## Frank Driskill

The United States is the leading corn producing country of the world and contributed 67 per cent production of the United States in 1913 was $2,446,998,000$ bushels and 3,124,746,000 bushels in 1912 Argentine, which has been shipping large quantities of corn into the United States lately, for use in Texas, produced only half a crop last year. Her total yield was 196642 000 bushels. The 1913 yield of of Texas was $163,200,000$ bushels and was the largest production in history. Owing to the shortane of the South American crop it is not likely that the imports from that country will be heavy during the next few months. The Argentine corn crop matures six months earlier than that of Texas and export shipments from that country to the United States will besin early in June.

The farmers of Texas last year purchased $50,000,000$ bushels of corn from outside the state and present indications are that the 1914 imports will exceed this amount by several million bushels. Some of the product is being shipped from Argentine, South
tariff law permits this cereal to
enter ports of the United States duty free, yet the principal supply of the imported grain is coming from the original sources, viz: Kansas, Oklahoma, lowa, Louisana and Missouri. While 80 per cent of the corn raised by Texas farmers is merchantable, it is largely consumed on the farms where produced, there being only 6 per cent of the crop shipped out of the county where grown. Texas corn on March 1st this year was netting producers 87 cents, compared with 69 cents per bushel on the same date last year.
