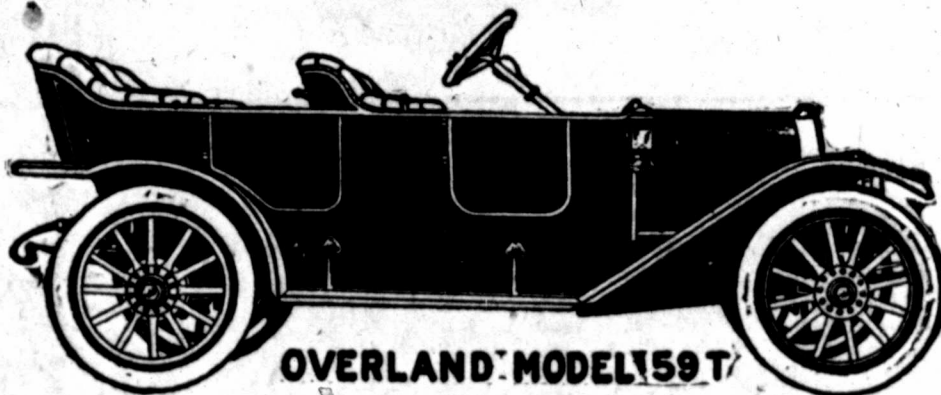

WRECKED THE PIANO.

Rubinstein Proved His Ability and Secured His Pass.

When Rubinstein, the composer, was a youth he left Russia, his native country, to study music in France and Germany. He finished his studies when he was twenty years old and then returned to St. Petersburg. But before he could begin to give public recitals it was necessary that he should have a pass from the police authorities. It was true he was a Russian subject and a very inoffensive young man, but then he had been absent from his native land some time. "Well, young man, I have been spoken to about you. I am told that you are some sort of musician, but I don't believe anything of the kind. Go to my chief secretary, Schesnok, and play for him, so that we can tell if you really are a musician—that is, a man who understands music."

All this was said in a contemptuous tone. Rubinstein was taken to the secretary, who was the possessor of the most wretched piano Rubinstein ever had heard, much less played on. He was angry and disgusted, and a thought flashed across him. Here was an opportunity to be revenged for the insults heaped upon him. He would vent his indignation on the piano. And so he did. He pounded and hammered the poor instrument until it seemed to shriek. The discordant notes which came from it, falling upon his delicate ear, served but to increase his rage and frenzy. It was as if a cyclone was at work. String after string snapped, and the unhappy secretary stood by, expecting every minute that his beloved instrument would fly into splinters. At last Rubinstein stopped from sheer exhaustion.

"Come with me," said the secretary. And the pianist followed him into the presence of the chief of police.

"It is true, your excellency," he said. "Rubinstein is a great musician."

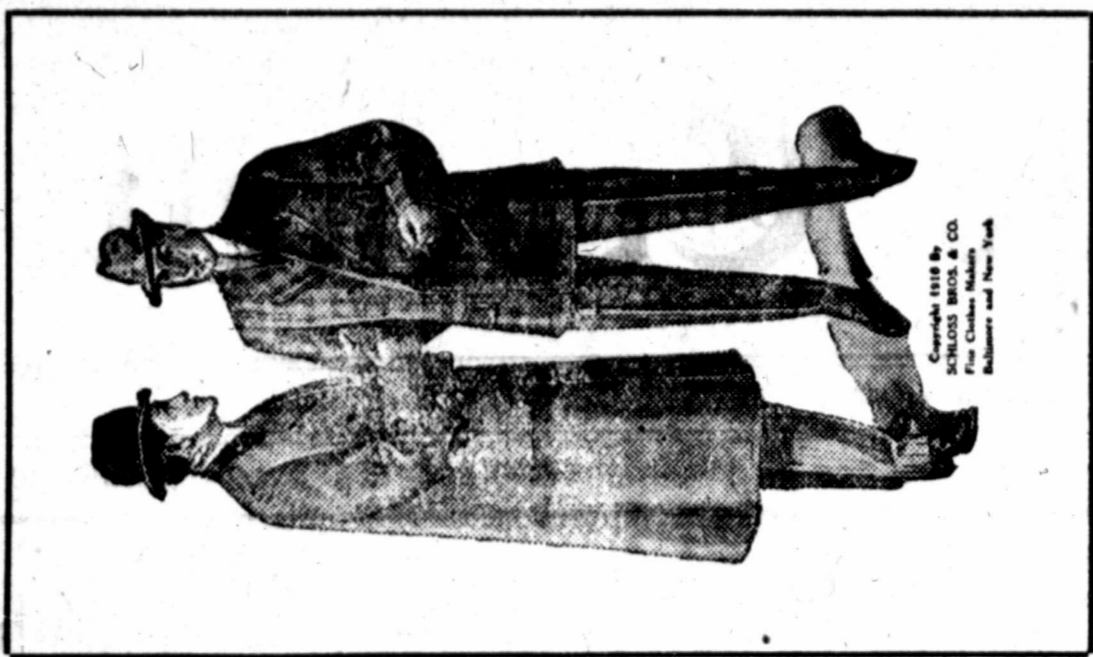
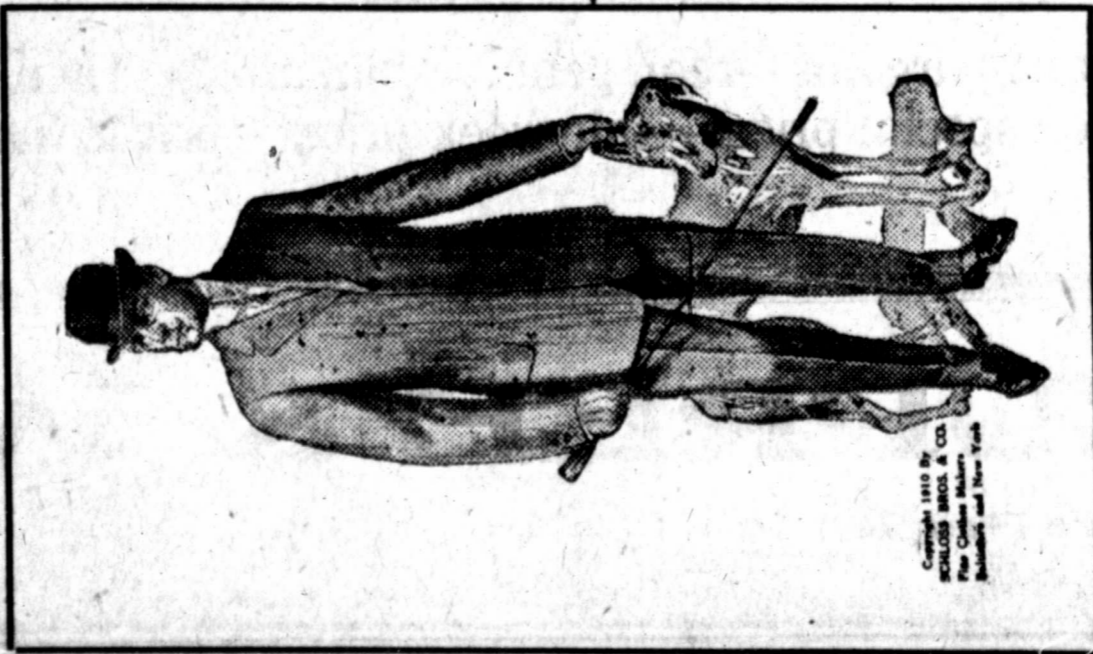

A Trip Through Four States.

Editor Courier:
 As everybody knows, Denver is the capitol of Colorado. It stands on an elevation nearly 5,200 feet above sea level. The majestic mountains, sublime in their snow-crowned summits, environ the city most romantically. It is cosmopolitan in character; it draws people, by reason of its picturesque situation and healing climate, from all civilization. This is shown by the character of its population, which consists of 225,000 permanent residents and a "floating" population of 275,000.
 In 1858 adventurous gold hunters first pitched their camps at the junction of Cherry creek and the Platte. From this small beginning has sprung the beautiful city I am attempting to describe. It is called the "Queen City of the Plains," and is the largest city between the Missouri river and San Francisco. It is destined to be the most important center of the American continent in the West, on account of its central location to all mining in the Rockies, its extensive irrigation plans, one of which is the Gunnison river enterprise, recently completed, called the "Gunnison Tunnel," and its railroad facilities, not to mention the progressiveness of its inhabitants. We found the people of Denver the most friendly and hospitable and jolly set that we encountered on our trip. They know how to make you "feel at home" and enjoy yourself to the limit. In fact, they reminded us more of the people of Texas than residents of any other state and we accused them all of being Texans. Many admitted that it was true, but they are there from all the states and throughout the world. One young lady took occasion to tell us that she was not exactly from Texas but was as near it as she could get and was "from Missouri."
 Mounting the "Seeing Denver" trolley car, we were carried practically all over the city, visiting both its residence and its business sections and saw many things of

great interest. For instance, Denver has thirty-nine (39) city parks, and no money or labor is spared to make them superbly attractive. No attempted description would do them justice, for the eye never beheld anything of the kind more beautiful. Its boulevards, zoological gardens, manufacturing establishments, railroad terminals, etc., are all interesting to the highest degree and one never tires of looking at what is to be seen. The capitol building is a magnificent structure and cost the state \$2,800,000. Its dome is covered with gold and glistens and sparkles from its lofty elevation "like a diamond in the sky." We asked our guide why they covered the dome with gold when the precious metal did not appear in any other part of the building. He answered that "when they covered the building shingles were scarce and gold was plentiful and it was the part of economy to use the gold." Of course, this settled it, but we took occasion to tell him that, while

the capitol building of Texas contained no gold, it was built of Texas granite, the finest in the world, contained twelve (12) acres of floor space, and cost \$3,000,000 or \$200,000 more than the Denver structure. He said he had always heard that Texas is nearly as good a state as Colorado and that its most imposing buildings were almost as fine. Then there is one of Uncle Sam's buildings where he makes his money, one of the "mints" being located there. Much to our regret we did not visit this building and mention it only as a fact. In short, this "sight-seeing" trip on the "Trolley Parlor Observation Cars" can not be excelled as a means of getting a pretty fair idea of the city. The trip is eighteen (18) miles in length and occupies two (2) hours time. Only a faint account of the many attractions on the route can be given here. In its course are to be seen residences representing a cost of \$20,000,000, miles of mountain ranges in the near distance, making it one of the grandest "outings" in Colorado, and is a trip of pleasure, comfort and education combined.

Upon an unbroken plateau, tipping imperceptibly toward the south—an ideal location—lies the city of Colorado Springs, which has fulfilled every hope of its founders. With a population of 40,000, it possesses more up-to-date advantages of an urban character than any other community of its proportions in the West at least. It is laid out with artistic exactness, with wide, smooth, naturally macadamized streets—some of them beautifully parked—and it maintains a public park system that is not surpassed by any city of double its population. Magnificent metropolitan buildings adorn its business streets, and in its residence districts are many truly palatial homes, for among its citizens is a good-sized colony of retired millionaires who have picked it out from all the world. It has a superior school system, a university of a high reputation, beautiful churches, splendid fire-

A Trip Through Four States.

These mountains are always an object of the most intense interest, even if one gets no closer to them than is obtained by traveling along the lines of railway, which worm and twist around and near them. It is even true that "distance lends enchantment to the view," but to really enjoy and appreciate them one must "draw near," and if he can not ascend he will instinctively stand and admire. It is a majestic scene and has furnished a most thrilling theme for poet and artist, not one of whom has ever done them justice. No tongue can fully describe them and no mind can fully comprehend them. These sentinels of Nature, like "Nature's God," are beyond the power of man's capacity to

fathom or comprehend.

Among these mountains, some of the most interesting of which are in plain view from Colorado Springs, there are some of deeper interest than others, and these have been the object of special comment in poetry, art and history. Chief of them all is the great mountain known as "Pike's Peak." This great natural wonder has already been briefly referred to, but its importance deserved a more extended notice.

"A sentinel it stands
In rugged majesty."

The Monument of the Continent! No term could be more fitting. Serene and bold it stood, a noble monument, throughout the myriad years that spanned the cycles of antiquity. Still grand and vigilant, its snow-crowned crest gave

to the toiling path-finders the first glad signal that there were limits to the dreary waste of plain. For the pioneers that followed, it served not only as a monumental landmark, but its name stood for all the vast country whose border it guarded—not only the known regions, but that greater sketch of awesome mountain mystery. And now, the swifter and more luxurious traveler, in his journeyings towards the setting sun, hails it first as he speeds across the plain, and—be it ever so familiar—gazes eagerly and with quickened pulses as the lessening distance expands its majesty and beauty to his view.

Pike's Peak is history—a strange and hushed romance. Oblivion veils its mystic past. No crumbling parchments hint its thrilling tales. Yet it is older, so scientists relate, than regions that are thus gazetted. Men lived and wrought and vanished in that long ago. The great white mountain watched it all, and locked the secret in its mighty breast.

Authentic lore of this monument of the continent dates from November 13, 1806, when Major Zebulon M. Pike, a gallant soldier and a daring adventurer, then heading a small exploring party of United States soldiers, sighted the mountain's whitened crest when many miles distant upon the plains. It cost him ten days' marching to reach its base, and, after vigorous attempts to scale it, Pike abandoned the project with the declaration that "No human being could ascend its pinnacle." That was long ago. There have been many wonders since.

Beginning then, Pike's Peak saw busier times. The region passed through varying vicissitudes, and now an empire lies within the mountain's shade. Enormous riches crowd its depths and lurk about its base, and the hum of industry is wafted on its breeze.

These are the subjects that could well fill volumes. But it is Pike's Peak itself, its scenic attractions and its unique railway,

that form the purpose of this sketch. However, these must be reserved for further and more extended notice than can be given in this article. They embrace the great "Scenic Railway" or "A Railroad Ride Above the Clouds," "A Glimpse of Manitou," "The Cliff Dwellers' Canon" and other interesting subjects. But I will refer to other features of this the greatest of mountains for the present.

Among these are the burning but charming words of Major Pike himself upon his discovery of this great natural "skyscraper." In his report he said: "When our small party arrived on the hill they with one accord gave three cheers to the 'Mexican Mountain.' The summit of the grand peak, which was entirely bare of vegetation and covered with snow, now appeared at the distance of fifteen or sixteen miles and as high again as what we had ascended, and would have taken a whole day's march to have arrived at its base. On the 17th of November we marched with an idea of arriving at the mountains, but at night found no visible difference in their appearance."

Under the circumstances it is fitting that this great mountain should bear the name of him who first described it to the English-speaking people. Captain Pike probably had no idea that he immortalized himself when he looked upon the mountain which perpetuates his name. His pluck deserves this reward, even if he did not succeed in climbing where to-day thousands of excursionists go in luxury, but not always with safety. J. W. Madden.


