## 500 HORSES DIE OF ODD DISEASE.

Mysterious Illness in Nebraska and Kan sas Causes Consternation.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 31-More than 500 horses have died of a strange disease in Nebraska in the
last week, according to reports re last week, according to reports re-
ceived at the office of the state veterinarian. Half a dozen experts are out trying to check the perts are out trying to check the ravages of the disease and the state
veterinary department has ordered more men into the field
The disease resembles fungus poisoning and is said to be due to lowing the late summer rains Horses are dying by the dozens in many scattered counties.
According to the state veterinarian. the horse afflicted with the disease appears to be normal in every way except that it apparentafter signs of being affected and is dead within 48 hours.
Topeka, Kansas, Aug 31-The opidemic which has killed several hundred head of horses in Central and Western Kansas continues to spread and there is no more prospect of relief tonight than there was a week ago, when farmers in the affected districts began to appeal to the state and federal authorities for help in combating the disease.
The epidemic has now spread over ten counties and in some of these counties so many horses have succumbed that farm work is prac tically suspended. Many state and government experts are rushing to the infected districts.
As time goes by without any sign of a check in the spread of the disease, panic is spreading among farmers and they are beginning $t$ run their horses into districts wher the disease has not broken out quarantine absolutely against every county in which the disease has made its appearance are likely to be taken by the state authorities Monday.

## Washington, Sept. 1.-Under au

 hority conferred by the postoffice ppropriation bill, Postmaster Gen salaries of rural letter carriers on tandard routes from $\$ 1,000$ to $\$ 1,100$ a year, thus affecting 30,000 men with proportionate increos o carriers on shorter routes. The order will become effective Sept. 30 This will mean an increased dis ursement of $\$ 4,000,000$ a year. It is the second salary increase for rural carriers made in the last four years.At the close of the last fisca year, on June 30, there were 42,03 rural mail carriers, the aggregat pay being $\$ 40,655,740$. The in crease provides rural carriers ade quate compensation for additiona burdens to be imposed by the par cel post system, effective Jan. 1. The parcel post system on rura mail routes can be conducted pra tically with no extra expense to the government except the increase salary allowance to the carriers said Mr. Hitchcock. "In my jud ment this additional cost will be more than offset by an increase revenue, thus insuring its mainte nance."
Mr. Hitchoock has directed als that rural mail carriers on comple tion of tweive months service granted fifteen days leave with pay This will require an additional $\$ 80$ 000 a year to pay substitute car riers.

of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That section 51, Artide 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legis hature shall have no power to make ay grat or of public makey a any grant of pubic money to ay indidual, association of indivauals, muncipal or other corporation what cever, provided, how ever, the Legisiature may grant aid indigent and disabled Confederate solders and silors who ca, - Texas prior to January 1, 1900 and their widows in indigent cir cumstances, and who have been cona lide residents of the State o Texas since January 1, 1900, and who were married to such soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1 1900; to indigent and disabled soliliers, who under special laws of the state of Texas, during the war be tween the States served for a period of at least six months in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican marauders, and to indigen and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas, who were in active service for a period of at least six months during the war between the States, to the widow of such soldiers who are in indigen circumstances, and who were mar ried to such soldiers prior to Janu ary 1,1900 , provided that the wor "widow" in the preceding lines o this section shall not apply to women born since 1861, and also to gran aid for the establishment and main tenance of a home for said soldier and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Con federacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided for by law; provided, the Legislature may provide for husband and wif to remain together in the home.
The Legislature shall have th power to levy and collect, in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property not exceeding five cent tion for the purpose of creating special fund for the payment pensions for services in the Confed erate Army and Navy, frontier or ganizations and the militia of the Sate of Texas, and for the widow of such soldiers serving in said a litia.
Sec. 2. The Governor of the State
is hereby directed to issue th necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Tex as at the general election of St which in November, 1913. this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words For the amendment to Section 51 , Article 3 of the Constitution relating to increase of Confederate pensions:" and the voters, opposed to

State of Texas, providing for citie tate of Texas, providing for citie of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants to adopt their charter,
by a vote of the people. Be it resolved by the Legislature o the State of Texas
Section 1. That section 5 of Ar
icle 11 of the Constitution ticle 11 of the Constitution of th State of Texas be amended so as to
ereafter read as follows
Section 5. Cities having more than five thoushnd (5000) inhabi tants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, sub ject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charte shall contain any provision incon sistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enact ed by the Legislature of this State said cities may levy, assess and col lect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be law ful for any one year, which sha exceed two and one-half per cent 0 the taxable property of such cit and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creat ing a sinking fund of at least tw per cent thereon; and provide further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed often or than every two years.
Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the neces sary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be held in this State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be Submitted to the qualified yoters of the State. At such election, those written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 5, Article 11, of the constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote o he people; those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their bollots the words Against amendment to Section 5 Article 11, of the Constitution, auhorizing cities of more than five housand inhabitants to adopt thei charters by a vote of the people."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing That Members of the Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees and Managers of the Educational, Eleemosynary and Peali Institutions Shall be Elected or Appointed for the Term of Six Years.
(H. J. R. No. 9.)

House Joint Resolution. An Act proposing an amendment the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new section providing that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University, and the boards of trustees or managers of educational, eleemosynary and penal institutions of the State and such other boards as have been, or may hereafter be esablished by law, may be elected or appointed for term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of said boards to be elected or appointed very two (2) years in the manner provided by law, fixing the time for holding the election, and making the appropriation therefor
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution be amended by adding new section thereto, to be known
and designated as "30a," and to read as follows:
Section 30a. The Legislature may provide by the law that the members of the Board of Redents of the State University and Boards of Trustees or Managers of the educa ional, eleemosynary and penal in stitutions of the State and such boards as have been, or may hueh after be established by law, may hold their respective offices for the term of six (6) years, one-third the members of such boards to be elected or appointed every two(2) years in such manner as the Ledis ature may determine; vacancies in uch offices to be filled as may be provided by law," and the nay bla ture shall enact suitable laws to dive effect to this section.
Sec. 2.
