The committee was averse to hav ing any part of the expense borne by the family, since Colonel Exall had already given more money the work of the congress than any other contributor, to say nothing of his time and strength. The cost of hauling over country roads is largely determined by the size of the load that can be hauled, ne number of trips that can be made in a day, and the wear and cording to Roads.
