Texas Senator's Views on New Jersey Man as Presidential Possi-bility-May Come to Texas.

Washington, Feb. '14.-Divergent views upon the availability of Governor Wcodrow Wilson as the democratic candidate for the presidency were made public by the two Texas senators, Culberson that if Wilson is nominated, he is certain to be defeated. These utterances give promise of lending new interest to the campaign in Texas, especially as sénator Bailey declares be expects to take a $\operatorname{tr}$ home within a few weeks.
The Post correspondent ask Senator Bailey if he were willing to state his position with reference to the democratic nominee for the presidency, and he dictated the
following: "If I can leave Wash. ington without neglecting my pub lic duties, I shall go bome within the next thirty days to assist in or ganizing a campaign against Governor Wilson, because be does not in my judgment, fitly represen democratic principles.
-I have never met Governor Wilson and have no personal feel to his nomination in the first place because he is now advocating fundamental and an undemocratic change in our government. Twen ty years ago every democrat in Texas denounced the initiative and referendum; and we did not then denounce the recall, because the populist party bad not gone so far at that time as to suggest it. then, or did we simply oppose the initiative and referendum because the populist party proposed them? "Certainly there was more reason then for advocating them than there is now, because at that time the people did not so directly se ect their representatives as they tatives respond with such fidelity o the command of the people they do today.

ROAD BONDS AGAIN SOLD. Crockett and Grapeland Districts Disposed of to Chicago Firm.

The commissioners' court, in ession last week, passod an order cancelling the contract previously made with the Thos. J. Bolger Co company had agreed to take the oad district bonds provided the road district bonds provided 25 years instead of 40 . The attorney general advised the court that the bonds could not be changed and so the trade was off.
The court then sold the bonds of ooth the Crockett and Grapeland districts to the Hanchett Bond Co. of Cbicago. The Crockett or D1srict No. 3 bonds, at 5 per cent, due in forty years and interest payable semi-annually, sold at their par value with acerued interest. These bonds are for $\$ 150,000$. The Grapeland or Distriet No. 1 bonds, at 5 per cent interest and due in forty years, sold also at their par value with accrued in their par value with accrued in
terest. District No. 1 is bonded or $\$ 24,000$. There is a provision in the contract of sale that the onds must come up to all legal he attorneys of the company For the bonds of Road District No. $1 \$ 350$ is to be paid to the bond company for legal expenses, blank bonds and as fiscal agents, and for the bonds of Road District No. $3 \$ 5850$ is to be paid for the same purposes.
