We had to pay for right of way, straightening roads, done dynamiting, and to crops by going through fields, \$285.50, while they only had to spend for these purposes $\$ 105.00$. Those who first had charge of the road work worked the inside ends of the road next to town, completing only the Porter's Springs, Huntsville and San Antonio roads west, beginning at the city limits. At a distance of 3 or 4 miles from town there were but few stumps in the road, the right of way was practically cleared, hence they did not have to go to the heavy expense we were forced to in order to clear their right of way eady for work.
