Morris Sheppard the elder found very erratic in his views, very changeable. In fact he termed Mr. Sheppard a "turn-coat," saying that he believed in the old saying that a man should be a pig or a puppy, a man or a monkey, not of the lizard type that would turn every color. Colonel Wolters in his address devoted himself principally to the tarifi, but took occasion to say in the bedinning that prohibition cannot be an issue in a senatorial campaign. That Morris Sheppard says as much though he devotes the principal part of his speech to its discussion and abuse of Woiters. In hose colonies the railroads are state-owned; they extend only when an increased population imperiously demands them. State ownership means politician ownership, and hey have extended, consistently only where they could serve the purpose of the party in power, by conciliating more votes.
As a consequence, the populations these countries have practically tood still, while that of the United ave, and latterly that of Canada, New Zealand has natural advanages which could easily sustain wenty-five millions of people, and its population now is less than a million, and it was over seven hun-
dred thousand sixteen years

South Africa, like Australia, de velops only its cities; while its agri "Great American Desert," lie idle fo want of cultivators.
Here is a lesson for the states of the Southwest. Capital is the great taxpayer, but it must be handled state altogether. If railroad enterprise is encouraged and left free to work out to the point of adequate equipment, cheap freight facilities and liberal passenger service, it makes a profitable return, but only by benefitting the country it serves a thousandfold for every dollar i earns.-New York Journal.
