Electoral Vote of Democrats Will Pass 300 Mark According to Incom plete Returns.

New York, November 5.-With the election of Woodrow Wilson to the presidency and Thomas R. Marshall to the vice presidency assured by the returns tonight, the reports up to midnight gave indications that the electoral vote of the democratic candidates would pass the 300 mark.
The size of the popular majority given the democratic National ticket, or the states outside of Illinois that might give electoral votes to either Taft or Roosevelt, were matters of conjecture at midnight. It was certain, however, that illinois
would give an overwhelming mawould give an overwhelming ma-
jority to Roosevelt, while the race jority to Koosevelt, while the race
in Pennsylvania was so close as to bring all three candidates within range of success.

tory to Taft in New Hampshire and Vermont, but the Taft pluralities dwindled as midnight approached to a very few hundred votes in each state and seemed likely to be wiped out entirely.
The vote in Utah, reported up to midnight, indicated the state might be carried for Taft. The vote in Pennsylvania was amazingly close. the returns from over a thousand precincts embracing over 185,000 votes, giving each of the three leading presidential candidates more

A crusade of education which aims "that common colds may become uncommon within the next generation" has been begun by prominent New York physicians.

On the day of the night Horcasitas was brought from his home stripped naked and bound to the post with his feet just below the height to
which the bull could reach with his horns. Then Horcasitas' wife and two daughters were placed in a box built up on the side of the stockade just opposite their husband and father and compelled to watch his agony. Guards prevented the wo men leaving the box, and when
they fainted, as the two girls did, they were reviverl by none too genthe hands pouring raw sugar cane
alcohol into their mouths. Both girls were of the beautiful mestiza girls were of the beautiful mestiza
type, and ${ }^{\text {blboth }}$ went the way of all girls who fell into Zapata's hands. One stabbed herself to death, the second and older girl died two or three days later.

State Health Officers Have lssued In structions to Prevent Return
of Epidemic.
Austin, Tex., Oct. 30.-Not un mindful of the meningitis epidemic hrough which Texas went during the fall months of last year and the Health Officer Steiner yas issued to Health Officer Steiner has issued to
every city and county health officer every city and county health officer
a warning. He notes that with the colder months the disease may occur this year. He urges that the towns be placed in first-class sanitary condition; that if meningitis cases do appear they must be isolated together with all persons exposed, etc His warning is given in the following letter:
From the history of the disease there is a possibility of the reap pearance of the epidemic of cerebro spinal meningitis in Texas during he colder months
The disease is a contagious and infracellus one, due to the bacillus fection beins or meningococcus; infection being conveyed by contact with the sick or by carriers. There are approximately ten otherwise healthy ca
meningitis.

"To control the disease it is nec essary to isolate and quarantine not
only individual cases, but direct only individual cases, but direct
contacts and those contacts who are contacts and those contacts who are
shown by microscopical examina tion to have become carriers. Case should be centralized if possible and kept in quarantine until bac made from the nose and throa secretions are negative.
"Carriers should be kept in quarantine until microscopical exami nation every two or four days of cultures prove negative. Direct ex
