Americi's Flyless Town. Redlands, California, is not a big place, but it has recently attained
wide fame as the only "flyless" town wide fame as the only "flyless" town
in the United States. A worthwhile distinction for any place, big or small, when we remember the small, when we remember the
millions and millions of diseasemilions and millions of disease-
breeding flies turned loose every summer to plague man and beast. About a year ago the "fly question About a year ago the fly question
was reached in Redlands. It was high time. The weather was hot and the town seemed to swarm with these insects. The mayor of that city recently remarked: "That 'swat the fly' advice is' all wrong. There is absolutely nothing to it We don't do it in our town and w have made Redlands the most un-
healthy burg in the land for a fly to healthy bu
live in."
"Well, what do you do to get rid of the flies?" the mayor was asked. "Go out in the streets of our town and see for yourself and hunt up Chapman, our official flycatcher. He is the only one in the world, hink, and he has made good. Hear wat he has to say about flies
was the reply. was the reply.

He had emptied fifty gallons of flies from 100 traps scattered through the business porion of Redlands and estimated hat there were 75,000 flies to a ailon. At this rate of destruction came a flyless town
At present over five hundred fly traps are distributed over the little city. They are to be seen in every building, the post office, the railroad stations, many of the big shops and along the highways, but recent ly the daily task of the official flyatcher has been light.
It was in July a year ago that Mr. Chapman built his, first "flycatcher" and began experimenting. He found that if the trap could be higher so through the cone more flies ligher through the cone more flies

HOUSTON COUSTY TO HAVE NEW JAIL
Will Cost $\$ 16,000$, to Be Paid in Sixtee Amount to $\$ 7680$.

At the regular session of the commissioners' court held in Crockett last week, beginning July 14, contract was let to the Southern Structural Steel Company of San Antonio for the construction of a new jail for Houston county. The order of the court in letting the contract specifies that the jail shall be with in the corporate limits of the city of Crockett. While the order doe not specify where the new jail shall be located, it is understood that the new building will be at the back of the present jail unless present plans ent plans are carried out, the pres ent plans are carried out, the new building will not be tom the old building will not be torn away unnew building will face Tchopitoula street.
The court's order provides for the payment of the debt and interest in sixteen years. On the jail proper $\$ 1000$ a year is to be paid. The interest for the sixteen years amounts to $\$ 7680$ and is to be paid in two installments each year. The total indebtedness is to be paid by the issuance of county warrants. These warrants are to taken care of by the levy of a special annual
county jail building tax. The or county jail building tax. The or-

Work on the Houston county fair has been started by placing the catalogue in the hands of Fort Worth printers for execution. Just why this was done before getting estimates from Crockett printers we have no reason. No doubt the fair association has a good reason for
its action. In Crockett there are its action. In Crockett there are
eight printers-three in each newspaper office and two in an exclusive ob office-who depend on Crockett for a living and who spend what they make in the city. Almost every cent they make goes back into the local channels of trade. At least one of them is a stockholder in the fair association, holding seven far as we can ascertain, was asked for an estimate on the fair catalogue, which has been printed in Crockett for the only two fairs heretofore held and the workmanship of which was faultless. Both newspapers have been untiring in their
efforts to push the fair. Money to pay for the printing of the catalogue is raised by soliciting ads. from the local merchants, who have just finished a tour of the county advocating the patronage of home institutions. That their money should now go to Fort Worth printers, to be spent in Fort Worth and other places, is out of harmony with the doctrine that they have preached from one end of the county to the other. We do not know how they are geing to attempt to reconcile when they cure their "soreness" when they find out where their ier has $n$. Personaly, cie reve information is siven for the benefit of all parties concerned That the fair association has made blunder is self-evident. That it would have been better to have kept the money of Crockett people at home cannot be disputed.
