WILSON NOT A STATEWIDER.
In Letter to San Antonio Man He Quotes Views Expressed a Year Ago on That Question.

San Antonio, Texas, July 4.-I reply to a query from this city as to his attitude on the liquor ques ion, Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, democratic nominee or president of the United States, ent a copy of a letter he wrote a year ago to Rev. Thomas B. Shanon of Newark, N. J., which is dated May 1, 1911, and in which he said "I am in favor of local option. I am a thorough believer in self-gov ernment and believe that every self governing community which con titutes a social unit should hav the right to control the matter of he regulation or of the withholding of licenses.
"But the questions involved are social and moral and are not sus ceptible of being made parts of a party program.
"Whenever they have been made the subject matter of party contest they have cut the lines of party action athwart to the utter confusion of political action in every other field.
"They have thrown every other question, however important, into the background and made construct ive party action impossible for long years together.
"So far as I am myself concerned, therefore, I can never consent t have the question of local option made an issue between political parties in this state.
"My judgment is very clear in this matter.
"I do not believe that party programs, of the highest consequence to the political life of the state and of the nation, ought to be thrust on one side and hopelessly embarrassed for long periods together by making a political issue of great question which is essentially mon-political, non-partisan, moral and social in its nature.
