FAIR ASSOCIATION INCORPORATED

Ten Thousand Dollar Company Organized and Very Little of the Stock Left.

Another enthusiastic fair meeting was held Friday night, at which it was reported by the committee that most of the stock had been taken. It was proposed that the fair association go into permanent organization with a capitalization of \$10,000 and that officers be elected for one year. The officers were nominated and elected as follows: Thos. Self, president; John Millar, vice president; C. L. Edmiston, secretary, and T. R. Deupree, treasurer. Managers were nominated and elected as follows: C. C. Warfield, manager of race track; W. A. Norris, manager of fair grounds; H. J. Arledge, manager of agricultural exhibits; Jim Smith, manager of live stock exhibits, and T. R. Deupree, manager of horse races.

A report showed that all the stock, \$10,000, had been subscribed and that all but about \$2000 had been paid in. Application will be immediately made to the state for a permanent charter and the Houston county fair will become a permanent enterprise. The purpose of the organization

is to promote the material welfare of Houston county, from an educational as well as financial standpoint; to encourage agriculture, livestock raising, gardening, orcharding and dairying. Premiums will be offered for the best of everything produced in Houston county.

Improvements at the fair grounds will be immediately begun. The high board fence on the north side will be extended all the way around to the southeast corner and the high wire fence at the northeast corner will be extended to intersect the board fence. Additional stalls for exhibition purposes will be built as well as additional stalls for livestock. The race course will be worked over and put in tiptop shape for fast racing. The association expects to have the fastest race course in the state and the next to the biggest fair in the state. The Houston county fair will be second only to the state fair at Dallas.

The Courier is informed that some of the stock of the association has been subscribed by parties who have pledged themselves to distribute it among as many people over the county as possible, so that as many people as possible may become stockholders in the fair and interested workers. The

shares have been placed at \$25 each so as to place them within the reach of every citizen in the county.

Woman Jury Discharged.

After listening patiently for three hours to testimony and arguments, the jury at 12:30 o'clock was notified to get ready for luncheon. Twelve different eating places were selected by twelve jurors. Then two said they did not want to go at all. In vain did Justice Forbes urge them to reach an agreement as to a place for luncheon. Finally at 1:30 he ordered them to check up again. The justice, too, lost his lunch.

At 5 o'clock, after four and a half hours' deliberation, the jury reported that it was unable to agree on a verdict and the court ordered its discharge.

The New San Antonio.

The announcement has been made that the Zoo, which has so long been a conspicuous and popular feature of San Antonio's amusement resorts, has been sold and will be removed to Kansas City.

This will be regretted by many, as the Zoo is characteristic in its collections of this part of the Southwest, and it has been instructive, as well as an exhibit for the benefit of, not only Eastern visitors, but for the young people of this section, who gained there a valuable knowledge of natural history, such as cannot be found anywhere else in the world. In that zoo are found the animals and the birds which are peculiar to Southwest Texas, including the javalin, the coyote, the armadillo, the "white wing," and many other interesting studies, the possession of which will be a great loss to San Antonio as a show town.

But, one by one the old places of interest in San Antonio have been disappearing of late years. The famous old restaurant conducted by "Ernest," known almost the world over for its splendid steaks which could be found nowhere else, ended with the death of its proprietor; the old Palm Garden, so long a pleasure place for citizens and visitors in the city, went out of business, and when the Zoo goes there will be but little left of the old San Antonio. Then its charm will be gone and the visitor there will find only the cold, sordid commercialism of other cities, and the Old San Antonio will be no more.

This is in keeping with the progress of the age, it is true, but to the old timers who still cling to a fragment of the sentiment which once made the old town a charm and a dream, the change will be far from pleasing. Skyscrapers can never supplant in the old heart the quaintness of the city in its former glory.

Even the picturesque San Antonio river is drying up in sympathy with its old friends. And it looks lonely without them.—Laredo Times.

An Ordinance Requiring Building Permits Within the City Limits of the City of Crockett, Texas.

Be it ordained by the City of Crockett that hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to construct or cause to be constructed, place or cause to be repaired, any building or structure of any kind within the city limits of the City of Crockett, without first making written application to the City Council for permit, and accompanying such application with full information as to location of proposed building or structure, estimated cost and description of material to be used in construction, and obtaining the written permit of the City Council to erect said building or structure. Any person violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined in sum not less than \$25.00 or more than \$100.00, and each day that said building or structure remains, without permit, shall constitute a separate offence.

From the Farm to the University.

By raising more corn or hogs than his county competitors, a farmer's boy can now help to satisfy his ambition to secure a college education. The Board of Regents of the University have offered free scholarships in the institution to the winners of the contests in corn growing and in hog growing throughout the State of Texas. These scholarships carry with them free tuition and an exemption from all matriculation fees. All winners in these contests may have scholarships issued to them by addressing President Mezes of the University. About one half of the students of the University come from the farm and ranch. Texas is 76 per cent rural. The University hopes to encourage the boys and girls of the back country to seek University training—not necessarily to take them from the country, but to so equip them that they may return to the farm and make life in the country more attractive and desirable.

Man Runs for Office as Joke.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., November 7.—The queerest banquet ever given here was that John J. McDavitt of this city tendered to himself in recognition of his political prowess. Running as a joke, he obtained the democratic nomination for county treasurer and was then induced to withdraw from the ticket. During the campaign he did not spend a cent, but made money speaking for other candidates.

To day, in the leading hotel here, the banquet took place. Mr. McDavitt was entertainment committee, host, toastmaster and guest. At the table he acknowledged the applause of imaginary admirers by gravely bowing, ate his dinner in state, then, as toastmaster, called upon himself with a glowing tribute to make a speech, greeted himself with applause as he arose, made a speech and applauded himself as he sat down.

PILLMAKING CRABS.

Queer Way These Tiny Creatures Get Their Food From the Sand.

Curious little crabs, mostly about the size of a pea, are found in abundance on the shores of the Malay peninsula. They are usually first perceived on the beaches after the going down of the tide, when they give the beach the appearance of being covered with loose, powdery sand and holes of various sizes. Upon looking more closely it is perceived that little radiating paths converge among the litter of sand to each hole and that the sand itself is in minute balls.

At the approach of an observer these immediately becomes apparent a peculiar "twinkle," which is nothing else than the simultaneous and rapid retreat of a multitude of the tiny crabs into their holes.

Should one who is watching these curious little creatures take up his position by one of their holes and remain perfectly motionless they will in time come out, when he will be enabled to see them at work.

Coming cautiously to the mouth of the hole, the crab will reconnoiter a bit, and when satisfied that no enemy is near it will venture about its own length from its lurking place. Then, rapidly taking up particles of sand in its claws, it will deposit them in a groove beneath the thorax.

As it does so a little ball of sand is rapidly projected as through its mouth. This it seizes with one claw and deposits on one side, proceeding in this manner until the smooth beach is covered with little pellets or pills corresponding in size to its own dimensions. This is evidently its method of extracting particles of food from the sand.—Harper's Weekly.

AN IRISH LEGEND.

The Foxes Mourn When a Head of the Gormanston Family Dies.

"Among the oldest families in Ireland are the Gormanstons. It is said that when the head of the house dies and for some days before the foxes leave all the neighboring coverts and collect at the door of the castle. This strange phenomenon," writes E. T. Humphries in the National Review, "occurred when the twelfth Viscount Gormanston died in 1860 and again in 1876, when the thirteenth viscount shook off this mortal coil. The fourteenth holder of the title died in 1907. Inquiry was then made to test the truth or otherwise of the weird legend.

"The son, in a letter published in the New Irish Review, stated that when in the chapel watching his father's remains prior to burial he heard noises outside as of a dog sniffing at the door. "The daughter of the thirteenth successor wrote saying that upon the illness of her father the foxes sat in pairs under the bedroom windows, howling and barking all night, and if driven away returned.

Pay of French Ministers.

Ministers in France are not so well paid as in England. The Oxidization of Brass.

Brass when immersed in a hot solution consisting of one-half ounce of golden sulphuret of antimony and four ounces of caustic soda in each gallon of water becomes oxidized with a pleasing brown shade. The shade becomes darker if the metal is immersed in a dilute solution of sulphate of copper, used cold, about four to eight ounces to the gallon. Several immersions in the same manner give deeper brown tones.

RECORD IS BROKEN.

Exceeds 1908 by 1,777,000 and the Crack Year of 1904 by 200,000 Bales.

Washington, Nov. 8.—With a total of 9,968,172 bales of cotton of the growth of 1911 ginned prior to November 1, as announced to-day by the census bureau, the promised record breaking cotton crop of this season is fast being made ready for the manufacturer. At no time in the history of the American cotton industry has so great a crop been ginned to this time of year.

The amount ginned to November 1 exceeds by 1,777,000 bales that ginned in 1908, the previous record. It also is greater than the ginning to November 1 of any year, being about 200,000 bales more than ginned to that date in 1904, the record year. This would indicate that the crop was at least two weeks earlier in maturing and reaching the gins than in previous years.

Calculations of the world's total crop, based on the ginning reports, would, therefore, probably be more accurate if figured on the November 14 reports of other years. In previous record years about 70 per cent of the total crop had been ginned to that date and a rough estimate of this year's crop might be placed at a minimum of 14,000,000 bales. Commercial experts' estimates, however, ranges up to more than 15,000,000 bales.

Frau Kanter, Pianiste in Recital.

The writer—and every one else in Parish Hall Saturday evening—felt quite satisfied that the divine art of music had an interpreter of considerable ability and intelligence, within her own ranks, so to say, when Frau Kanter (Agnes Bruner) of Leipsic, gave a piano recital before returning to Germany. And we were all as proud of this gentle, lovable woman as a little girl with a new doll.

A review of this artist's piano playing in the detail it deserves and with the time and attention and personal pleasure the writer was wont to give such in times past, is surely due Frau Kanter, because no one in local history has made such rapid strides toward perfection in this department of music that we can recall. Her art is lovely, and the program she chose to present displayed an admirable taste and a sure index to the versatility of this young woman. Neither Baxter Perry nor Leibling nor even Mickwitche have any pianistic secrets hid from Frau Kanter. Her playing is nearer like that of the distinguished Winnie Pyle than any within my ken. Opening with the fearful Brahms she braved all the criticism and played two of his ballades much better than I expected her to. Brahms must be played alone and oftentimes in the dark. Her two Grieg numbers she played with much better effect, and there was little if any of their brilliance lost. Schumann, always charming, was presented in two exquisite studies both full of soft, mellow tints, and all of which were delightfully portrayed to the mental e. e. Here she exhibited an admirable

pedal technic. The great Pole, Chopin—who doesn't play Chopin, or, who does?—was given an honor place on her program and she paid tribute to the name with two brief studies just issued and new to this country. Both the compositions and the reading she gave them were as balm to my tone thirsty ears. Frau Kanter concluded her beautiful art with the biggest thing ever heard on any recital program in this city for piano. Mendelssohn's wonderful G Minor Concerto. Its written for orchestral accompaniment and takes a heroine to play it say nothing of memorizing its mighty movements. Her reading was more than admirable. Her sister, Mrs. Sutton, played the thankless score for accompaniment, but with boldness and fine comprehension as to tempo and accent.

Accomplished Frau Kanter was assisted by Mrs. Esther Wheeler, the well and favorably known church soprano and teacher of this city. She gave a Nevin song, "My Desire" and an a. and b. Cadman number, "From the Sky Blue Water" and "The Moon Drops Low." Mrs. Wheeler was in excellent voice from the manner in which she presented these rare compositions for the upper registers of lyric voices, and the echo effects and lusty tones were sustained by her in a much better voice than ever before. Miss Ruth Sullivan presided at the piano for the gracious singer with fine knowledge of the piano scores. M. Purkiser.

BENEFITS OF FAIR

Familiarizes Farmers With Good Work of Neighbors and Communicates New Ideas.

Marlin, Tex., Nov. 4.—There can be no question that most beneficial results will come from the Falls county fair at Marlin. The exhibits of live stock have emphatically demonstrated that the farmers of this county are not all asleep as to this important industry. It is shown that great interest has been taken by many during the past few years in improving grades among all classes of stock. That interest has received an impetus and farmers who have been somewhat indifferent along the lines mentioned have received valuable object lessons from the exhibits of their neighbors. This feature of the fair can not but prove a substantial benefit to the people of the county generally.

Many farmers indicated unfamiliarity with the good work of their neighbors in stock development, and numerous surprises were expressed. The people of one community thought they were outstripping those of another locality, and were shown otherwise at the fair, hence mutual benefit was the result. Farmers of the different sections have communicated new ideas to each other with mutual benefit. One farmer stated to the correspondent that he had been aroused from a long slumber as to the adaptability of his land to the culture of many important crops, particularly that of peanuts, and that by giving those crops attention in the future he will be enabled to raise more and better stock.

A marked increase of interest in the poultry interest has been awakened. On this subject the correspondent became interested in a discussion by a party of ladies from the country who were examining the exhibits and learning something of the most profitable varieties and the attention necessary for best results, special attention being given to the turkeys. Results of this kind are generally regarded worth all the pains and expense incidental to holding a county fair and thus bringing the people together.

Magnificent specimens were shown among the horses, jacks and mules. A number of these animals, raised and owned by Falls county farmers, were equal in all respects to those to be found in any section of the country, where the highest grades are raised. Such animals could not be found in Falls county a few years ago.

Many of the most popular breeds and the best quality were exhibited among the cattle, including the Polled Angus, Hereford, Jersey and Durham.

In the exhibition of hogs were shown some of the best specimens that have perhaps ever been seen in this section at a county fair. The following breeds were included: Duroc-Jersey, Chester White, Berkshire, Poland China. Possibly the swine department attracted the greatest attention given the live stock exhibits.

In the sheep and goat departments general surprise was expressed. Little had been thought of what the farmers of the county were doing along this line, but it was demonstrated that the raising of these animals were not being overlooked. Some fine Merinos and Angoras were exhibited.

In the poultry department turkeys, chickens, ducks, geese, etc., were shown in about all the standard varieties. Many of the turkeys weighed as much as twenty-

two pounds.

The agricultural exhibits were also good. Much of the corn showed was as good as was ever raised in the county, notwithstanding the unusually poor crop of this year. The exhibits included rye, oats, barley, wheat, kaffir corn, ribbon cane, sorghum, alfalfa, Johnson grass, peanuts, etc.

There is a good showing in the vegetable line, including potatoes, cushaws, watermelons, cantaloupes and almost every kind of garden truck.

Fruits for the Family Table.

More fruit is needed in the daily diet. We have allowed ourselves to exclude fruits, the most wholesome and healthful articles of food, and as a result dyspepsia, constipation and a languid appetite are common.

Apples are choice fruits and much can be said of them as healthful food. The fine flavor of the apple stimulates the stubborn appetite, gives variety to the food and enables the digestive system better to do its work. Strawberries are always enjoyed. They come early in the spring when the appetite craves fruits. The rich aroma of good ripe strawberries is enough to tempt the most stubborn appetite. The berries are especially enjoyed by children and the aged, whose systems crave wholesome fruits.

Luscious peaches, ripe plums, nice cherries, juicy oranges, sweet figs—all are too well known to need further argument, yet how many homes we find without any of these choice, healthful fruits. Surely many farmers do not fully appreciate the value of fruits for the table.—Farm and Ranch.

"Make a joyful noise unto the Lord all ye lands,

Serve the Lord with gladness; Come before His presence with singing. Know ye that the Lord He is God; It is He that hath made us and we are His;

We are His people and the sheep of His pasture.

Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, And into His courts with praise.

Give thanks unto Him and bless His name.

For the Lord is good, His mercy endureth forever.

And His faithfulness to all generations." —One Hundredth Psalm.

As we pray for peace and rest throughout the State in the days that are yet to come, let us also give thanks for the blessings and general prosperity we have enjoyed, and gather around the fire-sides of our fathers and mothers and kindred and friends in a spirit of love and make our acknowledgments to the Father of all the faithful for His goodness.

Better Corn and Cotton.

Dallas, Texas, November.—Five hundred bright, new \$20 gold pieces, in twenty-nine stacks, the biggest containing one hundred and twenty-five of the yellow disks, will attract the attention of delegates and visitors at the third annual convention of the Texas Industrial Congress, to be held in Dallas on December 20.

Fifteen of these glittering piles of gold will be presented to men who have this year produced the largest and best crops of corn and cotton, ten acres of each, and the remaining fourteen will be given to boys under twenty years of age

who have cultivated two acres of corn and two acres of cotton. It is possible that some of the prizes may be awarded to women and girls, as they, too, have contested for the honor of the biggest yields.

The average yield of corn in Texas in 1910 was but twenty bushels, while the average yield of cotton per acre in favorable years is about one-third of a bale, but the reports, verified by proof, that these contestants will make, are going to be a big surprise in this unfavorable year of drouth, as many of them have yields of corn ranging from thirty to more than one hundred bushels per acre and from one-half to two and one-half bales of cotton.

And these yields can be secured by every farmer who is willing to pay proper attention to the preparation of his soil, the conservation of its fertility, the selection of his seed and the intelligent cultivation of his crops. At the Dallas convention of the Congress the prize winners will tell how it can be done.

Encouraging the Old-Style Debating Society.

D. Shurter, who teaches Oratory in the University of Texas, has charge of the general arrangements.

There will be held a contest in each county sometime between November 1st and February 1st, both in Declamation and in Debating. The winners in the county contests will meet in 16 different district contests, and the winners in the district contests will meet for the final contest in the Auditorium of the University in Austin next May.

High school and preparatory school meets in field athletics will be held at the same time. Last year five thousand high school students attended a State contest held at the University of Missouri, and in time to come excursion trains of boys and girls will be coming to Austin on the same mission.

That's What "Fewer Gallons" Mean

An Ordinance Fixing the Fire Limits of the City of Crockett, Texas.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Crockett, Texas, that hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to construct or cause to be constructed, move or cause to be moved, place or caused to be placed, repair or caused to be repaired, (except minor repairs in a sum not to exceed \$20.00 in cost) any building or structure of any kind, out of any other material than brick, stone or concrete, without first making written application to the City Council, and obtaining its consent in writing, within the following described limits, which are hereafter to be known as the Fire Limits of the City of Crockett, to-wit:—

BEGINNING at S. W. corner of Lot No. 124, in Block 23, intersection of Arch street and Public avenue; thence East with Public avenue to the S. E. corner of Lot No. 148, Block No. 23, intersection of Tchoupitoulas street and Public avenue; thence N. with Tchoupitoulas street to the N. E. corner of Lot No. 117, Block 23, intersection of Tchoupitoulas and Pearl streets; thence E. with Pearl street to the intersection of Pearl street and Church street, being the termination of Pearl street. Thence South with Church street to a point 150 feet South of the S. W. corner of Church street and Main street. Thence West parallel with Main street, along an imaginary line which will run 150 feet South of the South side of Main street to a point 150 feet West of the West Boundary line of Arch street. Thence East Main on street to Arch street. Thence North with Arch street to the place of beginning.

Any person violating this ordi-

nance, shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$25.00, or more than \$100.00, and each day that said building or structure is allowed to remain, without permit, shall constitute a separate offence.

Recognizing that an emergency exists, it is ordained by the City Council that this ordinance shall become, and is effective immediately upon its passage.
