Some time back the Courier printed a news item to the effect that the Crockett postoffice receipts had exceeded $\$ 10,000$ on March 31 of the present year and enumerated some of the benefits Crockett was entitied to as a result, among the
benefits being free mail delivery for benents being free mail deilvery for
the city. March 31 was the time Postmaster Dawes was called on for his report showing the amount of business done by his office. When Congressman Gregg of this district read the item in the Courier, he Washington:

"Dear Sir-I noticed in a recent issue of your paper that the receipts of the Crockett postoffice for the fiscal year ending March 31 amount ed to over $\$ 10,000$.
"The fiscal year ends June 30 of each year and the receipts of your office for the year ending March 31 will not be considered in establishing free delivery. If your receipts for the year from June 30, 1912, to June 30, 1913, amount to $\$ 10,000$ or over, I can secure free delivery for you right away. Yours very

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THIS STATE OF BONDS FOR IMPROVEMENT DISTRICIS AND ALSO FO THE OPERATION OF PUBLIC WAREHOUSES FOR STORING HANDLING, CLASSING, MEAS URING, WEIGHING, ELEVAT ING AND LOADING AGRICU TURAL PRODUCTS.
(S. J. R. No. 4.) Joint resolution. A joint resolution proposing Article 3, of the Constitution of this

Section 1. Be it resolved by the egislature of the State of Texas hat Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read
Section 52 . The Legislature shall ave no power to authorize any ounty, city, town or other political State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in id of, or to any individual, associabecome a stan whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company, provided, however, that under legislative provision any county, any any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include owns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of a majority of he resident taxpayers voting there on, who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be af ected thereby, in addition to al ther debts may issue bonds therwise lend its credit in any mount not to exceed one-fourth of he assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory xcept that the total bonded indebtdness of any city or town shall ever exceed the limits imposed by iner provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon, and proion a sinking fund for the redempauthorize, and in Legislature may it may authorize the same for as following purposes, to-wit
(a) The improvement of river reeks and streams to preven ion thereof, or irrigation of naviga aid of such purposes
(b) The construction and main enance of pools lakes reservoirs dams, canals and waterways for the purpose of irrigation or in aid hereof
(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamzed, graveled or paved roads and urnpikes, or in aid thereof.
(d) The construction, mainten nce and operation of public ware houses for storing, handlits ing, measuring, weighing, elevating and loading agricultural products. Provided the Legislature may es may be necessay for accomplishing the purpose of this amendment and f a State warehouse commission be provided for, their term of office shall be fixed by the Legislature. Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified electors of the State of Texas on the third Saturday in July, same being the 19th day o said month, and the amendment proposed to Section 52 of Article 3 as above indicated, shall be voted upon seperately.

Multiplying the scholastic population by five, which is the custom in ascertaining the true population of a given territory, it is found that Houston county has a population of 46,090. The scholastic popufation of the city of Crockett is given by the same report at 1044, which using the same multiple, gives the city of Crockett a population of 5220, an increase of something over a thousand in three years. At this rate of increase Crockett will have 8000 people when the 1920 count is made. The scholastic population of Lovelady is given at 316 and of Grapeland at 245. The population of those towns may be estimated by using the same multiple of five, as in the case of Crockett and Houston county. Outside of the

Of the East Texas counties the nearest to Houston county in point of scholastic population is Cherokee which is given 8481 by the repor rom the state department of education. Accordingly, Cherokee has population totalling 42,405 , or 3685 less than Houston county.
