

**SENATOR FROM NEW YORK
CHOSEN BY REPUBLICANS.**

**Elihu Root, a Taft Man, Takes the Gavel
Temporarily—Much Bitterness
in Evidence.**

Convention Hall, Chicago, June 18.—Senator Root was late this afternoon elected temporary chairman of the fifteenth National Republican Convention over Governor McGovern of Wisconsin. It was a victory for the Taft forces, who had been in control of the national committee and the plan for the organization of the convention.

Senator Root was nominated by Chairman Rosewater of the national committee. Flinn of Pennsylvania, a Roosevelt leader, nominated Governor McGovern.

The taking of the roll was a tedious affair and was marked by numerous interruptions. The Pennsylvania vote was counted twice because of a challenge of the first poll. It remained 12 for Root and 64 for McGovern.

The Taft forces interpret the result as a Taft victory. When the Washington vote was taken and it was certain that Root had won, the convention went wild with excitement. With the announcement of the Washington vote Root had 543 votes to 422 for McGovern—enough to be certain of election regardless of what the remaining territories might be.

The sensation of the seconding speeches in the temporary chairmanship contests came when Walter L. Houser of Wisconsin, Senator La Follette's campaign manager, declared the Wisconsin delegation, obeying the wishes of Senator La Follette, had decided to support no candidate for the temporary chairmanship.

"Men have spoken here today claiming to represent the sentiment of Wisconsin," he declared. "I am here to say that neither were they authorized nor do they represent that state. In order that this record may be kept clear, I desire to say that the Wisconsin delegation met this morning and decided to support no candidate for the temporary chairmanship.

"Senator La Follette refused away back in this campaign to enter into any combination or alliances with any candidate. He refuses now to be forced into an alliance."

The office of United States senator invests the incumbent with no power whatever to promote or impede the cause of statewide prohibition. It does give him power to influence legislation governing the interstate shipment of liquors as well as legislation relating to the issuance of federal licenses in prohibition communities. But these are questions of regulation. A man may be a very intense anti-prohibitionist and yet be equally intense in demanding that federal laws

shall not be fashioned in a way to connive at the violation of state laws. If Mr. Sheppard finds something objectionable to a prohibitionist in the attitude of Mr. Wolters with respect to these questions, let him present those objections with all the oratorical force of which he is master. But we protest that he ought to have too much respect for the great office he aspires to advance his own claims on an issue that is foreign to the duties and powers of the office.—Dallas News.

FORMER OFFICIAL TO GOVERNOR.

**Mr. Bolmes Replies to Remarks Made by
Mr. Colquitt in a Speech.**

From the Galveston News.

An open letter to Governor Colquitt: Sir—In the San Antonio Express of May 30 appears a special telegram from San Angelo, dated May 29, which credits you with the following statements, to wit:

"Referring to the Bolmes matter, the governor said that Captain Bolmes was not an applicant for pension commissioner when he went into the governor's office, and after he went into office he began to receive letters and petitions from old soldiers asking him to remove Captain Bolmes because he was so slow in getting their warrants out."

In direct contradiction to your first statement you are informed that I filed in your office and hold your acknowledgement of its receipt an application for reappointment on the expiration of my term of office, June 11, 1911, although I knew at the time that prior to the time you became governor, you had promised the place to a young man, but by the advice of friends filed the application as stated. The complaints which you accepted as true, "as to my being so slow in getting their warrants out" shows your ignorance of the law governing the issue of pension warrants to be inexcusable, because the commissioner of pensions has no authority to issue such warrants; therefore I could not be held responsible for the delay complained of. The law makes that the duty of the controller, and the letters and petitions of complaint received by you should have been referred, as a matter of common courtesy, either to myself or the controller; but it appears that in your anxiety to pay a political debt you made these same letters a pretext for a peremptory demand upon me for my immediate resignation, an act so unjust that it was treated by me with silent contempt. My subsequent resignation was a voluntary act, because I was not willing to serve out the balance of my term under a governor who refused to extend to me the courtesies due from one state officer to another.

In this connection it is proper to state that directly after my appointment as commissioner of pensions I made a ruling that permitted pensioners to make their quarterly identification affidavits six weeks prior to the time their warrants were due, which has enabled the controller to mail out their warrants at least a month sooner than a strict construction of the law would have permitted. This ruling, I am informed, is adhered to by my successor. So much for being "slow."

I shall also hereby exercise my right as a citizen and voter, you being a candidate for office, to request of you answers to the following questions:

1. Why was it necessary for the success of your administration to cause the discharge of a dozen or more confederate soldiers, replacing with younger men? To the best of my knowledge they were competent and were serving the state faithfully.

2. In what is known as your

"faithful servant" message to the thirty-second legislature you urged the passage of bills then pending and considered of great importance by you. Why did you omit to call attention to senate joint resolution No. 9, also pending, a measure of great importance to thousands of indigent soldiers and their widows, because if the amendment can be carried it will mean \$10 a month to pensioners and include in its benefits a great many soldiers and their widows who are now bearded?

Both Sheppard and Wolters are of the Bailey school and should have no consideration by the Wilson men of Texas.—San Augustine Tribune.

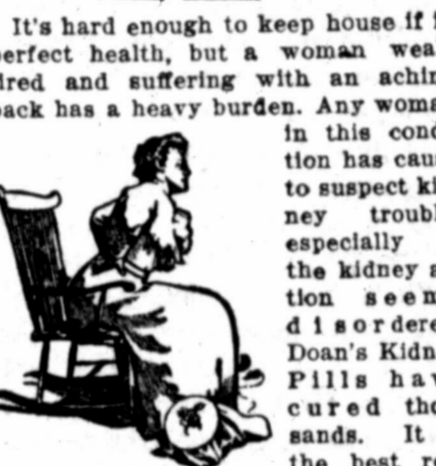

DOES NOT REFUTE ANYTHING.

The Courier publishes in another place a letter from Captain E. A. Bolmes appearing in the Galveston News, but in reply to statements appearing in the San Antonio Express and purporting to have been made by Governor Colquitt at San Angelo. Captain Bolmes' letter does not refute anything heretofore appearing in this paper or said by Governor Colquitt in his Crockett speech. The captain does not give the date of filing his application for re-appointment. Governor Colquitt says that when he went into the governor's office he, following the custom of other governors, made up his list of appointments. When Bolmes' successor was announced, the captain gave notice that his appointment was for two years and that he expected to hold his office until the expiration of that term, which would be June 11, 1911. Judging from his letter this is no

doubt the time he filed his application for re-appointment—following the appointment of his successor. Mr. Buford, his successor, informed Mr. Bolmes that he did not want to dispossess him and to remain in office until his two years expired. But Governor Colquitt was receiving letters daily in regard to the matter and felt that the public service demanded the captain's resignation. The captain refused to resign, but later resigned as a voluntary act, as he so states. It is true that Captain Bolmes did not issue the warrants to Confederate veterans, but the papers had to go through his office before the warrants could be issued. The rest of the captain's letter, as taken from the News, is trivial and of little consequence. The whole truth of the matter is that Captain Bolmes, though a brave and honored Confederate soldier, had passed his usefulness in a clerical position and for the betterment of the service the place had to be given to a man more active. The governor, in the discharge of his appointive power, did not hesitate to act when, as it seemed to him, duty demanded action.

The Courier would like to see John L. Wortham returned as railroad commissioner. On account of his long residence in east Texas he is known to many of our people as one of the state's ablest and best men. As superintendent of the state penitentiary system, he was foremost in the prosecution of those who misused the state's penitentiary funds and in his present capacity as railroad commissioner he is making an excellent officer. He has always taken an active part in every movement for the upbuilding of the state and the advancement of the best interests of the people. He wears his democracy straight, as becomes a true patriot.

Randell the One Democrat.

Early in May, speaking of the aspirations of Hon. C. B. Randell to succeed Senator Joseph W. Bailey in the senate of the United States, The Tribune ventured this prediction: "The state democratic convention, that is to assemble in Houston on May 23, will write a platform substantially if not literally in line with the principles and policies that Mr. Randell has urged for years, and with splendid courage and a steadfastness of purpose, on the floor of the lower house of congress. It cannot be otherwise, for as a member of the house Randell has stood for and stands for now the principles and policies that are in favor with the dominant, the truly representative element of Texas democracy."

The state convention has assembled and its utterances are before the people. Take the platform and read it carefully, comparing its declarations with those that Mr. Randell has made for years on the tariff, on trusts, on privilege, on direct action of the people—in all essential particulars—and note the similarity. The Texas platform is in remarkable accord with Congressman Randell as to principles and measures. It will not be claimed that he led the way and that the party has gone to him. Mr. Randell would not desire such a claim made for him. The explanation is that there has been accord all along, but this is the first opportunity in years that the party has made really representative and courageous expression. The Texas conventions in 1908 and 1904 (that dealt with federal or national questions) were influenced and dominated by men who are not now dominant and who were not then or now in accord with Randell.

The Texas democrats on Wednesday declared, and the applause was deafening, for one principle in par-

ticular that Randell has fought for on the floor of the House. Hear these words, that are in the Texas Democratic platform:

"A representative democracy can only be preserved by the representative representing the people alone, and he ought not, during his term of office, to accept employment from favor-seeking corporations or interests, and this principle should be enacted into the law."

Time has brought Mr. Randell vindication and recognition from the democracy of his home state and after a manner that is all to his credit. Texas legislatures, Texas democratic conventions and even the democrats in congress have denied it to him, but now in the fullness of time it comes. The conscience of the party has been challenged and the response is one to afford gratification to all patriotic men.

Randell is the one man, a candidate for the United States Senate from Texas, who is a Democrat in the sense that the state convention of 1912 defines democracy, and the party will be consistent, it will show courage and do the state service and itself credit by sending Mr. Randell to the United States Senate as the successor of Mr. Bailey.—Waco Tribune.
