

Skillern gave the following instructions for curing bad cases of pustular acne or pimples: Correct all errors of digestion; see that the teeth and mouth are in perfect order; persuade the patient to chew thoroughly; stop eating sugar, starchy and fatty foods, cutting out all fried food, candy and pastry; correct anaemia by open air exercise and proper diet. If possible have a few exposures to X ray treatment; squeeze out every comedo, puncture each pustule; swab with phenol three parts, camphor two parts. Use a good boric acid soap with tepid water at least twice a day, and at night apply lotio alba, rub-bing it in well. Dr. Skillern also urges the use of a properly pretient herself.

The treatment calls for patience, but will clear the most pimply face Globe. if persisted in.-New York World.




