## OM THE FIRING LIIE.

ed in trenches and bombproofs From this. fine re-enforcements can be moved. rapidly to points where battle pressure is strongest. In the rear of the second line, say a mile
or less, field artillery is placed to or less, field artillery is placed to heads of the infantry into the positions of the enemy, which are generally invisible to the artillerymen. The selection of vantage points
