## the death blow dealt

 to BRYANS Ambitions.Nebraskan's Stand Against Parker to Temporary Chairman Was Unavailing.

Baltimore, June 25-W. J. Bryan met defeat today at the hands of the democratic National committee and in the opinion of many today's defeat eliminates him from the race or the presidential nomination. The vote by which Judge Alton B. Parker of New York was elected emporary chairman over Mr. Bry an- 579 to 510-was interpreted in many ways. The Champ Clark adherents are claiming the nomina tion and many believe today would either be Speaker Clark or a dark horse." Talk of Mr. Bryan has not ceased by any means. Some of his friends say today's vote wa no test; that many of his most ar dent supporters were compelled by circumstances to vote against him as temporary chairman. They claimed, on the other hand, that the vote of 510 given to Mr. Bryan indicated that he held a "veto power in the convention, which put to who should be the nominee.
bid for convention support.
Many of Speaker Clark's delegates openly threw their support to the anti-Bryan forces. This was regarded as opening a breach between the speaker and the former nominee which may cause the Bryan supporters to make a bitter fight on Clark. Taken from another stand point, the vote of so many of the Clark adherents for Judge Parker was interpreted as a distinct bid for the support of the conservative ele ment in the convention.
This conservative element, it may be stated, practically is prepared accept a radical or progressive candidate. They frankly admit that to name a conservative or so-called reactionary would strengthen Colonel Theodore Roosevelt in his organization of a third party. This the leaders are anxious to avoid.

to me because I refused to subscribe 07 to the doctrine lately enunciated that all raw material must bear a duty if the finished product into which it enters has a tariff duty placed upon it. I sought at Houston to illustrate the absurdity and evil effect of the rule last stated, because an adherence to that proposition would enable the United States steel corporations to make any kind of competition with them impossible. It would enable the timber owners to make any kind of
competition with them impossible My position has always been that whether raw material or finished products shall have a duty upon them must depend on all facts and
circumstances surrounding the parcircumstances surrounding the particular product or material.
I answer your question that I
believe wool ought to be untaxed in believe wool ought to be untaxed in the interest of the producer. The cost of living has been so greatly enhanced, and particularly the cost of clothing, that it seems to me that the consumer ought to have some more attention than he has been getting by our tariff builders. The
great struggle that seems to be now
on is how many people can get the
benefits of the tariff that is imposed or to be imposed, rather than how many people can get the benefit of a reduction. I don't believe that ree wool would make any differ ence in the price of cotton for the reason that I stated in my remarks at Houston. I am sure that the present duty on wool can not account for the difference in the price of cotton in the years that are past. I don't believe that it is even a facor in that direction.
"I have this further suggestion, however, to make and that is that am not in public life. I am no an aspirant for any public office. I ry to discharge the duties of citizen as best I can.
"I feel that the Houston conven ion, as far as Texas is concerned has settled for Texas the tariff question until the national convention shall speak. The Houston convenion has sent delegates to the national convention with full power to act on the premises, and I take it that the Texas democracy will be bound by whatever the national convention declares, and there will be nothing for the Texas convention, held to announce nominees, to do except to discharge the functions prescribed by the law, and make such suggestions on matters of state politics that it may desire Unless it be intended to secede from the national democracy, it seems to me that more than that would be surplusage.  Gets 107 Ayes-Sherman Renom inated Easily.Chicago, IIl., June 22-William Howard Taft was ${ }_{i}$ nominated for resident at the Republican NationConvention at $9: 25$ tonight. He ceived the votes of 561 of the 1,078 delegates entitled to particiate in the convention.
Theodore Roosevelt, whose name was not presented and who requestd his supporters to refrain from taking any part in the proceedings of a body which he declared was organized by fraud and corruption, eceived 107 votes.
Roosevelt followers to the num er of 344 were present in the convention when the roll was called and refused to vote.
Vice President James Schoolcraft Sherman was renominated withou he formality of a roll call twenty minutes after the result of the ballot on the presidency had been announced to the convention.

Elibu Root, a Taft Man, Takes the Geva Temporarily-Much Bitterness in Evidence.
Convention Hall, Chicago, June 18. -Senator Root was late this after toon elected temporary chairman of the fifteenth National Republican Convention over Governor McGover of Wisconsin. It was a victory for the Taft forces, who had been in control of the national committee and the plan for the organization the convention.
Senatór Root was nominated by Chairman Rosewater of the national committee. Flinn of Pennsylvania, a Roosevelt leader, nominated Governor McGovern.
The taking of the roll was a tedious affair and was marked by numerous interruptions. The Pennsylvania vote was counted twice poll. It remained 12 for Root and 64 for MoGovern.
The Taft forces interpret the r sult as a Taft victory. When the Washington vote was taken and it was certain that Root had won, the convention went wild with excite the Washington vote Root had 543 votes to 422 for McGovern-enough to be certain of election regardies of what
