A Trip Through Four States.

Mr. Editor:

At the base of the great mountain, "Pike's Peak," is what is known as "Engleman's Glen," one of the beauty spots of earth. It is a place in which to lie supine and rest; to listen to the voices of the swaying pines and the music of a limpid, purring stream; to gaze on a world of color, to feast on Nature's grace; to breathe God's purest air and offer up a prayer of thankfulness to Him for all He has bestowed.

At the mouth of "Engleman's Glen," close to the famous Ute Iron Spring, is the Manitou Station of the "Cog-Wheel Route," upon which one enters in order to ascend the famous mountain. The electric road from Colorado Springs through Manitou terminates at the station platform. Here the start is made for the "ride above the clouds."

At first the interest is centered in the novel train, but after the start the attention is quickly diverted to the surroundings. As the glen narrows, its attractiveness expands. One of the steepest grades on the line is encountered soon after leaving the Manitou station, and the glen soon merges into a canon-like defile. The train hugs the left-hand wall, beneath dizzy, pine-clad heights. On the right is a yawning gulch, and the Ruxton churns and splashes through a bed of giant boulders. At times the rivulet is hidden beneath a confused mass of rocks, big as houses, but farther along it re-appears, foaming, clamoring,

rioting. Anon little parks open up in the chasm and quaint and striking pictures form.

Minnehaha is the first stop. A quaint hamlet of rustic cottages snuggled in a tiny park, it takes its name from Minnehaha Falls, whose foaming waters fill the air with melody. Next, through scenes of ever-changing beauty, the Half-Way house, which is far from half-way to the summit, is reached. Here new interests are presented.

The Half-Way house is a rustic mountain hotel surrounded by a grove of stately pines, and towering above it the pinnacled rocks of "Hell Gate," through whose portals the train then passes.

There are six stations on the line besides the terminals and three water tanks—for the engine is a thirsty monster. At one of these may be strikingly seen the apparent phenomenon of water flowing up-hill in an open trough. Another illusion that excites comment is in the grade. Every inch of the road is up, yet when approaching a moderate from a steeper grade, anyone would declare that the track ahead was a down grade.

Quaint beauties, grotesque shapes and strange illusions fairly crowd the way. The conductor shows them all. Among the surprises is a printing office perched on the mountain side. Here a souvenir daily paper is issued with the news of Pike's Peak, the names of its visitors, illustrations, descriptions, etc.

The climb is unceasing. Ere

long the scene expands. The verdured hills shrink back and leave the big bleak Peak a towering monument. The trees desert the landscape, and groups of stunted aspens shiver in the breeze. Grand vistas open everywhere. A sense of awe transcends that of delight.

The scenes of near-by interest now are gone. Rocks, gaunt and jagged, only line the way. The train now gains in elevation rapidly. The air grows chill, windows must be shut and outer wrappings donned. Away below, itself high in the hills, is spread out like a mirror, the crystal, placid Lake Moraine, about whose shores tradition weaves some thrilling legendary tales. Thick billowy clouds—unless the day be strictly fair—float far below. In the early season snow is everywhere, and forms some strange effects. The opening of the road in the spring involves cutting through enormous depths of snow and ice. The locomotive labors sturdily and heroically on, and presently and unexpectedly—ninety minutes from the time of starting—the train halts on the summit.

Colorado is spread below, from an elevation fourteen thousand, one hundred and forty-seven feet above the level of the sea, a vast expanse of 60,000 square miles greet the view! And yet—in the matter of scenic points—altitude is not everything. There are higher peaks, even in the Rocky Mountain range. But there is no accessible elevation on earth that

affords so extensive a range of vision, or a view so varied and inspiring, as that from the summit of Pike's Peak. And the reason is simple. All other accessible mountains of elevations approaching that of Pike's Peak are in the midst of mountain chains; consequently, the views from their summits are uninterruptedly mountainous and the ranges of vision restricted by the surrounding heights. Standing isolated, at the very extremity of a grand spur of the Rockies, Pike's Peak guards both mountain and plain, and the view from its summit presents, in juxtaposition, diametrically opposite effects.

And the magnificent sweeping view! How futile is description! Here is sublimity; here is immensity incredible! There, to the West, stand a thousand towering peaks in spotless white—majestic, beautiful, awful! On the East, a mighty ocean of plain, superb and placid, stretches infinite. The eye is strained, the senses dazed in grasping the proportions of that stupendous sea. And the sun shines golden on its glimmering sands, while purple shadows wander here and there beneath the shifting clouds.

There are nearer things to view, but they must wait description for another article.

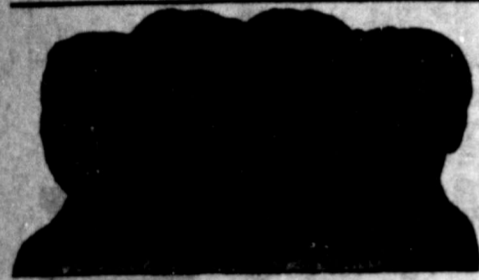

When Will Ramsey Resign?

Austin, Texas, October 15.—Judge Ramsey's declaration of principles, printed in to-day's papers, created a great deal of interest in the forthcoming gubernatorial race and his statement that he would resign from the bench was the subject of much discussion. The question is, when will he resign? Will he wait until after the primaries or soon in the new year, when time comes for an active canvass? It is supposed he meant the last, in fact, it is generally accepted that he will remove the ermine and take to the hustings about the first of March, though it might be done a little sooner, as he will probably make his opening address on Washington's birthday anniversary, February 22.

Thus far no names have been mentioned as to whom the governor would appoint on the bench, but it is expected that he will be an anti-prohibitionist, thus giving the bench two Colquitt appointees and two anti, Judge Dibrell now being there. There are now two pros on the bench, Judges Brown and Ramsey, though Judge Brown is not understood as being a statewider. He is a strong pro in local option.

Judge Dibrell will be a candidate in the primaries, as will the other appointees of the governor to succeed Judge Ramsey, and there promises to be an interesting situation as to the election of those two members of the court. It will probably be pro against anti—a reflection of the governor's race and probably other contests for state office.

Indian Land Ruling.

Pawhuska, Okla., Oct. 16.—Restrictions upon Osage Indian lands do not follow the land title after the same has passed to a white man, according to a ruling of the department of the interior at Washington. The case in which the question came up was one involving a deed made by Henry E. Swain to Messrs. Mitchell & White of this city several months ago. Swain, a white man, had married an Indian woman, from which marriage issued one child. Both woman and the child owned allotted land. The child died, leaving the mother heir to its land, and when the mother died, too, part of the land went to her white husband, Swain. He later sold the land to White & Mitchell.

The deed to the latter was sent to the secretary of the interior for approval. The new owners in doing so contended that the restrictions incumbent upon Osage Indian land did not follow the title, but were restrictions upon the individual allottee only. The deed was returned with the secretary's approval.

Millions of Bugs.

San Antonio, Texas, October 10.—Small winged bugs by the millions invaded San Antonio and for nearly two hours business in the city was practically at a standstill. The air around electric lights was filled with millions of them. At times the air in the drug stores and restaurants was so thick the lights were dimmed. No attempt was made to sell eatables during the invasion. The bugs could inflict a very painful bite and made things very uncomfortable. They gathered in the greatest numbers about the arc lights. Women who were en route to the theaters suffered much inconvenience. The bugs settled on their arms and necks by the thousands, causing much pain by their frequent bites. Where men had to work by electric lights they were forced for a time to abandon their desks and cut off the lights. The hotel corridors were filled with the pests and the guests hurriedly sought their rooms, where they closed doors and windows. It is by far the greatest invasion of bugs this city has ever seen.

Money Made in Farming.

The prosperity of the farmers in New York state is beyond dispute. There is more money in the business and fewer people to divide it than ten years ago.

Fifteen rural counties of New York, as appears by a census bulletin just issued, had fewer residents in 1910 than in 1900. But outside of villages and towns the actual rural population decreased in forty-two of the sixty-one counties of the state. To some extent this means a decline of the lumbering industry, but smaller families and more labor saving machinery have something to do with it. More careful farming would quickly put people back on the land.

In New York as elsewhere in the country, the farmer is financially taking good care of himself. In the whole country the value in 1910 of the land, buildings, implements and farming machinery was about \$35,000,000,000, an increase of \$15,000,000,000 over that of 1900, 108 per cent greater for the land and buildings, and 68 per cent for machinery and implements. In the number of farms the increase is less striking, only 10.5 per cent. The acreage of improved land increased only from 414,000,000 acres to 477,000,000.

As the population increased 21 per cent, it is easy to see why farm land grew in value.

The Trouble With the Church.

I am asked why it is that we do not in these later days witness the revivals of the fathers. This question is much talked and written about and is giving good men and women much serious concern. I see no difficulty whatever in properly answering this question. We are living in a day of acute and uncompromising commercialism. Its germs are stifling everywhere, and the church itself is caught in the mad whirl of mercenary excitement. I mean no unkindness at all. The condition exists, as all thoughtful men and women know, and it is deplored by none more than by many pious pastors, who are brushed aside and off their feet in an endeavor to elevate the church to spiritual heights, by the tide of pride, envy, covetousness, fashion, and commercial overture and rivalry. It is not money, but the love of it, that the apostle denounced as "the root of all evil." Not a great while ago I saw an elegantly attired evangelist in a "revival service" preach sermons to large audiences. These audiences contained a large number of poor men and women; wage earners. A diamond flashed from the shirt front of the evangelist when the Bible is explicit in inveighing against the wearing even of gold or other articles of personal adornment and these wage earners knew it. When the Bible says "be not conformed to this world," it has reference not only to the more exacting requirements but to dress as well. Now then, the fathers observed these things. Call to mind the old time preachers and church members! How many appeared at church services with "the gold ring" or diamond in their shirt fronts? The trouble is simply this: The church has gotten in the world and the world has gotten in the church. Certainly it is a mixed multitude and many Christians (?), bearing neither mark nor stamp of "The King's household," are not known or recognized unless the church is visited and a look is given over

the congregation. I know of a costly and beautiful church edifice now in course of erection in the western part of the county, which is to have in it a well-appointed dining-room and kitchen. Suppers will be served and dinners will be given. A direct appeal will be made to the carnal man. If the preacher's salary falls short, a dinner will be given; suppers will be served. Charges will be made, and in this way money will be raised from members of the church, from non-professors, from non-church members and even from those who openly look askance at churches, Christianity and "real Christians," and take no part in such things unless an appeal is made solely to their stomachs. In this way the ministry will be supported and other expenses of the church will be paid. This is enough to make the old-time camp-ground preachers shuffle in their graves. They innocently believed that God moved on the hearts of Christian men to support the ministry and to defray other proper expenses of the church. They knew nothing about dining-rooms and kitchens and suppers and dinners in churches. They wore no diamonds. Their knowledge of big hats was limited and they never heard of a hobble skirt. They had heard it said: "Take these things hence; make not my Father's house a house of merchandise." Again, they had read somewhere something like this: "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of wearing gold or of putting on of apparel (costly or extravagant), but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." Again, they had read something like the following: "In like manner also that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness (modesty) and sobriety (earnestness, seriousness), not with braided hair or gold, or pearls or costly array, but which becometh women professing godli-

ness with good works." And some other things touching upon this question they had read. These simple men of former days could preach a "red-hot" gospel sermon and witness the abundant and rich fruit of their labors, but they knew nothing about church fairs, church raffles, church suppers, church dinners, church concerts, church theaters and a good many other things unnecessary to mention. Then what is to be done? What is the remedy? It is easy to state a case but not quite so easy at times to give the remedy. The flood is on and the task to stem it will be herculean indeed. That the church is approaching a crisis is, to my mind, evident. That for these same reasons the National government is also approaching the brink of "perilous times" is, to my mind, equally certain. Can the church be gotten back to "the old paths"? It is argued that times have changed. This is true, but it is also true that God has not changed, for the record speaketh expressly that "He is the same to-day, yesterday and forever," and "without variableness or shadow of turning." Times have indeed changed, but the Bible remains the same, and its requirements are made alike and uniform upon all ages and all generations of men. The church can never be gotten back to Pentecost. It is too late for that. Christ will again appear on the Mount of Olives before that. The preachers themselves must set the pace. Let the pulpit thunder against all these things and let the ministry set the example in their own lives. If the "whole counsel" is declared, there will be elevated chins, drooping under lips, looks through the corners of eyes, a tightening of purse strings when nearing the parsonage or the manse, and it will be indeed surprising to me if, somewhere along the line, the preacher does not suffer a cut of his rations. But this is the best that can be done. Let me assure the reader that what I have written has been with no intention to appear facetious, but with a

JUSTICE FLY ASSAILS TARDINESS OF TEXAS LAW.

In Handling Down Decision in Harris County Case He Says New Rules Are Needed.

San Antonio, Texas, October 12.—In an opinion handed down in the Fourth court of civil appeals yesterday, Associate Justice W. S. Fly in referring to the tardiness of the law stated that some new rules of procedure are needed in Texas if the old regulations are to hamper judicial findings.

The case was that of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway vs. Ross Babno, from Harris county. Babno was hurt while working for the com-

pany, a rail dropping on his foot and wedging it between the new rail and an old one. He got a judgment for \$818.50, and later the case was appealed on the ground of error in the court's charge.

The motion for a new trial was filed April 10, 1910; the assignments were filed July 25, 1910, but the specific complaints regarding the charge were not disclosed until March 25, 1911.

"Almost a year from the time of the trial was given to counsel for the defendant to dissect the charge and discover any possible error, and thereby retard the trial and prevent the determination of the rights of the parties for nearly two years," says Justice Fly's opinion. "Had the defendant been compelled, as he should

have been, to present the grounds of his attack on the charge, doubtless the judgment would have been set aside, a new trial had and the rights of the parties litigated and the ends of justice attained without the vexatious 'law's delays' which so often trouble and harass the citizen."

The decision goes on to say that under the present rules, Nos. 24 and 25 of the procedure, the "losing party can claim error in every line of the court's charge, and then spend months seeking out and assailing any part of the charge. If the construction of the rules be correct, Texas evidently needs new and different rules, for the practices permitted under the present rules are not only unfair to the trial judge, but are grossly unjust to the opposite parties."

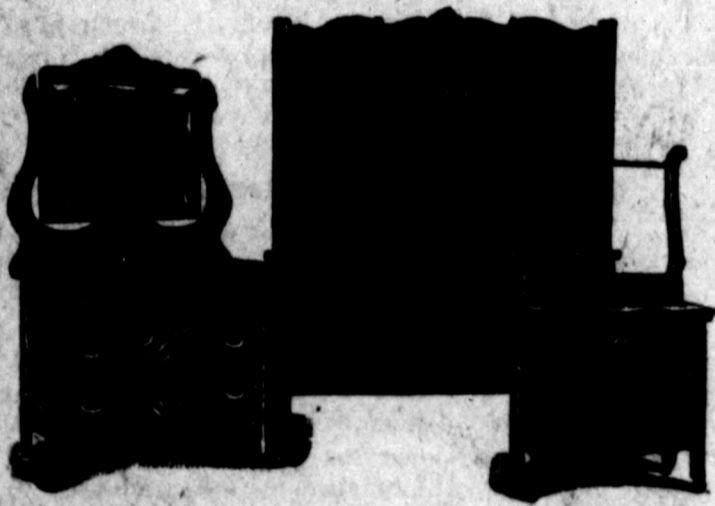

TOWARD DEMOCRACY.

Tide is Turning Strongly, Says Champ Clark.

Fort Worth, Texas, October 16.—"There is no power that can break the solidarity of the democratic ranks in the lower house of the Sixty-second congress," declared Hon. Champ Clark, speaker of the house, while here tonight to deliver a lecture under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus.

The democratic strength was properly tested in the special session, he said, and there is no indication of any ruptures that could make inroads on the democratic stronghold will develop.

"No other special session of congress has accomplished as much in the same length of time within a generation as the last special session in which the democrats had full control of the house and increased representation in the senate," Mr. Clark declared. "The democrats are together for the first time since Cleveland called a special session in 1893 and they are going to stay together."

"Since the close of the special session I have spoken and lectured in eleven states, and I find a strong turning to the progressive democracy that exemplified itself in the legislation that was enacted by the special session. I expect to see that sentiment increase continually and if present indications count for anything there will be a democratic landslide next year."

Immediately after closing his lecture engagements Mr. Clark will go to Kentucky, Kansas and Nebraska to make political speeches in behalf of the democratic candidates there. In Kentucky the general State election is one, while in Kansas two congressmen have died and special elections have been ordered to choose their successors, while in Nebraska one congressman has died and a successor to him will be chosen next month.

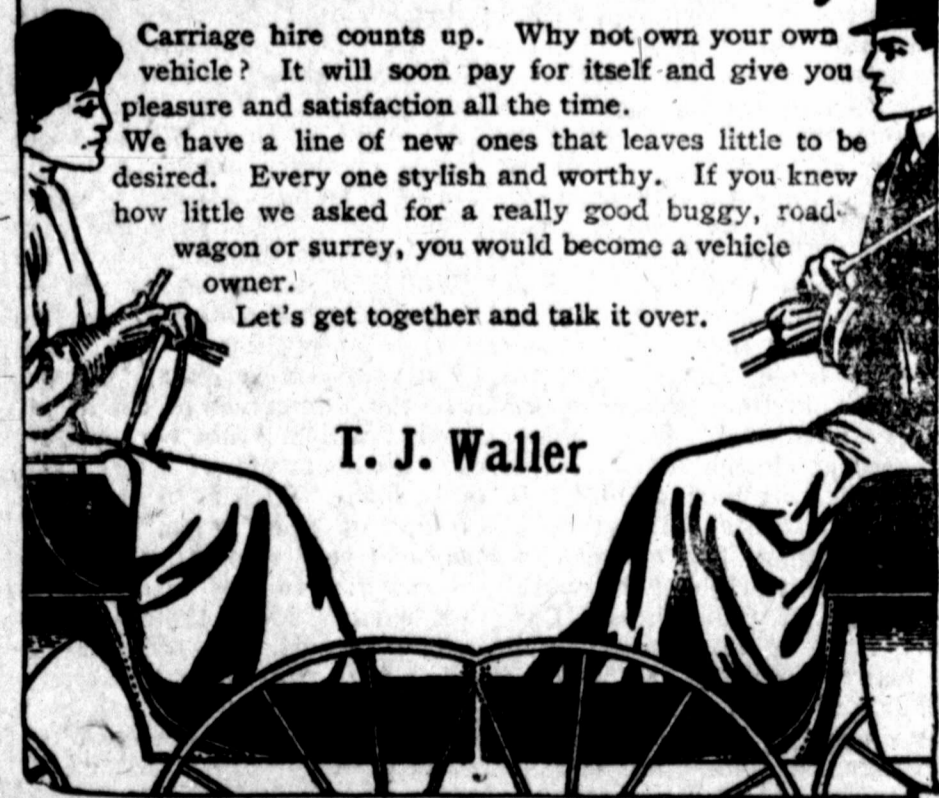
